Early History Of Wilton Manors By Norman Malcolm

Like ourselves a goodly number of new as well as old residents in the Village have been curious as to the background of Wilton Manors—when it was founded and how it derived its name. Over the week-end we contacted Mr. Norman Malcolm, knowing that he has delved into the history and are indeed fortunate in getting some interesting information. On account of the length of the article it is our intention to run this information in serial form beginning with this issue.

Goggin Services Held Monday

The many friends of Charles F. Goggin were shocked to learn of his death by heart attack last Thursday. Funeral services were held Monday from St. Anthony's Catholic Church with the Rev. John J. O'Looney officiating. Burial was at Lauderdale Memorial Park. Fannin Funeral Home was in charge.

The deceased was 62 years of age and had been a private policeman at Harbor Beach subdivision.

Mr. Goggin, who came to Fort Lauderdale six years ago, was stricken at 6 p. m. Thursday as he was awaiting night patrol duty at Harbor Beach. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Broward General hospital.

Born in New York City, he was a retired athletic supervisor for the City of Chicago parks division.

He was a member of St. Anthony's Catholic parish, and the William C. Morris post No. 36, American Legion.

Survivors include his wife Jane; a son Charles F., Jr., both of Fort Lauderdale; three brothers, Thomas, Cairo, N. Y., Frank New York City and John E., Coral Gables and a sister, Rita Goggin of New York City.

The Village of Wilton Manors has built up rapidly during the past two years, and is still growing. Many people think the Village has a bright future. But, what of its past? Many of the present residents are newcomers and they may not have thought it has a past. Perhaps it was just another case of arrested development remaining from the days of The Boom which left old cement sidewalks and rusty light standards in the strangest of places.

After pondering this subject your inquiring reporter decided it should be investigated and requested an acquaintance, who is a bit of an antiquarian who loves to thumb over old records, to investigate and here are some facts from his report.

The first deed on record involving present Wilton Manors was executed in 1890. Any present resident can quiet his doubts about this date by a careful reading of his abstract of title. It came about as a step in the romantic story of the reclamation of the mangrove swamps and sand dunes and their transformation into the present day Mecca for tourists and Elysian Fields for year 'round residents.

A Catholic church to be known as Our Lady of the Assumption will be built to seat 700 persons just south of Pompano on A1A as soon as a government permit is available.

The building, which is being designed by an architect will be located on a section of the seven and a half acres recently purchased by the church from M. A. Hortt. Future plans will call for a school and a convent. The land is located just north of Pop's trailer camp.

Ian MacDougall, graduate architect, has been appointed building inspector to replace Keith Padgett, who has resigned because of ill health.

He will handle the structural inspection while Neil Pridemore will check electrical and plumbing facilities.

MacDougall comes from Lans Downe, Pa. and is a graduate of Penn State. He was formerly employed by an architect in Fort Lauderdale.

A petition to validate public improvement revenue certificates in the amount of \$160,000 is on file today in circuit court from the city of Pompano Beach.

The money will be used to acquire and improve park and recreational facilities in the North Broward city. The utility tax of the municipality is pledged to retire the certificates.

The whereabouts of a man identified as Jasper Rawlins, 36, reported missing from his home since last Friday remain unknown according to the Sheriff's office.

When last seen Rawlins was wearing a white undershirt, dungarees, rubber boots and a brown work cap. He was driving a 1940 Plymouth two-door sedan. Rawlins was described by police as about six feet, three inches tall, weighing 176 pounds and having brown hair. When last seen he was at a dairy west of Hollywood about 6 p. m. Friday.

City Manager H. P. Edmund has been authorized by the City Commission to make application to the National Production Board for permission to build a new \$30,000 public library. The request is in line with a Federal regulation requiring approval of the NPA on all building, other than residences, not considered essential to the national defense program.

Edmond stated that every effort will be made to obtain approval of the request which has been proposed as a memorial to war veterans and to be erected at the corner of N. E. 13th Ave. and Atlantic Blvd. on a site donated by W. L. Kester. An appropriation of \$10,000 toward the cost of the building has been included in the city's new budget.

POMPANO NEW POST OFFICE LOOKS DIM

The chances of a new post office for Pompano Beach appear dim according to a letter received from Rep. Dwight L. Rogers who explained that the federal government has not built any such buildings since the end of World War II.

Replying to a query from the Chamber of Commerce, Rogers wrote in part:

"I wish I could tell you that the federal government would build a new post office there right away, but Congress has not appropriated funds for such building since the end of the war.

"I might state that your city is on the eligible list for a new post office in the amount of \$150,000 but, of course, until Congress appropriates funds for this purpose no building can be done.

"I fully realize your need and want to assure you that as soon as Congress gives the 'green light' for the building of new post offices, I shall do what I can to see that Pompano Beach gets one as soon as possible.

"Meanwhile, I have taken up the matter of a postal contract station in the negro section and home carrier service and will advise you as soon as I have further information."

Cash Registers

Recovered by Police

Police reported that two of three cash registers stolen here in the past few weeks have been recovered in damaged condition.

A register owned by a machine shop on Old Dixie Highway was found about three miles west of town in a canal bed.

A one mill increase over that levied last year, due to operating expenses, is the tentative set-up for this year's budget. The budget calling for a ten mill tax rate will be presented to the city commission Tuesday morning (tax gross time is Monday night). The new tax roll as proposed shows an increase of \$2,000,000 over last year.

A breakdown of the items in the budget will be released Tuesday, and a public hearing to receive any objections will be held August 14. The Commissioners, all farsighted and conscientious men who have Pompano Beach at heart, after deep study feel that nothing can be omitted from the budget if Pompano Beach keeps pace with its growth.

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
