## WATER SUPPLY FOR VILLAGE STILL UNSOLVED BY COUNCIL; OAKLAND PARK REJECTS CONTRACT

The Village Council held a special meeting last Friday night for the  
purpose of considering a proposed water supply contract, reportedly ap-  
proved by the City of Oakland Park, whereby water would be supplied to  
the Village by that municipality.

At the opening of the session a petition bearing signatures of 99  
individual freeholders, all in favor of constructing a water supply plant in  
Wilton Manors, was presented to the Council. The petition was accepted  
by the Council and discussed by that body as well as the proponents.

Village Attorney Robinson gave a comprehensive summary of the  
water question which has been hanging fire since last May. He pointed  
out the long study which the Council has given to the question to provide  
a city water system.

### BEGINNING OF SURVEY

When the water question was first discussed, the Council had a house-  
to-house canvass made throughout the Village. This survey showed that the  
residents of the community were practically 100% in favor of having  
city water. The Council engaged Black and Associates Engineers from  
Gainesville for submitting engineering surveys of the problem. In addition  
negotiations were entered into with a reputable bonding house to provide  
financing on a revenue bond basis.

As the quantity of water used in the beginning would be small, it  
was considered inadvisable to construct our own distribution system, but  
to buy water on a wholesale basis from either Fort Lauderdale or Oakland  
Park, who was then constructing its own system. Fort Lauderdale declined  
to enter into any contractual agreement due to the fact that they were  
unable to take care of their own needs. Oakland Park was willing to enter  
into an agreement, but wanted a 25-year contract at 25c per one thousand  
gallons.

### COUNCIL SEEKS OTHER FACILITIES

In the meantime, the Village Council found and examined a water  
treatment plant with the capacity of delivering 350 thousand gallons per  
day. This plant was being used by the City of Naples and had only been  
in use a short time, being replaced due to the increased growth of that  
community.

Village Attorney Robinson and Engineer Davis made an inspection  
of the plant in Naples and the Attorney was able to secure a 90-day option  
at \$500.00 for the protection of the Village, in the event they considered  
the installation of their own water plant. The total price of this plant  
was approximately \$4,000. As a result of this and subsequent meetings  
with Oakland Park officials, that municipality made a concession of selling  
water to the Village at the rate of 22 and one-half cents per one thousand  
gallons.

Mr. Robinson, at the Friday meeting, pointed out the importance of  
arriving at some settlement of this long discussed question as soon as  
possible. He stated that there are several development projects in the  
Village which only await a city water supply. One of these is in the former  
Middleton Gardens area and the other is in the vicinity of Andrews Avenue  
near Lazy Lake. Another development is Tropical Gardens along the South  
Fork of Middle River.

### SUNSET MANOR DEVELOPMENT

That the Sunset Manor development of Harold Broliar is rapidly  
progressing was pointed out as an additional need for concrete action.  
This development has already sold well over 100 homes out of approximately  
167, all to be completed this year, but city water is a necessary condition.  
The present houses on this development obtain water from former High-  
land Estates. Mr. Broliar, the contractor, has already agreed to lay at  
his own expense, nearly a mile of 6" pipe in 26th Street, with laterals,  
from Old Dixie Highway to Andrews Avenue and to be reimbursed by  
the Village out of water revenue over a period of ten years when the  
pipes would become the property of the Village and part of its distribution  
system.

### ENGINEERS' REPORTS

Black and Associates Engineers, employed by the Village, have sub-  
mitted two reports on design and cost of a water distribution system and  
the Council has authorized them to proceed with detailed plans for the  
same so bids may be obtained at the earliest possible moment.

The basis of the engineers' reports are as follows:

There are now approximately 160 users of city water in Highland  
Estates area and adjacent to Old Dixie and Middleton Gardens, supplied  
by water from Fort Lauderdale. These users would automatically become  
part of the Wilton Manors system. The engineers further estimate that of  
the 266 houses now having their own wells at least 200 of them would take  
city water, when available, making 360 users at the start.

### THE BULLETIN CONDUCTS CANVASS

The Wilton Manors Bulletin has published coupons in the paper re-  
questing residents to sign up for city water. To date approximately 50 resi-  
dents have sent these coupons in to the paper, all in favor, with one  
exception. During the past week the Civic Association has started a canvass  
to secure additional signatures to the full number of 200 or more if possible  
as evidence that city water is really wanted in fact and not in theory. Some  
50 additional names have been secured during the past week and efforts  
will be continued along these lines.

### ENGINEERS REQUESTED TO ESTIMATE

The engineers have been requested to supply estimates of the cost of  
our own plant and the cost of producing water. It seems generally agreed  
that with the favorable factors of a well field, offered by Maule Industries  
at \$1.00 per year, together with the advantages of the Naples water

treating plant equipment at a favorable price, the plant could be built within \$25,000. Estimates for the producing of water have varied from 15c to 28½c per one thousand gallons.

**OAKLAND PARK CONTRACT CONSIDERED**

Following Mr. Robinson's comprehensive summary, the petition of 99 signers was laid aside and consideration given to the contract offered by Oakland Park. The contract was considered—first, that it should be read in full and a vote taken upon the form of the contract and second, that a later resolution should be taken to authorize the signature of the contract if the form was acceptable.

After the contract was read and form approved by a vote of 4 to 1, Councilman J. Marvin Brown voting "NO."

The Council then proceeded consideration of other Village matters and the petitioners withdrew. Before adjournment of the meeting a courier delivered a communication from the City of Oakland Park, withdrawing the approval of the contract—leaving the negotiations "as is" for the present.

EDITOR'S NOTE: From reliable sources, it is understood that a petition will be presented shortly to the Council calling for a referendum of the freeholders on the construction of Wilton Manors own water plant.

To Be Presented**

It is expected at the next council meeting the following petition will be presented:

We, the undersigned property owners of the Village of Wilton Manors, Broward County, Florida, hereby respectfully request the Village Council to enact a complete zoning ordinance for the Village of Wilton Manors along the lines of zoning ordinances in adjoining communities; further that pending the passage of such a zoning ordinance, the Village Council instruct the Zoning Board and the Building Department that no permits shall be issued in the Village of Wilton Manors for any structure other than single family residences, without prior approval of the Village Council and of a majority of the property owners within 1,000 feet of the property in question.
