The evolution of the Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club began after WWII, the population of Wilton Manors grew dramatically with many young families moving into the Village. The 1950 US Census showed the Wilton Manors population at 883, by 1960 it had grown almost ten-fold to 8,257. The gentlemen of the community decided to form a Kiwanis club, to serve the children. The officers were installed September 19, 1950 6:15pm at the Tropical Club patio. [Typical of the era, it was an all-male organization; although a sister auxiliary, the Wilton Manors Sinawik Club, was chartered about the same time--but apparently lasted into the early 1960s.]

Charter/ founding members were: Frank Miller, President; A.B. Wolfe, Vice President; Dr. Daniel Peschio, Vice President; Leslie Bagwell, Secretary-Treasurer; and Directors: Robert Pryor, Perry Mickel, W.P. Hartman, Fred Williams, James Dean, and Robert Lewis. Additional charter members included: Ed Claggett, Bryan Davis, and Vernon Burnell.

Two months later on November 25, 1950, the Kiwanis International Governor and Broward County officials had a Charter Presentation ceremony for the new Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club at the Bahia-Mar Yacht Club.

Installation of officers of the new Kiwanis club at Wilton Manors will take place at a dinner-meeting of the club at 6:15 p. m. Tuesday at the Tropical Club Patio. The club is spon-sored by the Ft. Lauderdale Downtown Kiwanis, and is the 94th Kiwanis club in Florida.

Frank Miller, club president, will preside. Circuit Court Judge G. W. Tedder of the sponsoring club will be guest speaker. In-stallation services will be conducted by Lt. Governor Joseph J. Cutter of Lake Worth.

Instrumental in organizing the club were B. E. Lawton, president of the Downtown Kiwanis club; E. M. Bond, Harry Strong, Joseph Vason and Carl Conant.

G. H. Martin, past district governor of the Florida Kiwanis district, will be the representative of Kiwanis International at the meeting.

Officers to be installed include: Miller, president; A. B. Wolfe and Dr. Daniel Peschio, vice-presi-dents; Leslie Bagwell, secretarytreasurer; Robert Pryor, Perry Mickel, W. P. Hartman, Fred Williams, James Dean and Robert Lewis, directors.

One of the first events the Kiwanis organized was the Halloween Carnival for the children, on October 30, 1951. All proceeds from the hotdog and soda sales at the booths went into building a new baseball diamond on NE 26 Street, adjacent to the Elementary school yard.

That next spring, May 26, 1952 the Kiwanis Club completes the new ball diamond and hands it over to the Principal of the school, for use by the school and Little League. This begins a long relationship with the Kiwanis Club sponsoring many Little League teams over the years. That summer of 1952, the Wilton Manors Little League team won the local championship!

Kiwanis International sponsors a National Kids Day event every year. In 1952, the Fort Lauderdale and Wilton Manors clubs joined to host approximately 900 children for this free event at the Boy Scout Hut in Holiday Park. It included games, sports events, prizes, hotdogs and pop, followed by a movie in the evening. By 1955 Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club was hosting their own "Kids Day" for approximately 200 kids. It was held at the ball field that Kiwanis gave to the Principal of the Wilton Manors Elementary school in 1952.

Wilton Maners Kiwanis is working in conjunction with the Downtown and Beach Kiwania Clubs, under the capable chairmanship of Dr. Robert W. Gates.

A foor-hour program of games, picnicking and movies at the Boy Scout Hut in Holiday Park is on tap for hundreds of kids who plan to be present.

All boys and girls between 6 and 12 years of age will be welcome. Transportation will be arranged for those unable to furnish their own. A number of prizes will be awarded, the top one being a breycle.

The program will begin at 4 P. M. with games and sports events. These will be in charge of Temple Jarrell, Landendele recreation director and Jack Elliott of Beach Kiwanis. The sports contests will be followed by a picnic supper and a western movie, with the festivities ending at about 8 P. M.

Fondly remembered by long-time residents, the Kiwanis "Aunt Jemima Pancake Festival" began in 1958. The inaugural event was held at the newly-enclosed Hagen Park Pavilion (it had originally been open air). "Aunt Jemima" was there in person to greet over 1500 attendees served over two days. She also appeared from time-to-time in later years. The event continued to grow; and added the coveted "Miss Pancake" pageant in the late 1960's.

The festival was a major fundraiser for Kiwanis-sponsored Youth Activities; including Little League, Soap Box Derby, Boy Scout Troop 115, and in the mid 1990's, stewardship of Kiwanis Park (later expanded and renamed Island City Park Preserve). With changing priorities and declining membership, the festival became less frequent and ended in 2016.



Beginning in the late 1950s, the Club sponsored Boy Scout Troop 115. The Scouts sold tickets to the Pancake Festival as a troop fundraiser. The Club also sponsored the Troop in the Soap Box Derbies. Alan Clark was Kiwanis Club president in 1993-94. As a child in the 1950's, the Kiwanis Club sponsored him in the Soap Box Derby.



Bus, Ambulance **Keep This Troop** Of Scouts Moving

WILTON MANORS — A
bus, two canoes, an ambulance
and 90 boys make up Boy
Scout Troop 115.

The troop, sponsored by the
local Kiwanis Club, combines
trips throughout Florida and
the United States with its regular local eamping and boating program.

"Twice a month we have a
three-day camping trip somewhere in this area." Scoutmaster George Lee said. Today the group took off on a
canoe trip.

Four scouts will attend the Boy Scout National Jamboree in Colorado Springs next month, Lee said, and 20 more will attend the Sebring Scout Camp, also in July.

But the annual "big" trip will come between Christmas and New Year's.

"We are going to Massachuseits to a summer home I have there." he said "None of the 12 boys going have ever seen snow."

THE WIDE and varied activities of the troop are made possible by its bus and ambulance.

Obtained four years ago from a Louisville, Ky, transit firm, the bus transports equipment and adventurous secuts to areas all over.

Last June, 34 secuts went to Washington and New York in the bus, "We had hoped to to Mexico this year," Lee said, "but I bought a restaurant and that sort of killed the trip. But we plan to go next year."

The Massachusetts trip will

The Massachusetts trip will be taken by commercial air-craft because of the one-week time limit.

The bus carried groups of over 12 scouts camping and boating, Lee said. Under 12 can be handled by the ambulance.

Always capped with two silvery canoes, the white ambulance was donated a year ago to the scouts.

Both units, maintained by the boys, are parked across from city hall on NE 21st Ct., except when the 11 to 15-year-olds are off on another adventure.

Local business developer, James Dean, served as president in 1953. He donated the land at 2749 NE 14 Avenue, a waterfront lot with 17,340 square feet, for the future Clubhouse. The Club borrowed money from the members to build the structure. The 2,385sf Clubhouse included a kitchen, auditorium meeting room, and two bathrooms. The ground breaking was March 7, 1958; with the building's dedication on November 25, 1958.





With the Clubhouse's new kitchen, cookout facilities, outdoor tables and indoor seating, the Kiwanis Club hosted many events involving food! In addition to the Pancake Festival, the Club sponsored: Chili Cook Off, Spaghetti Dinners, Steak and Fries, Fish Fries, and Burgoo Kentucky BBQ. The Club had a tent at Mickel Field, selling beer and hotdogs for the 4th of July celebrations.



In 2005, Shirley Nolen founded the Taste of the Island event. (Her husband Rick Nolen was President of Kiwanis 1994-95.) The Kiwanis Club was in charge of setting up the tents for the event, and shared in the ticket sales revenue for many years.

For over 20 years the Kiwanis members were in charge of delivering the City's *Town Crier* publication door to door. Rex Gillenwater sold the advertising "inserts" that the club members stuffed into the plastic *Town Crier* delivery bags. All the ad revenue went back into the Kiwanis club budget. On delivery day, Buster Barton cooked breakfast at the Clubhouse for the members and then the city was divided into delivery routes.

Throughout the years, the Kiwanians also raised funds by operating a Pumpkin Patch, a Haunted House, and a Christmas Tree lot.



Other fundraising events included: Bowling for Fun, Yard Sales at the Clubhouse, a Classic Car show, Fishing Tournament, and a Golf Tournament. The monies raised from the Golf tournament funded the Broward College scholarship named for Vince Bryant. He was a long-time club member and his Carpenter's Union made a substantial donation to establish the scholarship. Those sports tournaments concluded with dinner at the Clubhouse and an awards presentation.

Renting the Clubhouse itself was another source of revenue over the years. Soon after opening, one of the first regular tenants was the local Unitarian Church—quite the contrast to the more fundamentalist religious views of many of the local Club's founders.



In the modern era Victoria Rogers, and then later Sheryl Chesler, coordinated rentals of the Clubhouse. The waterfront location hosted many high school graduation parties, birthday parties, funeral/memorial services and wedding receptions for families in the community. Sheryl Chesler also became the only female president of the Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club in 2011. [Kiwanis International became a co-ed organization in 1987.]



The proceeds from all of these events were used to fund numerous programs for the children, seniors, Police Officers, and City Employees in the community, such as:

- Quarterly school awards at Wilton Manors Elementary Bringing Up Grades, Terrific Kids, and A & AB Honor Roll
- Free immunization & booster shots for preschoolers
- Christmas presents to children in the community

- Host Fleet Week BBQ for Coast Guard and Navy service members



In the mid 1980's, the Kiwanis Club was looking to recruit younger members. They offered the Jaycee group use of the Kiwanis Clubhouse for their meetings. The Kiwanians also invited the Jaycees to various cookouts and events. Shortly thereafter the Jaycees decided to all join the Kiwanis organization. From that influx of new blood came future Kiwanis presidents Alan Clark and Bill Turner. The City acquired land on the north fork of the Middle River in 1991 for a park in the "underserved" Highland Estates neighborhood. After various setbacks the \$133,000 park was completed in 1994. The Kiwanis Club sponsored the playground and the park was renamed "Wilton Manors Kiwanis Park". It retained the name Kiwanis Park until 2003, when, after major bond-issue funded improvements and expansion, it became "Island City Park Preserve".





Over the ensuing decades, various community service organizations were formed and flourished. Then they would struggle with recruiting new members and ultimately the groups folded. The Wilton Manors community previously supported a Rotary Club, an Optimist Club, the Jaycees, the Woman's Club, and the Kiwanis Club. The Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club lasted the longest with over 74 years of service. But it too saw the end was approaching.

In 2021 the Kiwanis Club approached the City about purchasing the Clubhouse property. The City Commission was reluctant to spend money to add another property to the park system. The Club members voted to move forward with selling the waterfront property on the open market. Due to Kiwanis International ethics policy, no member of the Club could benefit monetarily from the sale of the property. Local Realtor Adrienne Foland was a member of the Club and her broker Jim Balistreri said they would handle the sale of the property for no commission / professional fee. Long time club member Jack Baxter, a real estate attorney, also donated his services to close the transaction. The property sold June 9, 2022 for \$883,100. The buyers were Lauren Massengale and David Conway (niece and uncle). As of this writing they plan to rezone the property to residential and build a home on the waterfront lot.

Preserving the Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club Legacy of Service to the Community

The Kiwanis Club membership had dwindled to a handful of people: Dave Platz-President, Alan Renzer-Treasurer, Sheryl Chesler-Secretary, Joseph Gallegos-Past President, Denise Platz, Jack Baxter, Randy Comer, Jim Wolfe, Jim Hayden, Pete Outwater, and Adrienne Foland. The group decided to donate the majority of the proceeds from the sale of the Clubhouse, **over \$430,000**, to endow scholarships through the *Broward College Foundation*.



The following new scholarships were established:

- ➤ Kiwanis Club of Wilton Manors Honors Buster Barton and Ed Miller Endowed Scholarship: awarded to aspiring public safety officers, in memory of Buster and Ed, who were business partners and charter members of the Club.
- ➤ Kiwanis Club of Wilton Manors Honors Randy Comer and David Platz Endowed Scholarship: recognizes aspiring paramedics / EMS. Randy served 31 years with Fort Lauderdale Fire Rescue and Dave served 29 years in Oakland Park Fire Rescue.
- ➤ Kiwanis Club of Wilton Manors Honors James Dean and Jim Carrol Endowed Scholarship: supports students studying nursing. James donated the land for the Clubhouse and Jim was instrumental in growing the Club membership.
- ➤ Kiwanis Club of Wilton Manors Honors Sal Bellassai Endowed Scholarship: available to any major. Celebrating the legacy of Sal, who in 1983 founded the Save-A-Life free tow home program for any impaired driver. He sponsored numerous events for the Club, specifically "Kids Day" over the years.
- Kiwanis Club of Wilton Manors Honors Adrienne Foland / Balistreri Real Estate Endowed Scholarship: supports students active in a GSA Club. Adrienne and her broker James Balistreri handled the sale of the Clubhouse.

The Club also donated **\$300,000** to the *Broward Education Foundation*. These funds are assigned as follows: \$100k for any college program; \$100k for teacher grants; and \$100k for vocational-technical scholarships.

All scholarship selection criterion for both of the two Foundation grants prioritizes Wilton Manors residents; and then Kiwanis K Club (high school Kiwanis Club) participants.

The Wilton Manors Kiwanians endowed the *Florida Kiwanis Foundation* with \$80,000 earmarked for Florida residents who participated in Kiwanis Key Club and/or Circle K. International (CKI). Students can apply funds to any college program of study.

Through these charitable endowments, the Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club will continue to support the children and young adults of this community indefinitely.

Additional proceeds were distributed to *Somerset Academy of Wilton Manors* for playground improvements and *Wilton Manors Elementary School* for a new PA system.

And in 2024, as a parting gesture of stewardship of their once-namesake "Kiwanis Park", the Kiwanians donated \$35,000 to the City's Leisure Services Department to assist in completion of funding for the new tot-lot playground installation at *Island City Park Preserve*.
