Zoning Election Officially Accepted

On recommendation of Village Attorney Robinson, the official count of the election board on the recent zoning election was accepted by the Council at their recent meeting. The vote as certified was 125 for and 121 against.

A letter from Maule Industries asking for an occupational license was ordered issued with a proviso that the Maule company refrain from using 26th Street as a haul from their Prospect Road plant.

It was mentioned by members of Council and Mr. Earl Gurney that the company in their first request stated they would refrain from having their trucks use 26th Street as this area is used by school children.

Mr. Chobot of the Council stated that he was sure that the Maule organization would cooperate and that we should make the company feel that they were welcome to the Village in view of the vote of the people.

Recommendation for the exercising of an option of \$500 for the purchase of a water plant from Naples, Florida was passed by the Village Council at their meeting last Friday night. The total price of the plant is approximately \$4,000 and would have a capacity of pumping 350,000 gallons a day.

Village Attorney Robinson has already made an inspection of the plant and feels that it is a good solution to the water question of the community, in view of the fact that at present the Village authorities can not seem to arrive at any definite agreement with Oakland Park for supplying water at this time.

The Village Attorney and other members of the Council have met with Oakland Park officials at various times and no solution has come forth from these meetings. Mr. Robinson felt that as the question has been hanging fire for some months and that if the Village did not exercise the Naples option they would lose out on a good plant at a reasonable figure. He stated, however, that in the event that some sound agreement could be worked out shortly with Oakland Park that the Village would not lose the \$500 option money.

The council appointed Dan Kingman, Norman Malcom and Engineer C. K. Davis as a committee to select well fields and to report back at a special meeting which will be called shortly.

The water question has been before the people for months and the Council has had various reports and surveys made as to the most economical and feasible distribution system. One thing is that they certainly should be commended for their serious consideration which they have given to this problem as they have given deep study to the various ramifications involved in such a project.

**THE WOMAN'S WORLD—**

Sometimes a most unglamorous job gives a woman the feeling she's right in the middle of history-in-the-making.

That's the way it is with gray-haired Agnes Joyce . . . a powder room she, "it's not the job, it's the location." matron for the past 20 years. Says

A bit more than 20 years ago, Mrs. Joyce read in the paper that the tallest building in the world was going up on Fifth Avenue between 33rd and 34th streets in New York City. "I'd like to work there," said Mrs. Joyce to herself, "there'll be a lot of excitement around the Empire State building." And she promptly filed an application with the employment bureau.

Three days before the building opened for business, Mrs. Joyce got a telegram, telling her to report to work. She'd already been on all 41 of the rented floors of the 102 story building and looked out at the city from all four sides before the opening day ceremonies. And came the opening day itself, there was Mrs. Joyce, on the Fifth Avenue side, watching Al Smith and Franklin Roosevelt cut the ceremonial ribbon. Mrs. Joyce says there was a tremendous crowd there that day . . . and many of the on-lookers were important people. But the powder room matron felt as big as any of them. This was her building now, and most of the onlookers were outsiders.

Twenty years have gone by, and now the Empire State Building corporation has honored Mrs. Joyce. Together with vice presidents and other building executives who've been with the organization for 20 years, Mrs. Joyce has received a gold medal decorated with a die-cut picture of the Empire State building, and a clock with her name engraved on it, and the date the building opened, May first, 1931.

Such ceremonies, short as they are, stir up memories of years past. Many famous people have come to the Empire State building for ceremonial or business reasons, and Mrs. Joyce has seen most of them. She says the big building has a nervous system—the elevators. And as soon as word gets out someone important has come calling, the news travels like lightning through the shafts via the operators, and all the building personnel are ready to get in on the event. And there's always an elevator ready to take them there—a special car set aside by the starter for charladies, matrons, porters, and other maintenance people.

The most exciting visit for Mrs. Joyce was the time Pope Pius the 12th was the guest of Al Smith. "He was Cardinal Pacelli (pa-cheil'-ee), then," say Mrs. Joyce. "I was on my knees when he came. And I've never been so thrilled."

Then there was the time she saw the Duke of Windsor, but that was a little disappointing. The Duke was handsome and gay, but he'd just given up his throne for Wally Simpson, and Wally wasn't with him. Says Mrs. Joyce, "I did so want a look at her, too."

She remembers holding her breath for what seemed like a half an hour when three daredevils did a three-ply handstand on the narrow parapet a quarter of a mile above the street in 1934. And meeting a breathless little man on the stairway, just three steps before the 80th floor landing. She asked the obvious question, "why didn't you take the elevator?" And nearly collapsed herself when the small-towner replied, "it pulled out just as I got there, so I thought I'd better walk."

working in a building that rises a distance equal to seven and a half city blocks into the sky... a climatic one. Says Mrs. Joyce, "you never know what the weather's like on the street. Suppose you're on the 94th floor. It's raining there, so you take on umbrella with you to lunch. Then you feel like a fool because the sun is shining brightly and nobody else is carrying an umbrella."

Somehow Mrs. Joyce has missed the tragedies that happen every once in a while in the world's tallest building. Though a number of people have jumped or fallen from its high stories, she's never seen one. And she was on vacation when the plane crashed into its 86th floor in 1945.

She says, "I did see the offices afterward, but they were all cleared out." And she adds, "I felt shaken up by the idea for a while, but I'm sure it will never happen again."

Asked if she finds many valuables in the big building powder rooms, the 62-year-old matron replied, "Oh, I find hundreds of dollars worth of rings and bracelets and wallets every year. But the people always come back for them. As soon as they discover their losses they remember they've been to the Empire State building. It's a building you just can't overlook."
