Safety Patrolman Henley Makes Washington Trip

With a rousing sendoff aided by Police Chief Richard Beaney and the Wilton Manors School Safety Patrol, Jimmy Henley who was picked by the patrol group as their representative, started on a trip to Washington, D. C.

The trip is one of national importance and part of the AAA theme on safety conducted throughout the country.

Jimmy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Henley of Prospect Gardens and is in the sixth grade at the local school.

The school safety patrol in the Village was inaugurated by Chief Beaney of the local police and has been instructed accordingly. Special emphasis has been laid on the operation of bicycle riding.

Principal Davis of the Wilton Manors school, together with Chief Beaney and the boy's parents were among those in attendance in seeing Jimmy off on his sightseeing trip to the nations' capital. Glad to see that the Village gave Ted Galatis such a fine vote for the office of Justice of the Peace. Ted polled 221 to equal the total of both his opponents, Messrs. Mowry and Watson. If the rest of the district had given Ted that showing there would have been no need for a run-off, but Ted and Mowry will battle it out on the 27th.

WATER SYSTEM MEETING SCHEDULE

Good progress is being made on the installation of the eight-inch water pipe for the Village distribution system. Work is being carried on under the supervision of Lou Vanditti of Intercounty Construction Corp., construction managers for the Village system.

Already the pipe has been laid on the Old Dixie and the greater portion of 26th Street and the work is keeping well up to schedule. Due to anticipated future development east of the railroad there has been talk of increasing the distribution system for the servicing of this area through tunnelling under the 26th St. crossing of the FEC RR. This question is expected to be discussed at a future meeting of the Council.

Oakland Park system is now in full operation after a delay of several months due to mechanical trouble. The system serves about 500 consumers. Mayor J. Dewey Hawkins reported that the plant is working in perfect order and will supply the town with "the best water it has ever had."

Pumping approximately 86,000 gallons a day, the plant will soon be called upon to supply water to Wilton Manors and several subdivisions being developed south of Oakland Park.

Hawkins said that the price of water to local residents would be high for a short period. The present rate is set at \$2.50 for 3,000 gallons.

However, the mayor pointed out there were more consumers than originally expected when the town issued revenue certificates to finance the system.

"The contract with Wilton Manors which will net the city several hundred consumers and the increase of local residents will more than double the water list," Hawkins said.

He indicated that this would ease the load on local residents to retire the revenue certificates.

One of the reasons for the construction of the water system was to place the city in a position to provide service to an area east of the community which was recently annexed.

Owner of the property, Arthur T. Galt, is contesting the annexation.

The city's answer is that it needs the tract to expand and is able to extend city services, including water.

Dan McCarty Thanks Voters

Dan McCarty, candidate for Governor, expresses his appreciation to the voters who supported him in the primary election. He said that he was soliciting the united support of all Floridians interested in good government for the future welfare of the State. He reiterated his former statement that he will not make any deals, trades or commitments.

McCARTY AND ODHAM RENEW CAMPAIGN, CLARK WITHDRAWS FROM RACE

Run-Off Candidates Include Galatis, Mowry, Marshall, Phillips, Rickard, Olwell

COUNTY ASTOUNDED, CLARK WITHDRAWS

Likened to the dropping of an atom bomb, was the announcement made by Robert L. (Bob) Clark who withdrew last Saturday from the Sheriff race.

What made the announcement more startling to political observers was the fact that a statement purported to have been made by Clark, following the election, that he would still be in there battling and could still win. Rumors had been current during the week that Clark who polled 7,570 to Amos Hall 11,647, would concede the election to Hall.

The Clark family have been prominent in politics in Broward County for many years, the late Walter Clark having served as Broward County sheriff for 17 years and Bob was formerly chief deputy sheriff.

Bob Clark's statement retiring from the race, brings to a close one of the most interesting chapters in Broward County political history.

The statement issued by Clark is as follows:

"I am withdrawing my candidacy for the Democratic nomination for sheriff of Broward County. I offered myself as a candidate for sheriff so that the people might express their choice.

"The vote in the first primary has shown me that the people want Sheriff Hall. I therefore see no reason for forcing further delay and expense by carrying on the campaign.

"I am grateful to my many friends for their splendid support and loyalty and I want them, Sheriff Hall and all the people of my county to know that I stand ready and willing to cooperate with them at all times."

Bob Clark expects to devote full time to the operation of his cattle ranch.

Amos Hall, before assuming another full four year term must face Andy Phillips of Fort Lauderdale, who is the Republican nominee for sheriff, in the November elections.

Village Council Holds Special Meeting

A special meeting of the Village Council was held at the school on May 5th to act on recommendations made by the Zoning Board for the purpose of giving tentative approval for Middle River Estates subdivision. The approval was tentatively granted by the Council.

Commissioner Dick Gallion requested Council to "stake" Mahannah Road and also provide for survey plans for 26th Street, in order that improvements could be made in this area.

A sample survey post card will be sent to each property owner asking them to place a stake where the water connection to the home is to be placed. This will expedite the water installation system when pipes are laid in the particular home owner's area.

Appearing every Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights at the Tropical Club, is Eddie Weber, pianist and accordionist, who was formerly featured at Fred Waring's Shawnee Inn on the Delaware. Eddie has something new in keyboard music style.

The voters of the Village and State will again go to the polls on May 27th to participate in the run-off election for their choice of candidate for the general election in November.

As was generally expected Dan McCarty was the winner of the nomination with over 347,000 compared to Brailey Odham, who ran second best with approximately 226,000. McCarty held a lead of over 121,000 but lacked a majority of all votes cast and will have as his opponent, Odham, in the election of May 27th. Political dopesters were upset when Alto Adams ran a poor third with 121,090. Many of the so-called political "big shots" in the State backed Adams as well as the local daily paper. Odham's tremendous vote was accorded him due to his colorful talkathon campaign, something new to Florida. From reports this young candidate will continue with this radio appeal in trying to win from Dan McCarty.

CLOSE COUNTY RACES

One of the closest races in the county was that of County Commissioner of District 1 in which Richard "Dick" Gallion nosed out Paul Swin-jell by 77 votes. This result was determined on the absentee ballot vote. Swindell, a newcomer, made a heard from in future political campaigns.

People of the county were taken by surprise over the week-end by the announcement of Bob Clark, who in an issued statement declined to run in the 27th elections against Amos Hall, who polled 11,647 to Clark's 7,570. A surprising part of the Sheriff race was the run made by J. (Quill) Lloyd, who only polled 2,271 votes running a poor fourth and topped by Tony Salvino who polled 2,378.

Two long-timers in political office in the county, were handed their "walking papers" by the voters. W. O. Berryhill was given a sound trouncing by his "former" employee, W. H. Meeks, Jr., to the tune of 13,158 to 7,156. O. K. Phillips running for Superintendent of Public Instruction defeated Ulric Bennett, 11,845 to 7,277. Returned to office was State Representative John Burwell who defeated Stewart LaMotte, Jr. LaMotte made a good showing but was beaten by the veteran legislator 10,593 to 6,964.

With Bob Clark now officially out of the race, the run-off election candidates in which the voters of the Village will participate for local offices, include the Constable race between Elias Marshall and Bob Phillips; Justice of the Peace candidacy of Ted Galatis and Ross Mowry; Port Authority between F. Laird Rickard and Charles "Chuck" Olwell.

Herman Meeks received a fine vote of confidence with 353 against Berryhill's 152.

Boyd (Buzz) Harwood of 216 N. E. Third Terrace, who recently sold his hotel in the Ozark Mountains will shortly take up permanent residence in the Village. Buzz expects in the very near future to establish a business here specializing in investment trusts.

Mrs. Clayton R. Leaver is on a trip to the north. Mrs. Leaver is driving Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Leaver to their home in Orange, Ct.

Dan McCarty and Brailey Odham after a rest of a few days from the rigors of campaigning are again "back in the harness" pulling for the support of the voters in the May 27th election. You can rest well assured that both of the candidates will put in their appearance in the area. Wilton Manors gave McCarty a fine vote of confidence and Jim Dean, local campaign manager for McCarty can well feel proud of his efforts.

It is expected that the two new subdivisions will begin shortly, both of which lie east of the FEC RR. Approximately 200 homes will be built in the anticipated developments. Tentative approval has been given by Council. Contemplated plans provide for certain property to be utilized as playground area for children who may in the future live in the area. One development is known as Coral Gardens and the other Middle River Estates. There is already talk of an eight-inch water line to go into the area to service the anticipated homes. The question of this additional pipe lineage is to be paid for by the Village at large or the developers is a "moot" question. Concrete action is expected to be taken by Council.

Broward National Bank To Add to Building

Due to their expanding business and in order to give better service to their customers, the Broward National Bank has received the go-ahead signal from the Board of Adjustment for the construction of a four-story addition at the rear of their present building.

The new building would bridge the alley, and the bank has agreed to remove a part of the first story, with the upper floors jutting out supported by cantilever construction in the event that Las Olas is eventually widened in the future.

Shuffleboard League Getting Underway

The newly organized Broward County Shuffleboard League will soon get underway. A meeting of supporters of the teams entered met recently at the Beacon. George Evans was elected as temporary chairman. The teams represented are The Beacon, B & C, Healey's and The Turf.

A schedule will be drawn up so that alternating weeks each team will play on its home board.
