




### Derby Champ Off to Finals

### New Look Due Champ For Big Race

Ft. Lauderdale Soap Box Derby Champion Steve Holzer becomes a "Yankee" today.

Prior to the Fl. Lauderdale-Yankee-Tampa game at 5:45 p.m at Ft. Lauderdale Stadium, Steve will appear in his baseball uniform with the lettering: "Ft. Lauderdale-Spring Home of the New York Yankees.

He will wear this same uniform when he receives his motorcycle escort into Akron, O., August 1.

The uniform, along with 500 plastic baseballs, which Steve will toss to speciators at his Akron debut, were presented to the Derby champion by Dan Topping Jr., general manager of the Ft. Landerdale Yanks, the class D affiliate of the big league Bronx Bombers.

Steve is hoping the Yanker winning tradition will rule off on linn when he competes in the All-American Soap Box Derby championship Aug 4

## He Comes Back To Win Derby

First B Division Racer To Score

FT. LAUDERDALE -Beaten in his initial heat last year, Steve Holzer, 12, of Ft. Lauderdale, became the first B division racer to ever win the Soap Box Derby as he flashed to a onefoot victory over Tim Gannon Wednesday before a festive crowd of 10,000.

Jeff Warren, Pompano Beach's shining hope, was eliminated in the semi-finals of the A division. Warren. 14, of 2632 NE Eighth St. was beaten by Jerry Johnson, after capturing three earlier heats. Chris Mossey, 2501 NE First Ave., Pompano's only other entry, was whipped by Dennis Gerard in his opening race.

For Holzer, 2309 NW Fifth Ave., a sixth grade student at St. Clement's, the victory was a sweet one after last year's frustration.

"When Dennis Gerard beat me last year I knew I had to build a heavier car," said Holzer. "I also patterned my car after Gary Patchen's racer." Patchen was last year's Soap Box Derby cham-

On his way to the derby title, Holzer avenged his defeat to Gerard, whipping him in their third heat.

By virtue of his victory, Holzer receives a \$500 Savings Bond, He will also compete in the All-American Soap Box Derby in Akron, O., Aug. 4 for \$30,000 in college scholarships.

"I haven't even thought about Akron yet," said the 4 foot 11 inch, 80-pound Holzer. "I just never thought I would win."

Holzer won four races in the B division and then met A class champica Tim Gannon in the championship race.

Both boys streaked down the Las Olas Blvd, bridge without a car length separating them. Holzer's blue racer had enough to zip ahead at the finish line,

The B division encompasses boys 11 and 12 years old whil the A class is for boys 13-15.

## Mom's Happy She's Wrong

When Bruce Regan told his mother he was going to enter this year's Soap Box Derby she put her foot down and said "No." She even went so far as to call Ray Rose, derby director, with a request to have him toar up Bruce's entry blank.

It wasn't that Mrs Edward Regan, of 1419 NE 16th Terr. Ft. Lauderdale, had anything against the derby. It was just that Bruce had a habit of "starting things and not finishing them."

"Whenever something would go wrong, Bruce would just discontinue the project," Mrs. Regan said, "We didn't want to see this happen with the derby."

But despite pleas for withdrawal made by his mother and father, Bruce went on.

"I must admit that sometimes I didn't think I was going to finish it." Bruce said, "but I kept remembering my folks saying I wouldn't finish and then I would go back to work."

Mrs. Regan admits that a little psychology may have been involved on her part "But we're all tremendously proud of Bruce."

Two boys will race in each bout.



## Chris' No. 7 Car Brings Memories To Old Derby Fans

By SEYMOUR BEUBIS (News Staff Writer)

Chris Gravett. 11, will ride a car with the number "7" splashed across it in Ft. Lauderdale's Soap Box Derby race July 4.

This will bring back many memories to long-time Derby followers.

It was Chris' father, Bob Gravett, who as a youngster rode in "Old Car Number 7" which became the prototype Soap Box Derby racing car.

Gravett's Number 7 attracted the attention of Myron E. Scott in 1933 when he was seeking a photographic feature for his newspaper, the Dayton Daily News.

And it was Gravett's car which gave Scott the idea for the Soap Box Derby.

Old Number 7 has been used as the Derby symbol ever ince the birth of the All-American Soap Box Derby in 1934. A drawing of Gravett's car is the central feature of the official Soap Box derby emblem. It is now displayed at the General Motors Museum in Detroit and is taken to Akron each year.

NEVER WON

Yet despite the acclaim Gravett's car received, he never won the derby.

He's hoping that Chris can accomplish what he couldn't do with number 7.

When asked to compare his

old car with his son's model. Mr. Gravett said: "Chris would run me into the ground."

Bob Gravett was an eighth grade student in Dayton, O., when he built his car in 1933. It was constructed for a race against five other neighborhood boys, which Gravett lost.

In 1934 the neighborhood race was run citywide.

The Gravetts' moved to Ft. Lauderdale slightly more than a year ago. They reside at 1314 NE Third St.

If tradition means anything and the Gravetts are hoping it does, then number 7 will be once again in the limelight.

But this time Chris and not Bob Gravett w.ll be behind the wheel.


John, in fact, has impressed everyone with his desire. Inspectors say he has a good looking car and may surprise some of the favorites.

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
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The Soap Box Derby held each year at Fort Lauderdale is the sixth annual running for the youths of Broward County.

Our first derby held for boys between the ages of 11 and 15 was held July 14, 1957 on the 17th Street Causeway with Johnny Lamon sky-rocketing in to victory in #1 position. Johnny was the first Broward County champion. Close behind was young Tony Leonardi to claim the runner-up position. Johnny Lamon went on to Akron where his sleek car won a huge trophy for the best upholstered Soap Box Derby Car.

In 1958 the Derby Race was moved over to the Las Olas Bridge. Tommy Gepfrich was the winner this year and he was closely followed in by Tommy Dorough, second place winner.

In 1959, top honors were won by Les Leonard as the Derby returned to its original run-off grounds — the 17th Street Causeway. Right behind and still pushing hard for victory was — Tommy Dorough, two times second place winner. Les continued on to Akron where he achieved the distinction of being the first Broward County boy to win his first heat in the "Big Race".

1960 Derby moved back to Las Olas Boulevard Causeway where Tommy Dorough, who had been runner-up in 1958 and 1959, crossed the finish line as our new Champ. Tommy continued on to the National in Akron where he was placed against two of the fastest racers in the derby and was edged out in his first heat.

1961 Derby race was also held on Las Olas Boulevard Causeway and saw Gary Patchen flash across the finish line 1st in the final heat followed closely by pint size Dennis Gerard who was Class B Champ, with his sleek, black car. Gary had placed fourth, third, and second in his previous three races. Gary left for Akron and the National finals with the determination of bringing back the National Championship to Fort Lauderdale. Gary, after beating some of the fastest cars in the National race, wound up in the final heat and was edged out by approximately 11/2 feet for the National Championship. Gary was awarded the \$4,000 scholarship. His sleek black car also won the National Award for the best designed car.

Gary and Tommy are now working on the inspection committee for the local race.

Today's race will find the boys out on the ramps after spending months of preparation and hard work to pass the final inspection rules. It should be an inspiration to us all that these boys have given up a lot of leisure time just for a few seconds thrill of competitive racing.



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
