## SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

The effect of the 1950 Social Security law, which brought self-employed persons under the Old Age and Survivors section of the law on a compulsory basis as of Jan. 1, 1951, is just beginning to be felt in the Broward County Social Security ofice, according to Paul Byrley, man-

Byrley said that during the first three weeks of January his office issued 775 social security numbers. More than 300 of these applications were from self-employed persons, he reported. Last year's first three weeks included less than 20 applications from the self-employed.

The new law requires that most self-employed people who have net earnings of \$400 or more from their trades or businesses, must file a report with the Bureau of Internal Revenue between Jan. 1 and March 15 of each year, showing their net earnings for the previous year. The Social Security tax fo rself-employed people is 21/2 percent of net earnings. Net earnings of less than \$400 and more than \$3,600 is a year are not taxable for social security purposes. A social security number identifies this report so that social security credit may be given to the taxpayer.

Byrley warned that man yself-emplayed paop'e, who will not be subject to income tax because of exemptions, will be required to file selfemployment social security tax re-

turns, since exemptions do not apply to this tax.

Self-employed doctors, lawyers, veterinarians, licensed public acfew other self-employed groups are not liable for the social security tax return on their earnings from their professions, according to Byrley. He emphasized, however, that members of these professional groups who were employees, were still under the Social Security Act as employees. In other words, if Dr. A employed Dr. B as an assistant, Dr. B was an employee and covered under the Social Security Act.

## Check Payments on Social Security

Did you overpay your Social Security tax last year?

Uncle Sam has worked out a new, simple refund deal if you paid more than the \$54 required by law for the Social Security tax on wages earned. You would have had more than this amount deducted if you were one of several hundred people around Broward County who worked for two or more employers in 1951 and earned over \$3600 in wages. Only the first \$3600 in wages or self-employment income is taxable for social security purposes.

Unlike previous years, the taxpayer wil llist his overpayments as part of his 1951 Income Tax withholding payments on Form 1040, Item 2. As a result, any overpayment made will be applied as a payment of ircome tax due or increase the amount of any refund to be made by the Treasury Department. One check will cover all types of overpayments.

- Where a wage earner worked for only one employer and deductions exceeded \$54, he should request the refund from his employer.
