Village Attorney W. J. Robinson is meeting with the engineering firm of Black and Associates for furthering of plans on the water distribution system for the Village. Mr. Robinson will visit Gainesville some time this week.

Already the Village has forwarded a check of \$500 to the City of Naples, exercising the option on a water plant owned by that municipality. Naples is ready to deliver the equipment to the Village as soon as Wilton Manors officials are ready to take definite action.

One report from Black and Associates, Survey Engineers, has stated that the estimated cost for the installation of the system based on the possibility of receiving water from Oakland Park would be \$67,910.

Since this report, however, the Village officials feel that the installation of the Village own pumping plant and distribution system would be more economical and feasible. This led to the exercising of the Naples option. A committee has been appointed to select possible well fields for the Village. Another reason advanced by the Village officials for having our own plant is the lack of being able to work out a harmonious agreement with Oakland Park officials on the purchase of water from that municipality.

The financing of such a system would be arranged through the floating of a bond issue to be amortized over a period of years, through water revenue from the home owner. It has been learned by The Bulletin that several citizens in the community are interested in raising funds for private financing of the system, although no official notice of this phase of the question has come before the Council.

To date only 25 people in the community have sent in their coupons to The Bulletin, stating that they desired city water.

The Council urgently requests that other residents who have neglected to fill out the coupon, which follows, to kindly do so in order that an accurate number of prospective water users can be determined for information for the bonding company.

TELEPHONE COMPANY TO DOUBLE FACILITIES

An expenditure of more than a present telephone facilities in Pompano Beach has been authorized by The Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company.

District Manager Ernest N. Orr, Jr., points out that 300 new phones will be installed by February to provide service for more than half of the 565 applicants for telephones.

The installation of additional equipment has been under consideration for more than two years, Orr said. He added that the rapid growth of Pompano Beach in the last few years has made it necessary to double the service.

Plans call for the installation of telephone cables from the office in the center of town to the beach. The present phone building housing dialing equipment will be enlarged.

Within the year the number of telephones will be increased by approximately 1,500 to bring the total well over 3,000.

OAKLAND PARK MAN TO BE ARRAIGNED IN FEDERAL COURT

Friday, according to all reports, Constable Wayburn K. Mitchell will be arraigned in Federal District Court in Miami on a charge of conspiracy to violate the Internal Revenue liquor law.

Mitchel surrendered to the U. S. marshal's office in Miami Friday, posted a \$2,500 bond and was released for appearance next Friday.

The indictment against Mitchell was returned by a federal grand jury the latter part of December after alcohol tax unit agents submitted information on the case to the jurors.

The indictment resulted from a raid last May here in which his two brothers, Carl L. and Doyle L., and three Negroes, Riley Jones, Jesse Mounds and Lonzie Simmons, were seized by the agents.

An agent said today that information obtained last spring involved Mitchell and subsequent investigation resulted in the information against him being placed before the grand jury.

Agents seized 290 gallons of moonshine whiskey and the arrests were made in Doyle Mitchell's house located about 400 yards from the constable's house at a dead end street.

The agents said it was impossible for anyone to drive to Doyle's house without passing Mitchell's although the constable told them he had no knowledge of moonshining activities there.

Wayburn appeared at Doyle's house while the agents were there but claimed he had come to feed hogs he was raising in a pen at the rear of the house.

Doyle's house was used as a distribution point, the agents believe. They did not locate a still although there were indications a still had been set up in the house at one time.

They said they believed the moonshining ring had been in operation five months prior to the May raid. Mitchell will continue as constable until and unless he is convicted or suspended by Gov. Fuller Warren.

REV. J. BRAGAN SPEAKER AT KIWANIS
