McCarty Urges Supporters To Vote On May 27th

Dan McCarty, candidate for Governor in the run-off election on May 27th in a letter to the Editor of the Bulletin urged his supporters not to let his big first primary vote make them over-confident of victory in the

runoff election for the governorship May 27.

"Don't take anything for granted," he appealed.

"Work just as hard for the next few days as you did before the first primary. If you're going to be out of town be sure to cast an absentee ballot."

The Fort Pierce candidate for governor failed by 1.06 per cent to win a first primary majority which would have given him the Democratic nomination without a runoff and made state history. He polled 361,427 votes. Brasley Odham, his second primary opponent got 332,565.

Outside of the gubernatorial vote, local voters will be asked to vote for Ted Galatis or Ross Mowry for Justice of the Peace; Elias Marshall or Bob Phillips for Constable; and Charles "Chuck" Olwell or F. Laird Rickard for Port Authority members.

Predictions for the vote are that less people will go to the polls in the 27th election than cast their ballots on primary day. All candidates have concentrated on getting out the vote on the 27th.

Water System Progressing Oakland Park Awards Bid

According to Lou Venditti, of Intercounty Construction Corp., construction managers for the Village water distribution system, work on the laying of the water lines is ahead of schedule.

During the past week, pipe was laid on Sixth Avenue and a goodly portion of Wilton Drive. Mr. Venditti has commented that he has received splendid cooperation from the Village officials and business houses along the drive, on the matter of parking when their organization was laying the pipe.

It is expected that Oakland Park will begin laying their pipe, to connect with the Wilton Manors line at the bridge on Old Dixie Highway, sometime this week.

A \$7,920 bid submitted by the Cromer Construction Co. of Delray Beach was accepted by the town council recently for construction of a water line to Wilton Manors.

Two higher bids were submitted by Inter-County Construction Co. of Fort Lauderdale (\$8,544) and the Reimerton Construction Co. of Miami (\$8,280).

According to the contract, installation of the pipeline will start within five days of the signing of the contract and will be completed in 30 days. The line will be transit pipe conforming with pipe already included in the

The water line will extend south of Oakland Park from Third St. to the south bank of the north fork at Middle River, a distance of approximately 7,000 feet.

Fire Company Drill Wednesday, May 21

Finishing touches are being made on the truck and on Sunday, last, Chief Beany of the Police Department and Mr. Baker were busy renewing the running boards on the fire truck. Les Bagwell of Tropical Paint has given the finishing touches on the paint job. Others who have worked on the truck include Pat and Don of Standard Service and Nick Carter of Nick's Welding Works.

Olwell Opposes Gas And Chemical Plant

At the instigation of Charles "Chuck" Olwell, candidate for a member of the Port Authority in the coming elections, and five other citizens who have obtained an injunction halting negotiations for the proposed Flor-

ida Petro-Chemical Corp. plant at Fort Lauderdale a report has been rendered by a chemical professor from University of Miami.

Professor Steinbach of the Miami University, according to the report concluded that the gasses and oil fumes released by operations would not be conducive to public health.

Dr. Steinbach said it is "based on

data regarding burning processes of petroleum and oils in general, and not on a single specific process."

He discusses the gases and oil fumes which are released by such operations, and concluded:

"PUBLIC HEALTH: Irritating effects, harmful effects and fire and explosion hazards could be the results. The southeast breeze over Fort Lauderdale will not be more appreciated because of the proposed cracking plant. The exact effects cannot be stated until concentrations in the air of many of the chemicals mentioned (and perhaps others concerned in the process) are known.

"FIRE AND EXPLOSION: Even if the fire or explosion is within the plant proper and is efficiently handled, gases and soot will affect the town at that time. The danger of larger fire due to eventual burning of the oil, gasoline and gas storage tanks is a pronounced threat to the community.

"CORROSION: Increased corrosion effects may be expected due to the gases released into the air.

"BUILDING PAINTS: Darkening of white lead paints and discoloration of many other metallic element paints is bound to occur if small amounts of hydrogen sulfide are released into the air.

"VEGETATION AND WATER: There will be some effect on the vegetation from the gases, and probably some effect on the vegetation at the water's edge due to the oil affluent that is released. The amount released may or may not bother bathers. It is doubtful that enough oil would ever be present in any one spot so that a lighted cigaret would present a dangerous fire hazard."

Olwell said the report will be submitted to the port commission.

F. Laird Rickard, who is running against Mr. Olwell in the May 27th elections, has been opposed to the granting of permission for the plant at Port Everglades until further investigation has been made.
