We will all agree the project of the beautification of Wilton Drive has been delayed and that this project was started some months ago however we must understand one thing regarding this project, first it is being done by the county with the recommendation of our County Commissioner Richard T. Gallion. One must realize that the county has only a certain amount of equipment to use for the entire county and I have been promised by Mr. Gallion when the equipment is available to complete the project he will have it moved in.

I will agree however it has been a rather long drawn out affair but since I have been rather severely criticized by some of the residents of Wilton Manors I would like these residents to know just what the real story is on this project.

I am the one that is responsible for the starting of this beautification project. First I took the project before the Village Council and it was approved by that body 100%. Then it was taken to the Civic Club, The Business Men's Club, The Woman's Club and the Kiwanis Club, all of these organizations was also for this project. A committee was formed one from each group and it was agreed

## COUNCIL MEET ON WATER PROBLEM

The water distribution question which has been before the people of the Village for some time, was again discussed at a special meeting held at the offices of Tropical Homes, last Friday night. (There being a Girl Scout meeting at Village Hall).

The Village Council have given hours and hours of study on this perplexing question and are trying to work out the most feasible and economical plan for the Village.

Black and Associates Engineers, who were engaged by the Council to make a survey were present to outline their plan for the installation of a distribution system whereby the present homes could be taken care of with a supply of city water. Such installation of a distribution system would cost in the neighborhood of \$60,000. The money for the same would be raised by floating a bond issue to be amortized over a period of years.

It was suggested that a rate of \$2.50 be charged the residents of the community for a minimum of 5,000 gallons monthly. In the event such a plan is followed out a meter installation fee with connections to the home would be \$40.00.

With the installation of city water, the use of water softeners, which many homes and business establishments now have would be eliminated, this would be a saving to the people, according to the Council.

F. A. Ogden, representative of B. J. Van Ingman and Co., bonding house, was present and suggested to Council that a canvass of the home owners in the community be made so that the Council would know the exact number of residents who would wish to be supplied by water. This would expedite the raising of money for the distribution system.

Council President Hagen suggested that the Civic Association take over the matter of canvassing the residents.

The question of the supply of water for the Village was discussed at length. Meetings have been held with Oakland Park officials as a possible supplier of water. No definite commitments have been received from that municipality as their election of officials was held only on Monday of this week. In preliminary conferences, Oakland Park had quoted a price of twenty-two and one-half cents per one thousand gallons on a wholesale rate and later raised that figure to twenty-five cents. It is felt that a compromise can be effected between the two municipalities as to the cost and duration of contract.

## Zoning Referendum Vote Saturday, December 8th

### PUBLIC NOTICE

In order to clarify the resolution, passed by the Village Council, for the referendum vote on the zoning to be held this Saturday, December 8th, we print the following:

Any resident of the Village of Wilton Manors who is registered on the Village election books is eligible to vote.

Also, any one who is a qualified elector on the County registration books who is a resident of Wilton Manors up to and including December 6th is also eligible to vote on the referendum.

The reason the resolution mentioned the above paragraph was to enable those living in the old areas of Highland Estates and Middleton Gardens be eligible. If this was not done, those residents would not be able to participate in the referendum as "legally" they would not have been residents of the Village for the required time. Hence these residents are made eligible if their names appear on the Broward County registration books.

The polls at Village Hall are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Saturday, December 8th, is the date that the electorate of Wilton Manors will cast their referendum vote as to whether or not they wish to have industry in the Village.

Maule Industries, one of the largest and most progressive concerns in South Florida have made application for permission to erect a plant on the outermost boundaries of the Village—adjacent to railroad property, which is considered as industrial property, but has not been zoned.

The Maule representatives, appearing before the Village authorities have stated that their plant will NOT be an eye sore to the community. They have stated that the equipment to be installed is of the most modern and that machinery installed will be of a dust proof nature. The driveways in and out of the plant will be concreted and sprinkled intermittently during the day so as to insure the elimination of any possible dust. All of the conveyors and batchers will be sealed, in order to eliminate any possible dust.

The Bulletin has talked with the General Manager, Mr. F. K. Foster who again reiterates that their plant will not be a detriment to the area but an asset, in view of the fact that it is adjacent to the railroad.

Mr. Foster again states that there will be no Sunday work, there will be no rock crushing equipment and that there will be no cement block plant at the contemplated location.

The General Manager of Maule Industries further pointed out that the contemplated plant would cost between \$150,000 and \$200,000 and would have a payroll of a quarter of a million dollars yearly. This in itself, he states, would be a tremendous asset to the merchants in the Village.

During the past week The Bulletin has interviewed business men and residents and we can sincerely say that a good majority feel differently than they first did—because rumors were first presented.

One important thing that the home owner should consider when going to the polls Saturday and that is—when taxation comes to Wilton Manors Maule Industries plant would certainly help considerably in lightening the load on the home owner.

To point out that there is a decided need for industry, only in the past few months the Broward County Economic Commission was set up to invite industry to locate in the area.

Whether the Maule Industries erects a plant in Wilton Manors, east of the railroad or moves a few hundred feet north, their trucks will still use the roads and if there is any possibility of dust we will get the same from such a short removed distance.

Don't forget to vote whether for or against on Saturday.

## DOG ORDINANCE TO BE ENFORCED

All persons in the Village owning dogs are warned that the new dog ordinance is now in effect and will be enforced. The ordinance calls for the vaccination of dogs and filing the certificate of vaccination with the Chief of Police.

All dogs shall be vaccinated annually before August 1st of each year. Any owner who fails to comply with the ordinance is subject to a fine not exceeding \$25.00.

by this committee to have the cleaning up done first and as you all know to this date it has not been completed. I have been promised a donation by the Broward Quarry's and Wright & Son for 40 yards of stone to be placed for the parking area outside of the pavement, however this amount will not be enough to cover the area and I feel the Village and the county should see that the balance required to finish the project should be obtained. We also have been promised shrubs to plant between the trees that are now along the drive after the cleaning up job is completed.

Since this project has been started I have talked to Mr. Gallion several times and my last talk with him was on Nov. 30th and he told me he would take the matter up with the foreman in charge of the equipment and see when the equipment could be moved in to finish the project and he will let me know when we could expect the work to be finished.

I have asked the Mayor, the President of the Council and the members of the Civic Club to join me in asking for the completion of this project and up to Nov. 30th Mr. Gallion had not been in contact regarding this project with any of the above. He even had the idea he was doing this project for me and did not understand it was being done for Wilton Manors, however he was told I was only acting as chairman of the committee that was formed by the above groups in Wilton Manors and the project was for Wilton Manors and no special individual.

In your edition of Nov. 29th Mr. Foster speaks of the concrete plant being of the most modern construction, the grounds will be landscaped and will be an asset to the area. I have never seen any concrete plant that could be called a structure of beauty or an asset to any community and I have constructed a great number of just this type of plant. Mr. Foster adds that the merchants in Wilton Manors are complaining about the dust from the project of cleaning up Wilton Drive. There is no such thing as eliminating dust at one of these plants.
