O. K. Phillips of Fort Lauderdale was appointed Broward County school superintendent by Governor Fuller Warren. Mr. Phillips takes the place of Ulric J. Bennett, who resigned effective as of August 1.

Broward Women's Clubs Propose Check on Books

The Broward County Federation of Women's Clubs at a recent meeting went on record proposing that a state committee be instituted to guard against use of subversive textbooks in the State of Florida.

Mrs. Ted Showalter, of Pompano Beach, president, presented a resolution at the meeting which was adopted. It was also suggested that any teacher or school official who uses a disapproved textbook be liable to criminal charges.

The Florida Federation of Women's Clubs will be asked to adopt it, Mrs. Showalter said. It will be placed before the directors of the state body at their October meeting in Deland.

It is proposed that the state legislature at its 1953 session create the textbook commission, giving the commission authority to "investigate charges of subversive material in state public school textbooks" and to hold public hearings on all books investigated.

"We don't propose burning any books," Mrs. Showalter said.

The resolution, she added, "is not aimed at any particular textbook," but only proposes a better system for screening and evaluating books.

"Parents and other citizens in all parts of the country are aware of the trend to indoctrinate school children with socialist propaganda," she declared.

"We feel that the vast majority of teachers are patriotic Americans who resent this trend in education. They would prefer teaching Americanism instead of socialism, but many are afraid to raise their voices, for jobs and pensions are at stake. Parents and taxpayers must do the job."

Mrs. Showalter also objected to what she termed the anonymity of the members of the board.

The resolution further provides that the legislature instruct the state board of education "to examine and screen textbooks, to find out if they contain any material that is seditious or tends to promote disloyalty to the United States or to favor the cause of any country with which this country might be at war (hot or cold) and see to it that all improper and dubious books are called to the attention of the textbook commission."

Legion Auxiliary Pushes Flag Display

The auxiliary asked the City Commission of Fort Lauderdale for permission to install receptacles for flags near the curbstone on the sidewalks in the downtown business area.

Even though many a picnic and beach party was rained out Sunday, we are sure that the rains were welcome to all. The parched lawns, water supply and gardens received a long awaited drenching.

Wilton Manors Furniture has received a new shipment of lamps. Drop in and look them over. We are told by Mr. Elfers that his percentage of lamp sales runs exceptionally high—no doubt that is due to his reasonable prices.

The Village Council at a special meeting held on August 1 passed a motion that the bond issue for the water distribution system be increased from the present \$100,000 to \$110,000. The motion was advanced by Councilman James Boyd, and was unanimously carried by members present including Messrs. Middleton, Boyd, Dean and Brown. Councilman Frank Sterling was absent, as he is on vacation.

The reason advanced for the increased \$10,000 was for additional pipe installations, particularly the laying of an 8" line from the Old Dixie Highway under the F.E.C. R.R. on 27th St. to the property line of the developers of Middle River Estates. The distance is approximately 467 feet.

The meeting was specifically called to hear from Engineer Crowe of Black and Associates Engineers, who designed the water system layout for the Village. Mr. Crowe stated that at the present time that the Village is practically up to the limit of the \$100,000 revenue certificate issue.

Councilman Dean, who is interested in the Middle River Estates development, stated that construction work was held in abeyance until some assurance could be given F.H.A. officials that water would be available for the development. He pointed out that 50 homes would be constructed in this development immediately.

Mr. Crowe stated that he felt that the bond issue could be increased if there was good potential business in the area. City Engineer Dunton stated that he had made a survey and felt that the R.R. crossing line would be a good investment for the Village as various new developments are underway in this area and also that approximately 20 homes do not have city water at the present time.

Mr. Anderson of the bonding company, who are handling the bond issue, stated that he had investigated the situation and agreed to increase the bond issue to the \$110,000 figure. From a business standpoint, the bond representative stated that the potential water users in this area would more than justify the additional expense for installation.

The approximate cost for this installation would be \$7,000 as outlined by Construction Manager Vadditi of Intercounty Construction Corp.

Of this amount the shoring for the tunnelling by the railroad officials and their work would be approximately \$2,000. The complete hook-up from the Dixie Highway, under the railroad line and to the property line of the Middle River Estates development would be around \$7,000.

Councilman Boyd motioned that an 8" line from the Dixie Highway along 26th Street, under the railroad to the property line of the developers be installed at an approximate cost of \$7,000 and if it has to be constructed before the bonds are validated that the Middle River Estates will pay for the same and to be paid back by the Village when validation proceedings are completed. This was unanimously carried.

Bonding company representative, Mr. Anderson, stated that the quickest time that the bonds could be validated would be in about 50 days for money to be "laid in the lap" of the Village treasury.

It was discussed that when the 8" service line is installed to the developers' property line, Middle River Estates and Coral Gardens will in-

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Zoning Board to Act On Various Requests

The plans of Tropical Gardens development has been submitted to the Zoning and Planning Board and will be acted in at the next meeting by that body. Also plans for the Food Fair new store have been submitted to Building Inspector Robert L. Newton. The stores to be erected, on the former golf driving range, call for the building to be set back approximately 35 feet from the street. The building itself will have a frontage of 125 feet and 100 feet in depth. Parking facilities will be available on the sides and rear of the building. The total property runs over 500 feet on Wilton Drive and approximately 400 foot depth.

Starts Aug. 15 Aircraft Spotting

According to an announcement made by James S. Graham, official aircraft spotting will begin in this area on August 15. Mr. Graham is supervisor of the spotting post at Bahia-Mar.

Graham stated that the preliminary schedule will call for 12-hour watch periods until a sufficient number of persons volunteer to staff a 24-hour post operations.

To date, he disclosed, only 35 volunteers have been enlisted. The corps will need at least 80 to man the tower 24 hours a day under a two-hour watch, per man per week.

"We would like to have the system organized whereby duties will not hard press the individual volunteers," Graham said. Two hours per week has been decided as the most convenient schedule for the majority of persons enlisted in the corps.

A second classroom session with Air Force instructors from the Miami Filter Center is scheduled at 8 P. M. Aug. 1 at City Hall.

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Twice the number of people applied for old-age insurance payments during the first week of July, according to Paul L. Byrley, manager of the Fort Lauderdale office, that applied in the last week of June.

Byrley credits the sharp rise to the fact that a number of people now applying for old-age insurance have completed a year and a half of work after 1950. This, he explains, makes it possible for them to have their benefits figured under the new formula which can be used only when a person has one and a half years of covered work after 1950. In most cases, the use of this formula gives a higher monthly benefit to a retired worker than would be possible if his earnings before 1951 were used in figuring his average monthly wage.

He anticipates a further increase in the number of 65-year-old applicants because of a new provision in the law which permits those who retire this year to have recent wages used immediately in figuring the amount of their benefit payments. If they have on and a half years of work covered by the law after 1950, it is no longer necessary for those retiring in 1952 to come back six months later in order to have such wages included in figuring of their benefit amount.

Another provision of the amended law, R.M. Byrley points out, is of special importance to self-employed people over 65 who retired or who plan to retire this year. Before the passage of the amendments their earnings for the year in which the application was filed could not be used to figure their old-age benefit payments. Now, a self-employed person who applies for and receives old-age benefits this year may re-apply after the close of his taxable year and have his 1952 earnings used in refiguring his monthly benefit payments. Similarly, the survivors of a self-employed person who dies in 1952 may ask to have the 1952 earnings included in figuring their monthly benefits. In general, this will mean that benefits payable on the account of a self-employed person who retired this year will be larger than as originally computed, Byrley says.

Another new provision in the law is important to beneficiaries who have continued working after reaching age 75. If they have had a year and a half of work covered by the law after 1950, their benefits can be refigured under the new formula, Byrley says.

Park Water Meter Connections Authorized

On the suggestion of Councilman J. Marvin Brown, the Council authorized that Intercounty Construction Corp. make water connections to the two "praks" in the Village and that water meters be installed.

A few weeks ago the Women's Club was given permission for the beautification of these two areas. It is anticipated that shrubs will be planted by donations from local nurserymen.

stall service lines in the streets of the developments and arrangements made with the Village for repayment out of water revenue of customers of this area over a period of years.

Mr. Lou Vanditti of Intercounty Construction Corp., construction managers for the Village, told the Council that his organization regarding the actual financing of the system were reluctant to take on any added work beyond the revised engineering plans and would be forced to delay any future extensions. Mr. Vanditti pointed out that the contract called for 60 to 70 days for validation and now a time period of 90 days has passed without bonds being validated.

Engineer Crowe stated to Couocil that his firm would engineer the water system plans in the Middle River Estates and Coral Gardens developments at no extra cost to the Villaga. These plats are already on file with his of-

ice and the engineering firm will handle the details as to the requirements of the State Board of Health and the Fire Underwriters. A motion was passed to include these systems in the overall Wilton Manors water system plan.
