


Local Rules

The roads on 6 and 9 are out of bounds. Penalty: loss of distance.

A ball may be lifted from the hole of a burrowing animal in hazard or fairway and dropped back one club length, without penalty.

A ball may be dropped back one club length from any drain-tile or water-plug anywhere on the course without penalty.

The ball may be lifted out of ditches on 2, 3, and 5 without the loss of a stroke.



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Al Hagen arrived in Ft. Lauderdale in 1938, at the age of 41 and semi-retired. As a result of a golfing bet, in **1941** he acquired the first land he would begin developing on the **west side** of south Wilton Drive. He sold lots and built a few homes before being drafted for WW II.

Returning from the war in **1943**, Hagen purchased an **additional 40 acres** on the **east side** of south Wilton Drive. With the success of he and other post-war WM residential developers, Hagen recognized the need for commercial development to serve those new residents. Around **1948**, partnering with **contractor Clayton Leaver**, he built the first Wilton Drive business structures--at **N.E. 20th Street**. Southern-most was the *Helpy-Selfie Laundromat* (now Papa Duke's Deli). The other housed *Williams Pharmacy*, the *Tropical Club Restaurant/Lounge* and later Hagen's *Tropical Homes* expanded real estate office (now Tropics Bar and Grille).





In the **late 1940s/early 50's** Hagen also supported social and recreational activities for the community (*in addition to the entertainment offered at the Tropical Club ☺*). In **1948** he opened the **Tropical Driving Range** next door to his office building.



The site of Hagen's original real estate office across the street became an outdoor community venue known as **the Village Green**. It was the site of weekly **Barn Dances** and the famous-throughout-the-county **Village Barbeques**.

Then through **the mid-1950s** came the next wave of development on south Wilton Drive; both commercial and civic. The area became a "one-stop-shop" – catering to virtually any resident's needs.

It began with Hagen adding additional stores to the west-side *Village Green* (2000 block) site. This included an office for Clayton Leaver's **Tropical Construction** company.

Across the street, a **Food Fair** grocery store was constructed on the **Tropical Driving Range** site. This was WM's first modern chain supermarket.



A similar strip of storefronts was added to the **north of 21st Court**, on both the west and east-sides. The **west-side** is shown below.


This set of stores included the first location of the fondly-remembered **Pearce 5&10**, as well as the **first City offices** (ironically, located next to the **Village Tavern**).

With the loss of the "Village Green" and "Tropical Driving Range" sites, the ever-growing Wilton Manors needed new locations for recreation and community engagement. Again, in **1954-1956**, Alvar Hagen stepped-in. On the east side Wilton Drive at **N.E. 21st Court** he would donate land for a **park/recreation center**; as well as the site of the **Wilton Manors Woman's Club**. That area would also, a few years later, become the location of the "**new**" **Wilton Manors City Hall**.

Recreation Planners to Be Named

FORT LAUDERDALE — A committee which will plan and direct the development of a recreation center in Wilton Manors will be appointed at a council meeting Tuesday night.

The first funds with which to start the center were raised by 42 club women who collected \$1,170 in a concerted house-to-house canvass.

Mrs. Merle Owens, chairman of the drive, said funds are still coming in. The women, who called their drive "Women Walk for Recreation," had set a goal of \$1,000.

Mrs. Owens said the response was greater than expected and she expressed gratification to householders who contributed.

The center, which will be located on five lots behind the Food Fair market, eventually will have a swimming pool, basketball, tennis and shuffleboard courts and a stage.

Property for the center was donated by Alvar Hagen. It extends more than 100 feet straight back from the Food Fair market and ranges from 500 to 588 feet wide.

A committee that directed the women's solicitation met with Council President Earl R. Gurney Thursday and recommended using the money to start work on a pavilion as the first project in the center. The center, it was suggested, could be used for card parties and other activities.

Gurney said he'll appoint a committee Tuesday night which will make a study of how the center should be developed.

Since the city has no taxes, it must depend largely on contributions for money with which to build the center. Councilman Earl R. Gurney, one of the leaders in getting the recreation center started, said he expects there will be contributions of materials and possibly labor.



He emphasized that the center project is a long range one that will be completed over a period of years.

Wilton Manors has a playground at the Wilton Manors school. It now has a recreation director, Walter Libby, who has planned a summer recreation program which will be centered at the playground.
