After a contract, between Oakland Park and Wilton Manors had been approved by both bodies, Mayor Dave Turner of Wilton Manors refused to place his official signature on the same. The contract, which has been in the process of negotiations for the past months was passed by the Village Council of Wilton Manors by the vote of 3 to 1, Commissioner J. Marvin Brown voting in the negative.

Mayor Turner, who has been in office since the Village was incorporated and who has declined to run for re-election in the March 3rd election, explained his refusal to sign the contract, by pointing out that a new mayor and three council seats will be up for election at the March 3rd elections. He stated that in view of this, it would be illegal for him and the present council to commit the Village to a 25-year contract for water with Oakland Park. He further added that in his opinion this matter should be decided by the new mayor and new council.

The above action was taken at a special meeting of the Village last Wednesday night. The Village body was in session when the Oakland Park officials and their attorney arrived with the contract to be negotiated between the two municipalities. Everything was in order and both contracts were officially signed by the respective presidents of the council, witnessed by both clerks and the various seals of the two municipalities placed on the documents. Village Attorney Robinson, asked Councilman Boyd if he would take the documents to the mayor for his signature. Upon return from the mayor's home, Boyd stated that Mayor Turner did not wish to approve the agreement. This report caused dramatic silence as if an atom bomb had been dropped.

Mayor Turner stated that, there was no argument with the Village officials or Oakland Park, but in view of the fact that the Village election is only a short time off and the water question has been in progress since May, that the question and signing of the contract should be the duty of the new Mayor and Council.

Since the meeting, Mayor Turner has explained the reasons why he has refused to sign the contract with Oakland Park and has said that he and the Council are serving illegally and continued to serve on the basis of a resolution setting the next election for March 3.

"What would be the use of my signing a contract that would only get the village into a legal wrangle?" Turner said.

He added that he had obtained legal advice in the matter and that it had been held that the council's action in perpetuating itself in office without an election was not proper.

"We just didn't want to go to the expense of having an election to change the election dates," Turner pointed out.

He is not a candidate to succeed himself in the March 3 election.

"I hope when the new officials get in they will go ahead and do something about getting water service here," Turner said.

"I recognize the need and would move to get it if I felt that I was legally in position to do so."

Four of the present commissioners voted to approve the Oakland Park contract and the other, J. Marvin Brown, voted against it at a recent

After the meeting the contract was taken to Turner for signature and he refused to sign.

The contract calls for a meter at the Wilton Manors city limits with water pumped through it to service the city at a rate of 22½ cents per 1,000 gallons. The contract extends for 25 years.

Oakland Park recently passed a \$250,000 bond issue and built a water filter plant. The plant is expected to go into full operation next month.

The whole question of water has been before the people since last May and in fairness to the Council, many, many hours of study have been given to the situation. Various engineers' reports and surveys have been received.
