LEAVER'S BUILDING APPLICATION HELD UP BY COUNCIL; AWAIT FINAL ZONING MAP

Lt. Comdr. W. P. Hartman Welcomes Navy and Marines

Lt. Commander W. P. (Duke) Hartman of the Village was among those in attendance serving as a welcoming party for the 3,000 Marines and sailors who visited Fort Lauderdale Sunday. The ships arrived Sunday morning at Port Everglades and were met by members of the Volunteer Composite Naval Reserve Unit, Fort Lauderdale city officials, members of the Port Authority and other Broward County representatives. Lt. Commander F. Laird Rickard, who is chairman of the Port Authority and also the Commandant's local representative welcomed the contingent. Commander Hartman is the C. O. of the Volunteer Naval Reserve Unit.

At the present time a campaign for recruits is being conducted by the Unit. Meetings are held every Tuesday at 7:45 at Port Everglades. Commander Hartman would be pleased to have any youths who are 17 and a half or 18 to contact him for information as to the Unit. Other ex-Navy men are invited to attend the meetings. Commander Hartman may be reached at 2424 N. E. Sixth Ave., Wilton Manors.

The need for completion of the zoning regulations by the Planning and Zoning Board was evidenced at the meeting of the Village Council on June 3. At this time Clayton R. Leaver of Tropical Construction Company appeared before the Council to find out the cause of the delay in the application for a permit for a duplex home to be erected on Lots No. 13 and 14 of Block 2 on N. E. 21st St. Mr. Leaver pointed out that the application has been held up for many weeks and that as several type buildings of this nature were already in the area he could see no reason for the continued delay since March 25.

The Village Council on March 25th instructed Building Inspector Robert L. Newton to refrain from issuing building permits other than for one family homes or business until a zoning map from the Zoning Board be adopted.

Legal Counsel for Mr. Leaver told the Council that the action in issuance of the permit could be construed as nothing other than their request was denied and that protective measures in his client's behalf would have to be considered.

Orley M. Dunton, who lives in the area, stated that he was opposed to the granting of such a permit and was confident that a goodly number of residents in that particular area were in opposition. Councilman Dean suggested that if the applicants could get 85 percent of the people in the immediate area favoring such a building, it would certainly show to Council there was no objection.

President Middleton told the applicants, which was concurred in by the Council, that the application would be held up until the final report from the Zoning Board.

What action the applicants will take is a matter of conjecture at this time.

The Zoning Board held a meeting Monday, June 9th, for the purpose of completing the zoning of the Village and will turn over their report to the Council at the meeting on June 10th. Following the adoption of the zoning regulations, it will be necessary for advertising to be placed in the papers as official notification to any objectors to the plan in order that they may present themselves at a public meeting.

Council Appoints Dunton Water Superintendent

Orley M. Dunton of 309 N. E. 20th St., was appointed as Water Works Superintendent. This action was taken by the Council at their meeting of June 10th.

A "closed" meeting was held by the Council on last Wednesday night at which time the qualifications of the various 17 applicants was discussed and it was unanimously decided that Mr. Dunton was best qualified for the position.

Mr. Dunton is an engineer by profession and has done consulting work for top organizations in the country. He is a graduate of Princeton University. At present he is retired. He represented the Village on the Broward County Economic Commission and was delegated to serve on the committee to hear the case of the Gas Company that wishes to settle at Port Everglades.

Mr. Dunton has had various City government experiences in the State of Michigan in setting up operations of city departments.

LEGAL OPINION ASKED ON RIGHT OF CIVIC CLUB TO SELL WATER SYSTEM

The question as to whether or not the members of Highland Estates Civic Club, Inc. held the right to sell the water system to the Village of Wilton Manors was brought before the Council at the meeting of June 3.

HISTORY OF CONTRACT

The contract between Wilton Manors and the Highland Estates Civic Club, Inc. for the purchase of the physical assets of that system which supplies water to that area was entered into last October. The stipulated price agreed on was \$5,000. Already a check of \$1,000 has been paid as part of the agreement.

When the contract was entered into, the Civic Club was represented by Messrs. Kingman, Sills, Novak and Bird and the asking price was \$15,000. It was pointed out at this time that the system was in good order. Engineer C. Kay Davis was the appraiser representing the Village. The Council in office at that time stated that the price was too high and a short recess was taken at this particular meeting. After discussion, Mr. Kingman countered with a proposal of \$5,000 and asked that a postponement be made in the Village elections of November. This was concurred in by Council through resolution, advancing the election to March of this year. Mr. Kingman felt that the residents of the area, re-

cently annexed, should be given the right to participate in the elections.

DEAN BRINGS UP QUESTION

Councilman James Dean brought up the question that many residents of former Highland Estates had complained of the inadequacy of the size of pipe being used in the system at present. During discussion it was questioned whether or not the sellers had the right to dispose of the system and before the balance of \$4,000 is to be paid, that a legal opinion should be given by the Village Attorney. This was concurred in by the Council.

Councilman Boyd stated that when the contract was entered into the agreement showed that the Village would be free of any legal encumbrances in the purchase of the system.

As to the right of the Civic Club to sell the system, was also questioned by two members present, living in this area.

Councilman Frank Starling stated that in the event the system is not adequate and would have to be "junked" shortly, it would be much better to look into the matter of providing the adequate needs, while the contractor was on the job than to go ahead and replace it at a later date.

The debate was settled by referring the matter to the attorney for a legal opinion at the next meeting.
