Louis H. and Maude Smith-"The Old Smith House" Mini-Archive by Ron Ulm, August 2023

What follows is a compilation of the documents found while researching an article for the Fall 2023 issue of the Wilton Manors *Town Crier* newsletter – *"Old Smith House-recalling a missed opportunity"* (also included). It was inspired by an undated document, compiled and annotated by Paul Kuta, digitized by WMHS in July 2008. These notes provide more details about the family history than could be included in the brief article. For those who have not yet read the article, the Smith House was located at 1209 NE 24th St (then Mahannah Road), across the street from what is now The Metropolitan.

As is often the case, follow-up research not only turns up new information, but also raises inconsistencies with earlier documents. Such was the case here.

The extract from the 1955 "Wilton Manors Story" has the Smith House being built in Colohatchee in 1910, and the family remaining in the same house and location at the time that the article was written. Guy Smith's obituary for his mother in 1959 describes the family home and history in much more detail; but also, quite differently. A 1971 article, found while completing these notes, and quoting Guy's wife Nadine, seems to bridge the differences. It also required a re-write of the originally-submitted article. Combining the three sources it would now seem that the family indeed built a house when they arrived in 1910, but in the "North Andrews Gardens" section of Colohatchee, not Mahannah Road. That house was destroyed in the 1926 hurricane. For reasons undetermined, they rebuilt a new house that year in the "Mahannah Road/Wilton Manors" section of Colohatchee. That is also consistent with the known history of "our" Smith house; including the photograph of the home appearing in the Willingham Wilton Manors sales brochure "as a newly built home in Wilton Manors".

Other parts of the 1955 narrative do seem to be supported. The family arriving in 1910, would have been one of the first White families to settle in Colohatchee. Guy's birth in 1915 would appear to make him the first White child born in Colohatchee. He would have pre-dated the 1926 birth of Darlene Chadwick Mitchell—who is oft-quoted as being the first White child born in Colohatchee/Oakland Park. (Interestingly, in 1926 the Chadwick homeplace was located at what is now the Pride Center, just a few blocks from the second Smith home.)

It appears from Census and other records that much of the first-two generations of the Smith family (father, mother, and sons Kenneth and Guy) all lived at the 1209 NE 24th Street home until their respective deaths. By the 1945 Florida Census, Guy's wife Nadine, stepson Daniel White (age 12), daughter Mary (age 4) and son Henry (age 1) are also living at that address. But for father Louis and son George, the 1950 Census continues to show three full generations of the Smith family all living in the same home on NE 24th Street.

George is still shown living at that address in the 1940 Census; but not in 1945. But Stuart McIver's 1997 history of Wilton Manors states: "In the early 1930s the land north of Middle River and east of Wilton Drive had to be sold for taxes. Perry Mickel retrieved the land for the Willinghams by selling ... the house at the entrance gates to George Smith, who owned a furniture store and a tire shop."



George, indeed, owned a furniture store from the early 1930s to mid-1940s. A 1944 Ft. Lauderdale News article has he and his wife living at 1101 Wilton Boulevard—roughly the address of the Willingham Administration Building. So, we do not know when George actually vacated the family homeplace.

[As an aside, while called the "Administration Building", it seems likely that Willingham built the structure to serve as a "model home" for the type/size/quality of house he expected to be constructed in his subdivision.]

At the time of his death in 1981, Guy would have been the longest-tenured living resident of Wilton Manors. Strangely, both his Ft. Lauderdale News and Miami Herald obituaries contain no biographical information or mention of his wife, children or brother Kenneth and George. Researching their names on Newspapers.com, FamilySearch.org and the WMHS archive turns up no useful information and makes no mention of same. That leaves us the with a puzzle—what happened to the rest of the family? Readers of this document are welcome to provide any insight by contacting us at <u>wmhs@wmhistory.org</u>.

Included as an interesting aside are the articles suggesting that father Louis H. was more than just a farmer; and was involved in bootlegging in the 1930s. (Given the geographic proximity of their land, one also has to wonder if his two colleagues John Reed and Ben Reed were related to the Phillip Reed and spouse who appear in the "Mahannah eggplant field" photo.) In any case, turns out Wilton Manors had a number of individuals engaged in illegal liquor activities and other vices within its sparsely populated limits during that period. More on that in another article under development!

The Mini-Archive begins with the Town Crier article and the remaining pages are in chronological order.

The "Old Smith House"—recalling a missed opportunity

In **1910**, Louis H. Smith, his wife Maude, and two sons George and Kenneth, left Echols County, Georgia for Florida, the land of opportunity. Three weeks later, traveling by horse and wagon, they arrived at Colohatchee. Mr. Smith was a farmer. His first property was 15 acres in in the area we now call North Andrews Gardens—where he built his first home. That same year Mrs. Smith became a founding member of the Colohatchee Woman's Club. Son Guy was born in **1915**—likely the first white child birthed in the little hamlet. Guy provided details of the family's history in his mother's 1959 obituary. From that, and other documents we learn ...

Their first home was destroyed by the "**1926 Hurricane**" (the family had taken shelter in the FEC RR depot with a number of other local residents). That same year they built a new home on Mahannah Road (now 1209 NE 24th St.), east of the FEC RR tracks and adjacent to the Colohatchee depot.. Willingham's1926 Wilton Manors sales brochure included a photo of that house (see below). It was labeled "*A newly built home in Wilton Manors*"—even though it was technically "across-the-tracks". By 1945 Maude, Kenneth, Guy and his wife and two children were all living in the home. Guy and family remained until his death in **1981**. Three generations of a pioneer family living in their original Colohatchee/Wilton Manors home for some 55 years!

Around **1989** Horton/Jones Electrical Contractors purchased the property—needing the land to expand the business. The house was then in disrepair, but recognizing it was probably the oldest historic residence in town, Horton/Jones offered to donate it to the City (possibly as headquarters for the Historical Society), if the City would agree to move it. Accounts vary as to what happened next. Ultimately the City failed to take further action, and the house was demolished—another vintage/historic structure lost.

WILTON MANORS — Mrs. Maude Smith, a resident here for 50 years, died Tuesday at her home, 1209 NE 24th St. She was 71.

Born in Eckles County, Ga., Mrs. Smith and her late husband came here to farm.

A son, Guy, said his parents bought a 15-acre tract in what is now North Andrews Gardens, and later leased addltional farmland.

"They were among the first white residents to settle here." he said. "They built a home in Wilton Manors, but it was demolished in the 1926 hurricane. The following year they built another home in Wilton Manors.

"We weren't in the house at the time the storm hit. We stayed in a railroad section house with about 100 other persons."

Mrs. Smith was active in lodge work a number of years and was a charter member of the Colahatchee Woman's Club. Her husband and two sons are dead.

WILTON MANORS

AS TOLD IN 1955

Many persons have noted sidewalks long laid and lamp posts on Wilton Drive, design of the twenties, and have been curious as to the background of Wilton Manors; when it was founded and how it derived its name. With the celebration of the re-building of Wilton Drive, your editor thought it timely to bring the history of Wilton Manors up to date and with the aid of early residents, Mr. Dave Turner, Mayor Perry Mickel, Alvar Hagen, Norman Malcolm, and the newspaper files of the former Wilton Manors Bulletin (Tom Hinds, Editor) we have been able to piece together the following story.

STORY...

©Wilton Manors Historical Society -all rights reservedThe first deed on record involving present Wilton Manors was executed in 1890. It came about as a step in the romantic story of the reclamation of the mangrove swamps and sand dunes and their transformation into the present dream-come-true-land for tourists, and a wonderful place to live for the year 'round residents.

In the year 1881 a group of St. Augustine people headed by John Wescott, incorporated the Florida East Coast Line Canal and Transportation Company, capitalized at \$100,000 for the purpose of "Constructing, maintaining and operating a canal, or artificial waterway for the passage of boats and vessels, with the necessary locks, for public use in the conveyance of persons and property, to extend from some point near the head of Matanza River, in St. Johns County, southward to the head of the Halifax River" - a distance of about 12 miles. In 1882 the project was enlarged to extend the canal all the way to Biscayne Bay in Dade County. The canal was to permit passage of vessels drawing three feet of water or less.

In 1885 the Legislature made a grant of land to the canal company to make up deficiencies along its "present and proposed extended line" and in 1889 confirmed the grant of land to the company, at the rate of 3,840 acres per mile for the entire distance of 320 miles - St. Augustine to Biscayne Bay. The canal was to be 50 feet wide and 5 feet deep, at mean low water.

The Trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund of the State of Florida had, meantime, been designated as custodians of all swamp lands of the state. Thus is came about that the Trustees in 1890 issued the first deed to lands in Wilton Manors and other lands. The total was something over a million acres.

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High hopes that the canal, which later became the Inland Water Way, would play an important part in developing the Southeast Coast, became partly true, but the coming of the railroad in 1895 pushed development rapidly. A railway station was located at Mahanna Road (now called NE 24 Street). It was called Colohatchee and was moved at a later date to Oakland Park where it sometime later burned to the ground.

Colohatchee is an Indian place-name of local origin, current before the railroad came. It is said that William C. Collier was the first white settler in this northeast section not long after Stranahan settled on New River. He had a rich little area along the South side of the North Fork of Middle River, east of the present railroad. He had an orange grove and the Indians developed quite a fondness for his oranges. They called him Colo, and Hatchee meant river, hence the location was Colohatchee--Collier at the River.

Stranahan and Frank Oliver were owners of land here in Wilton Manors. In fact, in 1910 Oliver, Moody and Weaver platted the land lying between the railroad and Old Dixie, south of Mahanna Road and called it Colohatchee.

The oldest house now standing in Wilton Manors is at the corner of Old Dixie and Mahanna Road (NE 24 Street) and is owned by C. H. Hutchinson. The old-time structure was built around 1912 by a man named Johnson, called Uncle Billy, who farmed and kept a dairy. As an example of how well built the house is, the floors are of three inch Dade pine. Uncle Billy bought his farm from Oliver and sold out to E. J. Willingham in 1924 and there begins the story of Wilton Manors proper. Willingham appeared on the scene in this community as the developer of Lauderdale Beach in 1923. After having that well underway, he acquired the ground here and platted Wilton Manors Unit Number 1 in 1925. The plat of Unit No. 1 showed, but did not include the land lying along the North side of the South Fork of Middle River, although it apparently was owned by Willingham. He resided in the present Richardson house, having remodeled a smaller one on the side into the present commodious residence.

From present Lazy Lake came rock for construction. Wilton Manors was an ambitious project for a high grade subdivision. Wilton Drive, 90 feet wide, was improved with paving, sidewalks and light standards to be the axis of the residential district. Emphasis was placed upon the Northeast corner at the intersection of The Drive and Old Dixie. Block 69, adjacent to the FEC RR was reserved for business to be improved with two story buildings only. Sidewalks on Old Dixie were 10 feet wide. The entrance to the residential district was made impressive with two crenulated towers. But they were not just false fronts of stucco on lathe as were many similar structures which decayed and fell apart in succeeding years to become as many such did, gastly reminders of disappointed hopes and lost investments. They had concrete foundations and belt courses at each story with steel reinforcements as though built under present day building code. They were beautiful with decorative inserts of Coquina rock, and after the fashion of the famous architect, Addison Mizner, were given face relief. Between the towers a cable was strung to display a "Welcome to Wilton Manors" banner. The South tower had stairways to the upper floors and was used to take prospective purchasers to the top and show them the area. This tower and the block on which it stood were acquired some years ago by M. D. Mace. After completion of his own handsome residence, the tower with additions was converted into a unique and convenient residence while still preserving the original design.

It is said that the name Wilton was selected to perpetuate a branch of the Willingham ancestry in England, of which he was very proud and in order to be a credit to that name the Manors was restricted to Caucasions and the improvements were to be of non-combustible materials. Residents on the Drive were to cost not less than \$8,500; on Dixie Highway \$7,000, and all others in proportion. Indian names were given to all streets except the present 26th Street which was called Prospect Road. The restrictions were to run for 20 years or until 1946. Lots were sold for high prices. Wilton Drive lots near the towers sold for \$7,000; on what is now 23rd Street, for \$3,000.

The first home in the new subdivision was erected by Mr. Hiaasen on what is now 621 NE 21st Street. E. J. Willingham, Jr., erected the house nearest to the towers and it was the real estate office of the project. About eight residences were erected, all but one being of the adapted Mediterranean design.

Matters were progressing happily toward fulfillment of Willingham's dreams to make Wilton Manors a place of distinction as a select locality, and to augment his considerable capital. Then, suddenly disaster came in the form of the '26 hurricane. All activity ceased here and everywhere in Florida. That wind blew away all hopes and plans including, it is said, some three million dollars of Mr. Willingham's investment. But misfortunes seldom come singly... He returned to Byron, Ga. where his wife died in January. Two months later he followed her.

Persons responsible for the start of present day expansion on Wilton Manors are mainly: Dave Turner, Alvar Hagen, John Pedersen and Perry Mickel. Dave Turner, first Mayor of Wilton Manors is a Floridian, having been born in St. Augustine. He came to Pompano area in 1906 and moved to Ft. Lauderdale in 1912. About 12 years ago he and his family moved to Wilton Manors. In 1943, on expiration of the original deed restrictions, Mr. Turner bought out the Willingham estate holdings. He had it surveyed and began to market the lots at a reasonable price, and soon disposed of them. In the last few years he has, in an association with James Dean and others plotted a large tract of land East of the FEC RR lying between NE 26 Street and North Fork of Middle River, which is being sold as Middle River Estates. Mr. Turner donated the land to the city on which the present City Library is built.

Alvar Hagen came upon the scene in '40 from Berwyn, Illinois. He acquired property adjacent to the Richardson Golf Course and along the South bank of Middle River, and some on the south end of the Drive. He built and sold residences. Built important business houses along Wilton Drive. He was one of the main persons responsible for starting the Wilton Manors Civic Association. Mr. Hagen donated a 100' x 500' piece of ground for use as a City park.

John Pedersen came here about the same time as Hagen and acquired considerable amount of land through purchase of tax property, which he sold at a reasonable price. He helped many people start a home by se-ling at low cost and loaning of construction money at reasonable payments.

Our present Mayor, Perry Mickel is an old timer here, having been Willingham's right-hand man during the development of both subdivisions of Lauderdale Beach and Wilton Manors. He also represented the Willingham estate for some time, paying taxes and looking out for the properties. Mickel bought a farm West of Andrews Avenue which he farmed in the winter. He has said he farmed in the winter and built homes in the summer to make up for what he lost during the season. However, Mr. Mickel was successful in business of operating a farm. He recently plotted his property and began selling lots and building homes.

In looking for the oldest living resident of Wilton Manors we found that John Durden, now living at NE 6th Lane and 26 Street, has lived in the community for 41 years, having bought a farm in the vicinity of Oakland Park Blvd. and Andrews Avenue in 1914. When the boom started, Mr. Durden went into the road building business, and says that he finished paving Wilton Drive after Hatch, the road contractor, had failed to finish his contract. He also contracted streets and sidewalks for Willingham and other developers. He says the first street paved in Wilton Manors was the present route of 26th Street, from the Drive to Andrews, and was called Prospect Road. He tells many amusing stories of the time, among them about high-falutin' parties put on by the social set of those days.

In 1947 Wilton Manors was incorporated as a nonprofit organization, municipal type, in circuit court of Broward County. An election was held and Alvar Hagen was elected President of the Council with J. Marvin Brown, Arthur Chabot, James Boyd and William Robinson rounding out the roster. Dave Turner was elected first Mayor of the new village and Katherine Johnston was made Village Clerk. Bill Robinson doubled in his duties as Councilman by acting also as the first attorney of the village.

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Wilton Manors is considered one of the fastest growing communities in South Florida, especially during the past five years. Not only has there been a tremendous home development, but the influx of business has been most noteworthy. Today in the city of Wilton Manors there are 85 business establishments, comprising almost every type of business and professional service, including three doctors, a dentist, a dental laboratory and bookkeeping service.

As a comparison, five years ago 18 business persons were doing business on the Drive. Out of the original 18 business men five years ago, six are operating today: Lamar Braddy and Frank Starling of Manor Market; Bill Hickson of Old Bills Bar and Package store; Doc Williams of Williams City Drugs; Bert Muzzell of Electra-Pliance; Don Grose of the Grose Barber Shop and Les Bagwell of Tropical Paint Supply.

Five years ago, 250 homes comprised Wilton Manors, whereas today 1500 homes are occupied, and many more are under construction. The city boundaries, five years ago, comprised about one square mile while today the city takes in all the land between the south and north forks of the Middle River, about three square miles. About five thousand lots are still available for development. In a short time, at our rate of growth, the population could reach 15,000.

The village of Wilton Manors was incorporated by an act of the State Legislature into a city in 1953. The people of the city five years ago depended on wells for their water supply, whereas today there are over 1400 water meters in operation providing city water. The system is valued at \$350,000. The growth of the city is reflected in the number of paid employees on the payroll. In 1950 there was only one on the payroll, while today the total is 12, not counting the city attorney and bookkeeper. The city has a volunteer fire department, recreation program, park

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facilities, garbage pick-up service. Other improvements include the drainage, and rebuilding of Wilton Drive into a four lane highway by the State Road Department.

The social life of the community five years ago was taken care of by a golf course, Wilton Manors Civic Association, Woman's Club. Today, in addition to the above, other organizations active in the city are the Highland Civic Association; Kiwanis Club; Sinawiks; Wilton Manors Business group;; PTA; Jaycees; Jaycee-ets; Jr. Woman's Club; Teenage Club; Lions Club; Little League Organization and Wilton Manors Sports, Inc.

The religious life of the people is taken care of by Covenant Church, Wilton Manors Baptist Chapel, St. Anthony Catholic Church, a new Christian Church and a newly organized Lutheran Church.

An added boost to the business outlook is the completion and opening of the new Wilton Manors National Bank.

Wilton Manors today would be a surprise to the founder if he could see it. The business district did not develop on Dixie Highway as he had hoped, but is mainly along Wilton Drive, which he had planned to be lined with stately two story homes. Mr. Willingham planted the beautiful royal palms that you see on the bank of the South Fork of Middle River, west of the Drive. He had hoped to line not only Wilton Drive with them, but all other of the important streets he longed to develop as well.

All in all, the community has grown and will continue to grow, for Wilton Manors is the "homey" type of community where people are interested in making it "the best place to live".

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
