





With the three councilmen under recall fire adamant in their stand to have their names listed jointly in the Aug. 12 recall election, and Marcia Stafford, city clerk, just as adamant that the ballot list the men separately as recommended by City Attorney William Miller Jr. and Mayor Frank Starling, "something has to give."

Questions that arise are: Does the city clerk, an elective officer, have the power to disregard a resolution passed unanimously [3-0] by City Council even if she believes it to be illegal according to City Charter provisions? Mrs. Stafford says "yes." Can she disregard a directive by City Council President Vernon Burnell ordering her to print the joint type ballot? "I will not break the law," she explained.

Since the ballot had to be in the hands of Leroy Bradford, custodian of voting machines by noon today, and any further delay in ballot-printing would deprive absentee voters of their right to vote, the controversial ballots were printed yesterday and are now available at the clerk's home, 500 NE 25th St.

Barring some last-minute action by councilmen Vern Burnell, Fred Stevens and Harold Price who rejected this ballot at Monday night's council meeting, the form will appear as follows:

"To vote for recall of City Councilmen, make a cross in square labeled "yes" opposite name of councilman. To vote against recall of a city councilman, make a cross in square labeled "No" opposite name of councilman. Shall Councilman Vernon W. Burnell be recalled? [Check yes or no]. Shall Councilman Harold T. Price be recalled? [Check yes or no]. Shall Councilman Fred T. Stevens be recalled? [Check yes or no]." According to the resolution passed on two readings last night, voters would not cast their vote for each man individually as Miller interprets the law, but would vote for or against all three.


Those opposed to the incumbents would then vote for three of the four council candidates whose names would appear on the bottom of the ballot.

Questions that arise are: Does the city clerk, an elective officer, have the power to disregard a resolution passed unanimously [3-0] by City Council even if she believes it to be illegal according to City Charter provisions? Mrs. Stafford says "yes." Can she disregard a directive by City Council President Vernon Burnell ordering her to print the joint type ballot? "I will not break the law," she explained.

Since the ballot had to be in the hands of Leroy Bradford, custodian of voting machines by noon today, and any further delay in ballot-printing would deprive absentee voters of their right to vote, the controversial ballots were printed yesterday and are now available at the clerk's home, 500 NE 25th St.

Barring some last-minute action by councilmen Vern Burnell, Fred Stevens and Harold Price who rejected this ballot at Monday night's council meeting, the form will appear as follows;

## Wilton Manors Trio Rejects **Voting Plan**

WILTON MANORS unprecedented action last night, three City Councilmen under recall fire refused to accept City Attorney William Miller Jr.'s legal opinion regarding the recall, ballot.

In open defiance, they set machinery in motion to use a joint ballot, which Miller says is unlawful according to the city charter, and could easily lead to another law suit.

According to the resolution passed on two readings last night; voters would not cast. their vote for each man individually as Miller interprets the law, but would vote for or against all three.

Those opposed to the incumbents would then vote for three of the four council candidates whose names would appear on the bottom of the ballot.

Councilman Fred Stevens, who made the motion to accept the resolution said. "We are all under recall because of our united stand in dismissing former Police Chief Richard Beaney. Therefore we should be voted on jointly."

AMBIGUOUE

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Councilman Wm. Joslin, at odds. with the three since his staunch defense of Beaney May 21. hotly protested the resolution. "Such action could invalidate the coming election. It's absolutely illegal," he contends.
