Civic Association Discusses Pertinent Problems

A large crowd was in attendance at the meeting of the Civic Association on Monday night with President Frank Hainey presiding.

Norman Malcolm, chairman of the membership committee, reported that 12 new members had joined the Association, the majority of whom were present at the meeting.

Interesting discussion was held on civic matters, particularly the status of the water question for the Village.

Past President Francis Gates reported that the registration books for voters will be at his home, 2105 N. Dixie Highway between February 18th and March 1st. Mr. Gates pointed out that to vote in either County or National elections an elector must be a resident of the State for one year and six months in the county.

Robert Newton was appointed to head up the Bar-B-Q committee and to set the date for holding of the same at the discretion of the committee.

BROWN EXPLAINS VILLAGE VOTE

Councilman J. Marvin Brown gave a talk on the requirements necessary for an elector to vote in the Village election and also qualifications necessary to be a candidate.

Mr. Brown quoted ordinance No. 6 of the Village which stated that any elector must be at least 21 years of age, live in the Village for six months and if un-registered has the opportunity of registering within 5 days preceding the election.

He further stated that anyone 21 years of age or older may be a candidate providing they file their application with the Village Clerk, 10 days before election, stating the particular office for which they wish to qualify and that they must prove they have been residents of the Village for at least six months.

Editor's Note: No state residential period of time was mentioned in the ordinance.

Voters Attention Report Missing Cards

Supervisor of Registration Mrs. E. L. Gates announces that any person who believes he is a registered voter in Broward and has not received a card to that effect was asked Saturday to contact her office.

Mrs. Gates explained that cards have been sent to every voter on the registration lists. If a voter has not received a card it means the wrong mailing address is listed on the books.

Listing of proper mailing and residence addresses was only one of the reasons the cards were mailed in all voters.

The county also wants to find out if any women have changed their names by marriage or if property status of any voter has changed and also if any registered voters no longer live in the county or have died somewhere out of the county.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce has volunteered to take responsibility for checking all cards which are returned to Mrs. Gates as undeliverable by the Post Office department.

TURNER, HAGEN, CHABOT DECLINE TO SEEK RE-ELECTION

The Village election, which was postponed from last November, will be held on Monday, March 3 and various candidates' names have been mentioned for office.

Mayor Dave Turner and President of the Council, Alvar Hagen, both of whom have been in office since the Village has been incorporated, have decided not to seek re-election.

Other members' terms expiring include Village Attorney W. J. Robinson and Council member Arthur Chabot. Mr. Robinson has not fully decided at this time as to whether or not he will again seek office, all depending on the progress of the water question confronting the Village. Mr. Chabot has also declined to run again for office.

Other offices expiring include the Village Clerk, Election Board officials and Village Marshal.

To qualify as a candidate for election, one must be over 21 to file their application with the Village Clerk 10 days before election stating their residence in the Village is 6 months or more, outline their qualifications and what particular office they seek.

SOME LIKELY CANDIDATES MENTIONED

Among some of the names mentioned as possible candidates are Perry Mickel, Earl Gurney, Jim Dean, Frank Starling, Dan Kingman, Frank Miller and Robert Newton. No definite announcement has been made by any one at this time as to his candidacy.

ABOUT MAYOR DAVE TURNER

In declining to seek office again, Mayor Turner stated that he has enjoyed working with and for the people of Wilton Manors and is proud of the progress the Village has made since being incorporated. He feels that there are many other fine men in the community with foresight and qualifications that would be fitted for office and that new faces in government either local, State or National is good for progress and that no particular individual has all the ideas on the operation of government.

When coming to the Village over nine years ago, Mayor Turner was one of the sponsors of the Civic Association. A short time afterwards it was decided to incorporate as a Village. The purpose of this was to regulate building restrictions and regulation of licenses.

What the people think of Mayor Turner is evidenced by the fact that he has been in office since the Village was incorporated and if he so decided to run again he would undoubtedly be re-elected.

Mayor Turner feels that the Village has a fine group of public officials who serve without compensation and at all times have worked for the betterment of the community.

In addition to serving as head of the Village, Mayor Turner has been active in the growth of Florida and served for several years as a member of the Port Authority. He also served as Chairman of the Flood Control Commission for Central and Southern Florida. Both of the above offices he resigned, due to pressure of business.

Mayor Turner can be classed as Wilton Manors' "first" citizen and in relinquishing his office, he can feel well justified that he has accomplished a job "well done."

PRESIDENT HAGEN OF THE COUNCIL

President of the Council, Al Hagen, who has decided not to seek re-election has headed up the Council since Wilton Manors was incorporated. Since that time many new projects have been started under his regime, including the present project under consideration of providing city water for the Village.

Mr. Hagen, in declining to seek office again, feels that there are many fine men with progressive ideas and well qualified who would provide good officials for the community.

The President of the Council came to Fort Lauderdale in 1938 from Berwyn, Illinois. In 1941 he "took root" in the Village by purchasing property adjacent to the golf course. At that time he entered into the contracting business under the trade name of "Tropical Homes Co." The following year he built two houses and for a short period of time his business was curtailed due to war-time building restrictions. In 1942 of September he was inducted into the U. S. Air Force and following his discharge he resumed his building operations in 1946.

At about that period of time Mr. Hagen, with other interested citizens of the community, saw the need for governing regulations. He was one of the leaders in organizing the Civic Association and served as chairman of that body in 1947. In the same year it was decided to incorporate the Village as a protective measure. He was elected as first Council President and has served in that capacity ever since.

Mr. Hagen takes particular pride in the progress which the Village has made in the past few years and the harmonious operation of the Council, which is still operated by its original five members.

In leaving office shortly, Mr. Hagen can rest well assured that he has done a splendid job for the people of Wilton Manors.

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Groene Again Seeks County Commission Post

W. E. Groene, County Commissioner will again seek the Democratic nomination and re-election to the commission.

Groene's announcement came shortly after LaMar Thistlethwaite, a Fort Lauderdale insurance man, qualified to oppose him in the May 6 primary.

There is expected to be one and possibly two men qualify to run against Groene before the March 15 deadline.

Mentioned as possible candidates are Henry Driggers, Fort Lauderdale realtor, and City Commissioner F. R. Humphries.

Humphries was considered a sure candidate in the event Groene decided not to run. However the commissioner's decision may cause Humphries to stay out of the race.

Thistlethwaite, who served on the school board for four years in the 1930's, has lived here for 31 years. Also up for re-election this year on

the county commission are R. T. Gallion of Fort Lauderdale and C. B. Smith of Hollywood.

Gallion is expected to get by without opposition. However, it is said, all the forces of the Hollywood city administration will be pitted against Smith in his bid for nomination and re-election.

Volunteer Fire Dept. Plans Organization

The formation of a volunteer fire department for the Village was discussed at a meeting held in the Village Hall last Friday night, with William Hickson presiding as temporary chairman.

Chief Richard Beaney of the Police Department reported progress on making the recently purchased fire truck ready for operating. Work on this is expected to be completed in about two weeks. He has been assured of the co-operation of the Fort Lauderdale Fire Department as to the best methods of operations when the volunteer fire department is organized. It was suggested that the Wilton Manors Volunteer Fire Department should be a single combined force under one fire chief. Under his control the two fire trucks should each operate under the direction of a captain.

Chairman Hickson observed that one of the first things to consider was the election of a Fire Chief. In view

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of the fact that there was only a small number present at this meeting, the election was postponed to a future meeting when a larger group is expected to be present.

Chairman Hickson appointed a committee consisting of Messrs. Beck, Cass, Sills, Hickman, Smith and Bramble. Hr. Hinds was added to the committee and elected chairman. This committee will make a study on organizational plans and agreed to hold a meeting Tuesday, February 5. The committee will report back to a general meeting of the volunteers to be held Wednesday, February 13 at the Fire House in Highland Estates.

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
