Wilton Manors To Annex Highland Estates by Big Vote

County Election Defeated

The voters of both Wilton Manors and Highland Estates by an overwhelming majority placed their stamp of approval on the annexation of Highland Estates and other areas to the Village of Wilton Manors at a special election held Tuesday, August 7th. Of 97 votes cast in Wilton Manors, the electorate voted "for" 88 and "against" 9.

In Highland Estates there were 83 votes cast and of this number 78 voted "for" and 5 "against."

The bill for the levying of three-tenths of a mill in additional taxes, with the money to be turned over to the Broward County Economic Development Commission was defeated in the Village by the vote of 57 "against" and 45 "for."

The annexation will take the usual course, first by certification by the election board to the Village Council who in turn will introduce an ordinance to accept Highland Estates as a part of Wilton Manors.

The first voter in Wilton Manors early Tuesday was Elmer Millman of 425 N. E. 25th street while Mrs. Kathryn Burns of 817 N. E. 28th street cast the first ballot in Highland Estates Civic Club.

The annexation election officials at Wilton Manors were Mrs. Clayton Leaver, Chairman; Mrs. Mabyrn Thomas, Mrs. James Boyd and Mr. Ray Coleman.

Those serving on the election board in Highland Estates included E. W. McGuire, Chairman; Mrs. Dan Kingman and Mrs. Nettie Lintom.

Those serving as election officials for the County election were: W. P. Hartman, Chairman; Mrs. A. B. Wilkerson, Mrs. Morgan Bryan and Mrs. Harley Sanderson.

The first time the question of annexation came to notice was when a group of interested citizens from Highland Estates appeared before the Council at the May meeting which was held in Village Hall.

This delegation was headed by Ed Smith, who appeared as spokesman and asked the Council for an invitation to annex with Wilton Manors. A short time later a petition was presented to the Council with 149 signatures affixed from residents of Highland Estates favoring such a move. At the present time there are approximately 110 families in Highland Estates with a population of about 350.

At the present time Highland Estates has its own water system and volunteer fire department.

The water question which the Council has been doing preliminary study on for some time has been held in abeyance until the results of this election is known. It is expected now, that shortly, a special meeting will be called to delve into the water supply for the Village.

 "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one toward another."—John 13:35.

Most all organizations have some sort of emblem that separates them and makes them known to all, but the true Christian's emblem and the thing that identifies him is Love. Love not only for God but lover for his fellow man. Love that shines through all and to all. Love that manifests itself in the Christian's every word and deed.

"Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels and have not love, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling symbol, and though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mystery and have all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains and have not LOVE, I am nothing." Paul in these verses tells us that great truth, that no matter how great our faith, no matter how wise we are, no matter how great our knowledge of the Scriptures, if we do not have love in our hearts we are nothing.

"And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor"; even our charity is for nothing if we have not love in our hearts. Acts of mercy are commendable in themselves but without the Love of God in our hearts they are nothing.

Christ's commandments to his children were "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul and with all thy mind . . . And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." As our love for God grows, so does our love for our fellow man.
