Four Players on "All Star;" George Sapp Wins Award

Wilton Manors can well feel proud of the Kiwanis Little League team, which won the championship in the Optimist baseball league. The Kiwanis defeated Coral Ridge last Saturday night to the tune of 8 to 1, in the playoffs.

Coral Ridge won the first half of the league set-up and Wilton Manors the second half. Last Thursday in the best two out of three games the local youngsters defeated Coral Ridge 2 to 0 and made it two straight and the championship when they again bested the same team.

In addition to winning the championship, their first year in league play, the Kiwanis team placed four members on the "all star" team. Those who made the all star team from Wilton Manors included George Sapp at ss; Ed Clagget at catcher; Tim Shelby at Pitcher and Vic Langford at the hot corner.

In addition all members of the local team received championship medals. George Sapp received the "most valuable player" award and was presented with a trophy. The Kiwanis team also received a trophy for the championship.

NOTICE

As a word of caution to those who have had water meters installed recently, the Council and City Engineer asks that the individual water consumer, check the water heater to see that it is not operating at too high a temperature.

During the past few days it has been found by the Water Department that a few heaters have been operating at too high a temperature and as a result the hot water has backed up and warped the composition disc. When this happens, the water consumer is paying for electricity or gas which is not necessary and at the same time requires the Village to remove and repair meters, which is also an added expense to the municipality.

It is suggested by the City Engineer, that for maximum efficiency the water heater should not be operated at a temperature above 140 degrees F.

Petition Of Manor Market To Be Acted On By Council

AN EDITORIAL

"For Ourselves or For the Community"

Let's call a spade a spade. The Bulletin, since its inception, has tried to be fair and open minded as regards to public issues—yet on the other hand we reserve the right to our EDITORIAL opinion. We can recall, when we went "out on a limb" and fostered the settling of the Maule Industries plant. It was our sincere conviction that the Maule plant was a good thing for this area and would not be detrimental to the community. This has been proven and the severest critics have to admit that there has been nothing to complain of from the Maule operation.

NOW we have another issue—and which should be brought into the open.

The Manor Market, for the past few months has wanted to renovate and add to their store. Plans and specifications have been submitted to the Council, months ago. The planning and zoning board has recommended that such permission be granted by the Council.

Manor Market is one of the oldest establishments in the Village and we feel has had a great deal to do with the development of the community. Through their merchandising they have brought thousands of people to Wilton Manors and through their sale of cigarettes (tax) have contributed tremendously to the financing of the Village operations. In addition there has been time and time again when Manor Market has donated to various civic enterprises as well as lending support to youth activities. This has been done without any want of advertising on their part.

Manor Market wants to improve its store. They wish to build along 23rd Street and have an entrance so that patrons may go into their parking lot from that street or from 22nd Street.

It seems that this is objectionable to Messrs. Ray C. Coleman, Mrs. Morgan Bryan and Mr. W. C. Bunch who live on 23rd Street.

At this point we would like to ask: WHAT HAVE THESE PEOPLE DONE FOR THE ADVANCEMENT AND PROGRESS OF THE COMMUNITY . . . OTHER THAN BUILDING THEIR HOMES HERE? Have they participated in community enterprises? Mr. Bunch and Mr. Coleman have businesses in Fort Lauderdale. Mr. Coleman was recently paid \$200 for performing an audit on the Village books.

The owners of Manor Market have "leaned" over backwards to appease the objectors—but it seems that they want everything their way.

Messrs. Braddy and Starling have met with practically every request that objectors have advanced except—Manor Market wants an entrance and exit on 23rd Street—this they should have. The objectors, Messrs. Bunch and Coleman say—we don't want any trucks on our street. For your information 23rd Street is a PUBLIC STREET.

We feel that the Council should grant the request of Manor Market.

The question as to whether or not Manor Market will be granted a permit for the enlargement and improvement of their store is expected to be decided at the meeting of the Council at their regular meeting on Tuesday, July 22nd.

This matter has been before the Council for many weeks and it had been recommended weeks ago to the Council by the Zoning and Planning Board that Manor Market be given the right to go ahead with their alterations.

The owners of the market have on various occasions presented plans for such improvement, however the main objectors consisting of Mr. Ray C. Coleman, Mr. W. E. Bunch, Sr. and Mrs. Morgan Bryan have appeared before the Council objecting to the original and revised plans submitted by Messrs. Braddy and Starling of Manor Market. Petitions for granting of permission, with signatures of hundreds of patrons of the store have favored such a grant by the Council. The objectors have countered with a petition of approximately 25 from residents in the particular affected area.

Previously, Manor Market had agreed to erect a five-foot retaining wall, properly painted and landscaped to enclose their anticipated paved parking area, as well as installing all refuse bins.

The bone of contention, between the parties involved, seems to be the right of Manor Market to have an entrance and exit on 23rd St., which after all is a PUBLIC STREET.

After much discussion at the recent meeting, the Village Attorney, William Miller, Jr., was authorized to draw a resolution to present to both of the contesting parties as follows: "That lot 10 and the South 62.51 feet of lot 9, block 47 shall have a building erected thereon. The West boundary line of lot 7 and the West boundary line of lot 15 and North line of lot 15 shall have a 5-foot block retaining wall with no entrance or egress on 23rd St. (Lot 10 is now zoned residential.)

In addition to the application of Manor Market a hearing will be held on the zoning ordinance of the Village, which has been advertised for the past two weeks.

Manor Market has contributed a great deal to the upkeep of the Village as throughout the year many thousands of dollars are received through the cigarette tax. In addition, they have over the course of years cooperated with all civic affairs, without want of advertising on their part.

Beth Mr. Coleman and Mr. Bunch maintain their business in Fort Lauderdale.

Village Submits Offer To Fort Lauderdale For Water System

A report was given to the Council at their meeting on July 15th by City Engineer Dunton that he had several conferences with Fort Lauderdale city officials regarding the purchase of certain pipe lines, mains and meters owned by them within the Village of Wilton Manors.

A letter was submitted by Mr. Dunton to the Council for their approval to be forwarded to City Manager Link for action by Lauderdale officials. The offer was approved by the Village Council and called for a price of approximately one-half the material cost to Fort Lauderdale. The City Engineer felt that under the circumstances the offer submitted was fair and just to both parties. Lauderdale is expected to take this matter up at their next Commission meeting.

Mr. Dunton and Mayor Hawkins of Oakland Park have had two meetings regarding the appraisal of the 6" line owned by Oakland Park now installed on Old Dixie Highway. This line is already in use and serves approximately 71 customers.

Quality of Water Good, Pressure Maintained

With water being supplied to certain areas in a little over a week, the City Engineer reports that on inspections that he has made to these consumers, most customers now using the water are generally well pleased as to the quality of water and pressure maintained. He also reports that there is room for improvement in taste and softness. As regards to softness and taste, this condition was expected when water was turned into the new system. This condition will be improved as the mains in use are not yet stabilized.

The Council would appreciate prompt payment of invoices for meter installation. This money is urgently needed for future work of the Water Department.

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School Board Authorized To Borrow \$600,000 For County Program

To keep in line with the growth in the area, the Broward County Board of Public Instruction has received authorization of the State Department of Education at Tallahassee to borrow up to \$600,000. Details of the loan were discussed by Rep. Ted David, the board's attorney, who returned from the State capital. Accompanying the attorney were Board Members Jack Watson of Hollywood and Dudley B. Rawls of Fort Lauderdale.

Healy's Sill at Top, B & C in Second; Beacon Drops to Third

The Emerson Cooke Company also handles Oakland Park water bonds.

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Phillips Appointment Expected as School Head Bennett Resigns Aug. 1

The appointment of O. K. Phillips as superintendent of public instruction is expected to take place some time before August 1. Phillips, who defeated Ulric J. Bennett in the recent election, is expected to take office five months before his regular term, due to the fact that Mr. Bennett resigned effective as of August 1.

It is necessary for Governor Fuller Warren to appoint Phillips to fill the vacancy for five months. Since Phillips has no Republican opposition in the November general election, he automatically takes office as an elected official on January 1. Bennett has held the office for the past 21 years and for five years was principal of Fort Lauderdale High school.

Rep. Ted David, attorney for the Broward County School Board, expects the Phillips appointment to be made by the Governor very shortly.

Lauderdale and Sinclair Still at Loggerhead

The oil controversy between Sinclair Refining Company and the City of Fort Lauderdale over leases on the automobile and marine service stations at Bahia-Mar Yacht Basin has resulted in no settlement at this writing.
