Results of Village Election Poll. Middleton, High Man

Perry Mickel, unopposed, was named as Mayor of Wilton Manors by the electorate of the Village in the elections, held Monday. Along with Mickel, by the vote of the people, Earle Middleton, James Dean and Frank Starling were elected to serve on the Council. William Hickson defeated Tom Hinds for Village Marshal. Others elected included Mrs. Marcia Stafford for Village Clerk; Mrs. Delia M. Hayes, Mrs. Clayton R. Leaver and Mrs. Mabyn Thomas for the Election Board.

Mickel, for Mayor, polled 185 votes. The Council votes polled were as follows: Middleton, 162; Starling, 158; Dean, 137; Kingman, 91; Frank Miller, 89. Hickson defeated Hinds 120 to 96. The Village Clerk poll was as follows: Mrs. Stafford, 83; Mrs. Miller, 71 and Mrs. Barwick, 65.

The Election Board, unopposed, showed the following: Mrs. Hayes, 196; Mrs. Thomas, 194 and Mrs. Leaver, 193.

It is expected that Middleton, who ran high, will be elected as president of the Council. Usually the high man is given this honor.

VILLAGE WATER QUESTION AWAITS COURT DECISION

A special meeting of the Village Council was held Saturday afternoon for discussion of the water situation, which has been the problem that has confronted this body for some time.

Discussion was held on the question of hiring a construction manager, who would run the job of installing the distribution system for water but the Council would have control of the project.

Engineer Crowe of Black and Associates Inc., who were hired some time ago by the Council to conduct a survey and to draw plans and specifications for the water project, reported to the Council that on comparing the construction managers' agreements of Sain and Company of Orlando and Michael Marinelli of Intercounty Construction Corp., there was little difference in the figures submitted.

Mr. Crowe stated, however, that the construction manager participates in any saving under the unit cost and it behooves him to save where he can. The construction manager furnishes some small tools, power tools, machinery and motor driven equipment that is used on a rental basis.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGERS FEE

Mr. Crowe in his report stated that as far as the construction manager's fee was concerned, the Sain fee is 12 and one half percent and the Marinelli fee, ten percent. The Marinelli participation is 20 percent and the Sain twenty-five percent. Over all, weighing the two construction managers' contracts, either one could be a little cheaper.

Marinelli, being a local man, residing in the Village, offered to finance the project for a period of 100 days at banker's fee of 5%, as long as the money was guaranteed by the bonding company in order to get the work started as soon as possible.

President of the Council, Al Hagen, stated that he felt that it was more expeditious and best to have a local man do the work.

On motion of Village Attorney Robinson a resolution was introduced that the proposed construction agreement submitted by Intercounty Construction Corp. to provide the Village a water distribution system according to the plans and specifications of the Village Engineer, and said agreement to be executed by the President of the Council. This agreement to be effective upon declaratory decree as to the validity of the water contract with Oakland Park.

The motion was carried with Chabot, Boyd and Robinson voting in favor and Brown passing his vote stating that he felt that this should be the work of the new Council.

NOTIFICATION TO FINANCIAL ADVISERS

On a further motion by Mr. Robinson a resolution was introduced stating to the effect that as to a previous agreement between the Village and B. J. Van Ingen & Co. and Ogden & Co. stating that as the engineers' report had been received and the obligations as put forth in the agreement made on the 17th day of August 1951 with the financial advisers had been met and that the Village was calling on the financial advisers to ask compliance with the agreement by the posting of a good faith check in the amount of 3% of the \$75,000.

The Council further authorized in the resolution the issuance of Water Revenue Certificates to be amortized and paid for from water revenue derived from the re-sale of water to residents of the Village.

On vote, Robinson, Chabot voted "yes" Brown, passed.

HIGHLAND ESTATES WATER SYSTEM

The matter of exercising the Highland Estates Civic Club option given to the Village some time ago, was discussed and on motion of Robinson it was agreed to take up the option of the Highland Estates Civic Club's distribution system and to pay the initial \$1,000, leaving a balance of \$4,000 to be paid, when the Village takes over the system. Voting in favor was Robinson, Boyd and Chabot and passing his vote was Brown.

Mr. Crowe of Black and Associates Inc., stated that his firm was deeply appreciative of the cooperation given by the Council and conveyed to the new incoming Council that they stood ready to work with them and aid in any way and that they would be glad to send representatives at any time to discuss any future problems which might come up regarding the water system for the Village.

In addition Mr. Crowe stated that in the very near future, it would be imperative to get a six inch line laid on 26th Street to supply the Sunset Manors project and that it would cost approximately \$10,000 for one mile of pipe to be hooked into Fort Lauderdale supply at present, and if this was not done, the project would suffer as well as the community.

ALL BILLS TO BE PAID

As their last official act, a motion was made by Robinson authorizing payment of current bills incurred by the outgoing Council and that a blanket approval be made to pay all current bills, thus saving the incoming Council any possible embarrassment. On motion Chabot, Robinson and Boyd voted "yes" and Brown "passed."

MEETING OF FRIDAY EVENING

At a special meeting held on Friday evening, Mr. Robinson stated that we have notice from the State Board of Health that the plans and specifications have been accepted and moved that the report of the engineers be accepted. A motion was made and seconded that the balance due Black and Associates, in the amount of \$3,511.00 be paid, according to the contract dated August 17th, 1951. This agreement was two-thirds of ten percent of the estimated cost of the distribution system of \$75,160.00. The total fee was \$5,011, less a preliminary payment of \$1,500 which was paid a few weeks ago. Boyd, Robinson, Chabot voted "yes" and Brown "passed."

Wilton Manors; a Wonderful Place to Live NO TAXATION

The village of Wilton Manors, with a population of 1,400 is five minutes north of Fort Lauderdale. It was incorporated in 1947 and has NO village taxes. Revenue for operating the government is derived from the cigarette tax, beverage and occupational licenses. Every citizen takes an active interest in the community.

The people of the community have all the services of a large city without village taxation. Wilton Manors has a volunteer fire department and a paid police department. A patrol car is in operation at all times.

The residents making up the community, in the majority, are of moderate means and take pride in the upkeep of their homes and grounds. The population has migrated from practically every state.

In the confines of Wilton Manors are stores of every description which makes it unnecessary for the residents to go elsewhere for shopping. The community has zoning laws and all of the business stores are located on Wilton Drive, a county road of 80 feet, which provides ample free parking space for the shopper. There is little through traffic dangers which makes it an ideal community for bringing up children. A modern grade school, just completed, is within easy walking distance of every home. High school facilities are nearby.

Recreational activities in our community include a modern golf driving range, and adjoining the Village is a nine hole golf course. Ten minutes driving takes one to the clean and beautiful 5-mile long beach, and for movies and other entertainment, Fort Lauderdale is just over the "boundaries" of the village. A good bus line provides frequent service to Fort Lauderdale.

In Wilton Manors is the Covenant Presbyterian Church. The Community also has numerous clubs and organizations—The Civic Association, Women's Club, Businessmen's Club, Kiwanis Club and Boy Scout and Girl Scout activities, and P.T.A.

The mayor and members of the village council, elected by the people, serve without compensation and hold monthly meetings in the village hall. Wilton Manors is a homey place to live, where friendliness exists.
