Water Supply Discussed With Oakland Park

ZONING BOARD PROTEST MEETING TO BE CALLED

The question of the zoning of the former Middleton Gardens area came before the Zoning and Planning commission in the form of a petition presented by the residents of the area who protested against a contemplated cement plant to be erected on property adjacent to the Florida East Coast Railway.

Representatives from the protesting area were present and voiced their objections in no uncertain terms.

The Maule Industries representatives were in attendance and advanced their arguments that erection of such a plant should be permitted as railroad property is considered to be industrial property. (Already the west side of the railroad is zoned for industry.)

After wide discussion, pro and con, members of the Commission are asking the Village Council to call a meeting at which time the question can be publicly discussed as to whether or not Wilton Manors wants industry within its domains.

The members of the Zoning Board are chairman, James Dean, Perry Mickel, Francis Gates and Robert

It is expected that the Council will call a meeting for discussion of this subject.

Lions Club Sponsors Drive For Blind

Preparations for the most extensive blind and sight seal drive by the blind and sight committee of the Downtown Lions Club of Fort Lauderdale were started by meeting of workers from the club and the Lions Auxiliary at the Lions Club house on S. W. Tenth St. Tuesday night. The seals are distributed by the national blind and sight committee.

Members of the committee include H. C. Mathews, chairman, Ben Short and Jack Monahan.

Mathews announced that the tentative opening date of the campaign has been set for Nov. 24, when the organization will begin mailing out the seals.

The proceeds of this drive will be used in helping the blind and sight-handicapped, and for conserving the vision of those whose sight is impaired.

During the 1950-1 school year the eyes of over 2,000 local school children were tested by the Lions Club visual survey, under the personal direction of Mrs. Walter G. Sabey. Approximately 20 percent of those tested were found to have defective eyesight. The parents of those with defective vision were immediately notified. Careful records are kept and when necessary further examinations and treatment, as well as glasses, are made available to needy persons.

Mathews calls attention to the adopted slogan of the drive "Be Thankful! You Can See," and urges every person in Fort Lauderdale to cooperate in helping to minimize defective vision and blindness amongst our children.

Representatives from the Council, President Al Hagen and Village Attorney Robinson, Council Member Art Chabot and Harold Brothier attended a meeting of the Oakland Park Council, Wednesday, November 7th for the purpose of conferring on the supplying of water to Wilton Manors.

In view of the fact that Mayor Dewey Hawkins was not present no definite action could be taken, however the various ramifications of the water problem was discussed with other members of the Oakland Park Council.

It was brought out in the conference, that Oakland Park could and would gladly supply water to the Village at a wholesale rate of twenty-two and a half cents per 1,000 gallons over a long term period of 25 years, if the Village so determined that they would enter into an agreement for this period.

As ground for the new Oakland Park plant was broken only on October 31st, it will be approximately four months before their plant will be completed.

Following the Oakland Park conference a meeting of members of the Council and Water committee of the Village was held, together with Michael Marinelli of the Inter-County Construction Corporation at which time discussion was held as to the most economical and feasible arrangement for providing a distribution system for the Village at this particular time in order to get the project started.

The water question has been the predominate business before the Village Council. Various plans and surveys have been made by the engineers and deep study has been given the problem by the Council.

Particular study will be given to get part of the distribution operation under way as soon as possible. It is expected that one phase of the question will be the consideration of getting estimates for the laying of a six inch main on 26th Street, connecting with the Oakland Park system.

Although the Oakland Park system would not be operating until the first of the year, it is possible that this community could supply water to the Village from their present suppliers in the event both communities entered into an agreement and on completion of the Oakland Park system, water could be supplied directly by that municipality to the Village.

With the installation of city water there is no question that building operations in the Village would boom.

A further discussion of the water question will be taken up at the meeting of the Council this Friday night.

THE PASTOR'S STUDY

"Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment: because as He is, so are we in this world."—1 John 4:17.

God's love toward us is made perfect in Christ Jesus. God in love embraces us when we receive the pardon from sin which he freely offers through the atoning work of the Cross. If we confess that Jesus is our Saviour from sin, then is God's love made complete in our lives. And because that love is made perfect, we have boldness in the day of judgment. If we believe, there is for us no condemnation, no judgment.

There is a story told of a man who was on trial for his life. He had friends with influence, and they obtained a pardon for him from the king with the stipulation that he was to go through with the trial and be condemned. He went into court with the pardon in his pocket. The feeling ran very high against him and the judge said that the court was shocked that he was so unconcerned, so nonchalant, so carefree, especially for a man who had a death sentence staring him in the face. He was condemned: but, when the sentence was pronounced, he pulled out the pardon, presented it, and walked out a free man. He had been pardoned, and so have we. Why then should we fear death and the judgment? IF we have believed in the Son of God, we have life eternal, not the everlasting punishment of hell.

Some would say there is no hell, but the grave is the end. However, God's Word plainly teaches that there is a hell, a place of everlasting torment for those who reject His Son. Hell is as real as Heaven. Eternal Death and torment is as real as Eternal Life and happiness. The sentence for sin against God (and we have all sinned against Him) is Death and Hell; but with a pardon from God our King written in the Story of the Cross of Calvary, we can and do stand boldly in the day of judgment. Have you accepted this pardon offered by Jesus Christ?

Schneider Nursery Has Fine Collection

Happened to drop into the nursery at 2109 Wilton Drive which is being conducted by Mr. and Mrs. George Schneider, and found out that this nursery is well stocked with many unusual plants.

One of the unusual type is the sensitive plant, which when touched collapses and in a few minutes erects itself. Then there was the Chinese Lan Lang tree, which is a native of China. This tree is used for the manufacture of perfume. One blossom from this bush perfumes the entire house. Then we saw some black raspberry bushes, imported from India, which bear fruit for 8 months during the winter. Here is an opportunity to have fresh berries right in your back yard. We next saw real Philippine tea plants and Brazilian coffee plants which produce in this area. Other oddities included the chocolate pudding tree, the egg fruit, peanut, cardle nut, cashew nut, pickle, carambola, camphor, star apple, ear, trumpet, and the famous strawberry or munting tree.
