The new Council was organized last Thursday, with Judge Boyd Anderson swearing in the members. Earle Middleton, who ran high in the recent election, was named unanimously to be President of the Council.

The other members taking office were Mayor Perry Mickel, James Dean and Frank Starling. Mrs. Marcia Stafford took oath as Village Clerk. All of the successful candidates were given the loyalty oath, administered by Judge Anderson.

A resolution was introduced authorizing Ray Coleman to make an audit of the Village books from the period of the last election, up to the present new Council taking over.

The Council decided to hold meetings on Tuesday nights or other times when necessary so in order to familiarize themselves with the business at hand.

From all indications the Council is taking right hold of their new duties and the public can rest assured that good government will predominate.

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SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

The effect of the 1950 Social Security law, which brought self-employed persons under the Old Age and Survivors section of the law on a compulsory basis as of Jan. 1, 1951, is just beginning to be felt in the Broward County Social Security office, according to Paul Byrley, manager.

Byrley said that during the first three weeks of January his office issued 775 social security numbers. More than 300 of these applications were from self-employed persons, he reported. Last year's first three weeks included less than 20 applications from the self-employed.

The new law requires that most self-employed people who have net earnings of \$400 or more from their trades or businesses, must file a report with the Bureau of Internal Revenue between Jan. 1 and March 15 of each year, showing their net earnings for the previous year. The Social Security tax for self-employed people is 2½ percent of net earnings. Net earnings of less than \$400 and more than \$3,600 a year are not taxable for social security purposes. A social security number identifies this report so that social security credit may be given to the taxpayer.

Byrley warned that many self-employed people, who will not be subject to income tax because of exemptions, will be required to file self-employment social security tax re-

turns, since exemptions do not apply to this tax.

Self-employed doctors, lawyers, veterinarians, licensed public accountants and a few other self-employed groups are not liable for the social security tax return on their earnings from their professions, according to Byrley. He emphasized, however, that members of these professional groups who were employees, were still under the Social Security Act as employees. In other words, if Dr. A employed Dr. B as an assistant, Dr. B was an employee and covered under the Social Security Act.

Notes From the School Safety Patrol

The Safety Patrol is urging the boys and girls who ride bicycles to school to park them WEST of the sign for bikes on 24th St. A few riders have failed to do this in recent days, and have therefore found their bikes parked at the west end of the parking space. Should this practice continue it may be necessary for us to seek the cooperation of the parents concerned in asking them to have the guilty boy or girl walk to school for one week in order to teach the much-needed lesson to the few.

Drivers, please be careful when you are driving by the school, especially if you are driving by at the noon and closing hours. The children are hurrying away at these times, and are prone to be more careless than usual.

Recommending and installing photostat machines which provided almost instantaneous service.

Systematizing the records of the County Commission, receiving the commendation of the state auditor for doing so.

Systematizing his department so thoroughly that he has not had to increase the number of personnel although there has been a 100 per cent increase in the number of recordings during his term.
