## Manor Market Zoning Awaits New Plans

The re-zoning application of Manor Market which has been before the Village Council for the past few weeks for action, was laid over for further study. The petitioners for the re-zoning, Manor Market, made the request in order that they can submit revised plans to the Council for their consideration. This action was taken at the Council meeting on Tuesday, April 15.

Manor Market has made a request for re-zoning of lots No. 8 and 9, in order that they can enlarge their store and provide additional parking space for their patrons.

Objecting to the re-zoning are 23 signers of a petition, 21 property owners, all of whom surround the property in question. These objectors contend that their properties would depreciate and the increased traffic along 23rd Street would be detrimental to their interests.

It was stated in The Bulletin of last week that there were 961 names favoring re-zoning of this property whereby this petition presented to the Council stated that the signers favored the expanding of the existing market and to provide a parking lot.

## Dan McCarty Speaks at Well-Attended Rally

Dan McCarty, candidate for governor, pulled no punches in his talk last Thursday night at War Memorial Auditorium when he spoke to a gathering of approximately 1,500 people. The gubernatorial candidate was in a fighting mood as he lashed out criticizing his opponents attributed to them of issuing half truths, and distorted facts, which are being circulated by them in a campaign of desperation.

McCarty told his audience that he had no tie-up or any deals with the Warren administration as charged by critics. He stated that his stand today was the same as in 1948 when he came close to defeating Warren for the governorship. The Fort Pierce candidate further emphasized that he has made no commitments or promises and that his hands are free to conduct the affairs of the State in an unfettered manner.

Frequent applause interrupted the personable candidate as he hammered his various points home to the gathering, particularly when he stated that there would be no additional tax burdens placed on the people, if he was elected.

The candidate said, "I will not tolerate dishonesty at any level of government and will after fair and impartial hearing exercise constitutional power of suspension to remove any official who demonstrates a disregard or for any failure to perform official duties . . ."

The candidate also stated that payroll padding and gravy train riding, political piracy, favoritism and other forms of waste and extravagance will not be tolerated. The state must get a dollar's worth of goods or services for every dollar spent. Efficiency and economy must be the result of sound business practices.

Other points the speaker touched on included state institutions, welfare, public health, education, highway safety, public roads, veterans, reorganization of state agencies, state parks, game and fish, crime and corruption and state advertising.

Following the meeting, Dan and Mrs. McCarty greeted the guests present. The candidate was introduced by J. D. Camp with Congressman Dwight Rogers as the toastmaster of the evening.

Practically all of the candidates for county offices were present and gave short talks on the qualifications for the office which they seek.

## New Village Map Being Prepared

Norman Malcolm reported to the Council at the meeting of April 15 the progress made on compiling a new map for the Village. The map is being prepared by James W. McLaughlin and a rough draft was shown to the Council. Mr. Malcolm brought up the question as to how accurate the Council wanted the map to be made and in what detail. Council President Middleton stated that while the Village was having a map prepared that it should be accurate and in full detail. Before the final draft is passed, the Council will check the map before acceptance. Messrs. Malcolm and Yde are members of the committee working on the map project. It was suggested to Mr. Malcolm to contact Mr. Sills and invite him to be a member of the committee, as he was familiar with the Highland Estates section and would be most valuable in assisting in this work.

## Funeral Services Held For George Richardson

Funeral services for George Richardson, well known owner of Richardson's Golf Course adjoining the Village was held at Fannin Chapel The Rev. Mark Carpenter officiating. Masonic graveside services were conducted at Lauderdale Memorial Park. A native of Ireland, Mr. Richardson, 69, came here from Ridgefield, Conn., and made his home at 1935 N. E. Fourth Ave. He was a member of All Saints Episcopal Church and the Doric Lodge, F & AM. Mr. Richardson had been a golf course developer for the past 38 years.

He leaves his wife, Rachel Richardson, and a son, George, Jr., both of Fort Lauderdale.

After discussion it was voiced by members to utilize the ground adjoining the Village Hall. Mr. Middleton appointed Councilman Starling and Brown to look into the question and report back at the next meeting for action by the Council.

Chief Richard Beane of the Police was present and stated that with hundreds of dollars worth of equipment, the truck could not be left in the open.

**Social Security Information**

Social Security reports for January, February and March are due before April 30, according to Paul L. Byrley, Manager of the Social Security Administration's Fort Lauderdale office. "These reports must go to the Collector of Internal Revenue in Jacksonville, Fla., and not to our office," he said.

Some workers are still losing credits towards Social Security retirement and death benefits, Byrley pointed out. "This happens every time an employee's earnings are reported without his Social Security number," he said. "No one receives credit for those earnings, because they cannot be posted by name alone."

Two new groups now under Social Security are domestic servants in private homes, and farm wage hands. A servant is not to be reported for Social Security unless she worked for the same household in some part of twenty-four different days during the January through March period. In addition she must have been paid at least \$50 cash wages.

Farm wage hands must meet a wage-time test too before being reported. Further information on both of these newly covered employees may be obtained from the Social Security office at 125 S. E. First St. in Fort Lauderdale.

**A New Fee Method On Building Permits**

The establishing of a change in permit fees for the Village was discussed at the Council meeting on Tuesday, April 15. After considerable discussion it was suggested by Council Member Dean that the standard charge for permits be similar to Fort Lauderdale. Mr. Dean advocated that building permits be charged for on a per cubic foot basis as Lauderdale's rate. This was adopted.
