


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## ca. 1940's postcard of Richardson Golf Course

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George Richardson, Sr. on a 1930's Worthington Golf Tractor. These tractors were made primarily from Ford Model A/B automobile engines, running gear and other parts.

George Sr. traveled the country as a golf course builder. After designing the Richardson course in 1936, the actual construction was handled by Rachel and George Jr. Rachel continued as the principal operator of the course, assisted by George Jr. and original employee Buddy Hicks, until it closed in 1956. George Jr. built the first section of the current Manor House for his new bride Helen in that same year.

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
U. S. G. A. Rules govern all play unless modified by the following:


## Local Rules

The roads on 6 and 9 are out of bounds.
Penalty: loss of distance.

- A ball may be lifted from the hole of a burrowing animal in hazard or fairway and dropped back one club length, without penalty.
- A ball may be dropped back one club length from any drain-tile or waterplug anywhere on the course without penalty.

The ball may be lifted out of ditches on 2, 3, and 5 without the loss of a stroke.
