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AN EDITORIAL It Did Happen Here Memorial Day 1952

We were very much surprised on Memorial Day to find that only four American flags were displayed in the Village in memory of our "honored dead."

The homes displaying "our flag" included Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Newton on N. E. 24th St., Tom E. Hinds on N. E. 25th St., C. Wilson Brown of N. E. Ninth Ave., and T. Du Laney of 315 N. E. 26th St.

The Village Hall as well as Wilton Manors Elementary School had no display. From one end of Wilton Drive to the other there was no evidence of any flag flying from any of the business establishments.

It does seem, that with such splendid organizations in the community as the Council, Boy and Girl Scouts, Civic Association, P. T. A., and Kiwanis and Sinawik that some effort in the future could be taken whereby on national holidays, that a concerted drive be made for display of Old Glory. We preach Americanism in our schools and organizations-let us try to put it into practice.

Fort Lauderdale Holds Memorial Day Program

One of the largest and hest directed Memorial Day observances in Fort Lauderdale's history was held under the sponsorship of the Council of Veterans Organizations. Practically all stores, business places, City Hall and Court House was closed in memroy of the "honored dead."

Residents Complain Of Roadway

Fire Hydrants Installed

Several complaints have come to the attention of The Bulletin, regarding the leveling off of the roadway after excavation has been made on placement of water lines. It has been pointed out that the ground is bumpy and constitutes a traffic hazard.

Mr. Vanditti of Intercounty Construction Corp., who are the construction managers for the village when questioned, stated that the excavation ground has to settle before the roadway can be leveled. He asks that residents bear with the work as it is being accomplished as fast as pos-

During the past week the various fire hydrants, at strategic locations in the community, have been installed. It is anticipated that Oakland Park will begin the excavation for the laying of the pipe line from that community, sometime this week for connection with the Village.

of the way, everything on the political horizon remains quiet until the general elections in November. Also in November two members of the Village Council's terms expire, James Boyd and J. Marvin Brown.

As was generally expected, Dan McCarty received the gubernatorial nod over Brailey Odham, who came from obscurity as a political candidate to statewide prominence, through his novel talkathon radio appeal.

In Wilton Manors, McCarty received a vote of 292 to 148 for Odham. The total vote cast in the state was far below the 738,000 cast in the primary. Broward gave McCarty a 3,600 margin.

F. Laird Rickard, running for reelection for Port Authority member in District 3, defeated Charles 'Chuck" Olwell, well known travel agency owner. Rickard polled 4,242 to Olwell's 3,376. In the Village vote, Rickard polled 169 to Olwell's 164. In the primary vote Rickard showed 164, Olwell 162.

Ted Galatis, Oakland Park City Attorney, was the victor in the Justice of the Peace and Judge of Small Claims Court in District 4. Galatis defeated Ross Mowry, present incumbent, 4,022 to 3,402. Galatis polled 206 votes in the Village compared to Mowry's 150. In the primary vote, locally, Galatis polled 221 to Mowry's 115.

In the race for Constable for District 4. Bob Phillips defeated Elias Marshall 4,198 to 3,591. Wilton Manors gave Phillips a vote of 183 to 169 for Marshall. The primary vote showed Phillips 125 and Marshall 116, in the Village.

Amos Hall, unopposed for Sheriff received 279 in the local vote.

Only 45% of the county's registered voters went to the polls on the 27th. The total vote was 19,602 of the 42,601 voters.

DELEGATES TO NATIONAL CONVENTION

In the contest for delegates to the Democratic national convention, candidates pledged to Sen. Richard Russell were high in 7 of the 10 contests. Three of Sen. Estes Kefauver's were among the 10.

Winners in the race of the delegates at large among the men were fauver delegate, 6.563; Farris Bryant Russell delegate, 6,403; and Doyle C. Carlton, Russell delegate, 6,066.

At large winners among the women were Mrs. A. G. Chappell, Kefauver delegate. 1/4 6.100; Mrs. J. D. Alderman, Russell delegate, 5,438: Mrs. Frank X. Carroll, Jr., Russell delegate, 5,218; and Mrs. M. B. Fuller, Russell delegate. 5,209.

C. Y. Byrd. also a Russell delegate, was high among the four men in the race for delegates from the 6th congressional district with 6.449 votes. High among the women in the district was another Russell delegate, Mrs. Marjorie R. Smith, 6,837 votes.

One of the outstanding surprises of the election was the freeholder approval of the North Broward Hospital district act. This was approved 3,893 to 2,700.

In the Republican contest for Governor, Harry S. Swan defeated Bert Leigh Acker, 610 to 281. In the Village vote, Swan received 19 to

One or two performances are to be given during the stay at Hendersonville, summer home of many Fort Lauclerdale families. An extensive recreation program is planned for the "Choristers" there as the trip draws to a close.

"We are awaiting word from several other points along the route regarding singing engagements," Wells commented, "and several of our friends in the music circles in New York City are seeking radio and television opportunities for the group to perform."

The "Choristers" were selected to represent the State of Florida at a national Music Olympiad in California next month, under the sponsorship of the United Sates Junior Chamber of Commerce. Several factors prompted cancellation of the event, however, and the substitute tour was suggested by the local Jaycee chapter which had raised nearly \$3,000 for the California trip,
