## Evolution of the new theater on 26th Street

In early 1953 local promoter James Dean, with others, proposed a grand *Manor Gate Shopping Center*, — a \$4.5 million dollar (\$54 million in today's dollars) shopping/business development on the south side of 26th Street at the railroad crossing. It would include offices, shopping, a bank and a *movie theater*. Across the street would be a new City Hall. This was to be the centerpiece of Wilton Manors new "downtown".





By the **end of 1953**, what actually opened was a small, one-story strip shopping center consisting of *Williams City Drugs*, *Moore's Jewelry* and the office of Dean's *Florida Sun Life Insurance Company*. A second set of storefronts were added around **1956**, with the "anchors" being a 7-11 and *Downey's Donuts*. That same year a *second Dairy Queen* opened in an outbuilding on 26th Street.. A *Kentucky Fried Chicken* was added to the plaza around **1960**. With the addition of the KFC, Manor Gate became a gathering spot for local teens. This includ-

ed "Chicken Hop" dance parties in the parking lot—with music by Fred Hamill's (a la Hamill Firestone) Green Onions band.

At the **end of 1964** ads announce "the new Manor Gates Shopping Center welcomes the addition of an A&P Supermarket". [The A&P closed in **1975** and became *Westland Meats*, then the *Texan Family Restaurant* in **1976**, the well-known *Old Florida Seafood House* in **1977**, *Holy Mackerel* in **2020**, and *Wilton Collective* in **2024**.]

It took 18 years to fulfill Dean's vision of a movie theater in the plaza. The grand opening of *Manor Cinema* was announced in May 1971. It was dubbed a "second-run theater", with 382 seats. Tickets were \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children. Popcorn was 15 cents and soda 10 cents. The first movie was Disney's "Aristocats". By 1983 Manor Cinema had become *"Manor Art Cinema"* and was described as featuring films with "adult and sexual themes". The date of its last screening is unclear.



1988 brings the first ad for "Brian C. Smith's Off Broadway Theater on East 26th Street" (yes, that was the name used in all of its ads). In 2001 the name was changed to "Stage Door's 26th Street Theater". The last ad was in December 2007 for "Sisters of Swing—the Life of the Andrews Sisters".

The venue remained dark until it was intermittently repurposed as "Wilton Theater Auctions" from approximately 2013 to 2015.

It was abandoned and dark again for some ten years, until the recent announcement of the opening of WM's new multifunctional performance space, the *Gray Box Theater*.
