School Budget Passed by Board

With only one objection, a record school budget was approved by the Broward school board. The budget was for \$5,761,153.

After the trustees meet and consider the financial program, it will be taken to Tallahassee by Supt. O. K. Phillips for approval by state officials.

Dudley Rawls, Fort Lauderdale Board member, voiced the only objection to the budget, but he voted for it anyway.

He told the board he was not in favor of paying \$108,487 to retire the South Broward High School bonds. He said the bonds were a district issue and are supposed to be paid off by a district levy.

Instead they are being paid out of countywide revenue—although South Broward people argue that they still get only their proportionate share of current revenue.

Business Group Holds Meeting

In spite of the inclement weather a goodly crowd of merchants was on hand at the re-organization of the Wilton Manors Business Group at a meeting held on Aug. 19.

Plans for cooperative and individual advertising were discussed for publicizing the various type businesses operating in Wilton Manors. Many merchants present voiced the opinion that in the Village there was practically every type business store comparable to larger communities. President Les Bagwell pointed out that the easy accessibility of Wilton Manors for shopping and easy parking was a decided asset to invite outside shoppers into the community. A committee will be appointed to work up details for an advertising campaign and will report back at the next meeting as to progress.

TEACHERS PREPARE FOR SCHOOL DAYS

Presidential Election Books Open 'til Oct. 4; Special Primary Oct. 14

Broward County Supervisor of registration, Easter L. Gates, estimates that more than 45,000 registered voters are expected to cast ballots in the November general elections.

Mrs. Gates expects that 2,000 more persons will register between now and Oct. 4, the date on which the books close before the November balloting.

A special Democratic primary will be held on Oct. 14 when Democrats will nominate a candidate for the Florida Supreme Court seat which had been held by the late Justice Roy H. Chapman.

To be eligible to vote in the special primary, residents must register by Sept. 13 since the books must close one month in advance of the balloting.

Mrs. Gates states that the books will not be closed for registration for the November election until Oct. 4, however, but if the individual desires to ballot in the special primary he must effect registration by Sept. 13.

In order to permit voters to register until Oct. 4 for the presidential election, the following procedure has been adopted by the county supervisor's office.

Those registering after Sept. 13 will not be eligible to vote in the special primary Oct. 14 but may cast ballots in November.

Those individuals will not be given their registration certificate card but the cards will be mailed to them after the special primary. And those persons will not be carried on the rolls as eligible to vote in the state to nominate a Supreme Court Justice.

Anyone desiring to register is reminded that he must have lived in the state for one year and Broward County for six months.

Naturalized citizens are instructed to bring their naturalization papers to the registration office.

Any individual who is a property owner and desires to be registered as a freeholder is advised to have available the lot and block number of the property held and the name of the subdivision in which it is located.

As to changes in party affiliation, Mrs. Gates says that according to a law passed at the 1951 session of the State Legislature the voter cannot change his party membership between a primary and general election.

The supervisor explains that if the voter was registered as a Democrat before the May primary he may not change his listed party until after the November elections.

Mrs. Gates points out, however, that the registered party affiliation in no way prohibits the individual from voting either the Democratic or Republican ticket in the general elections.

The registered party affiliation may be changed in the supervisor's office after Nov. 9.

For the May primaries there were 35,802 registered Democrats in comparison to 6,520 Republicans. At that time, there were 279 listed as non-partisan, independent or registered in other categories.

Registered to vote in the off-presidential year of 1950 were 28,121 Democrats and 3,726 Republicans.

In anticipation of the opening of school, a three-day Broward County pre-school teachers conference opened Monday with registration of teachers. Approximately 100 new teachers will take up their duties on Sept. 8 in the County school system. Officials predict that a decided increase in enrollment in the schools will take place, in view of the increased building in the area.

The Wilton Manors school is expected to top the figure of last year. Many new pupils are expected to enroll on account of the new homes erected in the Sunset Manors development, and other Village building.

Dr. Doak S. Campbell, president of Florida State University, delivered the keynote address, "Our Schools—Our Best Defense," at the opening session of a three-day Broward County pre-school teachers conference at South Broward High School. The address followed a general registration of teachers, scheduled for 7:15 P. M.

The Monday evening session was presided over by Fannie Catlett, president of the Broward County Classroom Teachers Associations and guests included all trustees and members of the Broward County School Board; State Senator George W. Laird, State Reps. John S. Burwell and Thomas E. David, Congressman Dwight L. Rogers and presidents of all county parent-teacher associations.

All teachers were welcomed by O. K. Phillips, superintendent of public instruction. An informal reception followed Dr. Campbell's address.

On Tuesday, following an address by Phillips in which he outlined the school calendar, a panel discussion, "The Future of Education in Florida" ensued. The Tuesday session opened at 8:30 A. M. Lunch was served at 12:15 P. M. in the school cafeteria and there was a general assembly at 1:15 P. M. presided over by Edna Jacobs, chairman of elementary school principals. Departmental meetings, both elementary and secondary, were held at 2 P. M.

The Wednesday session also began at 8:30 A. M. The program included an address by Robert L. Gates, "The Challenge of Children's Needs."

At 10:15 A. M., a panel discussion, "Living in a Confused World—the School's Responsibility," was held, with Dr. Broward Culpepper as moderator.

Today and from Sept. 2 through Sept. 5, special sessions of elementary and secondary school faculties will work in their respective schools.

Tomorrow the Florida Education Association district meeting will be held at Municipal Auditorium, Bayfront Park, Miami. It will open at 8:30 A. M., recess for lunch and resume at 3 P. M.

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**Harmony Farms Battles
 To Keep Milk Price**

M. D. McCormack, co-partner in the operation of Harmony Farms Dairy is leading the fight to gain public support in order to maintain a five-cent saving on the price of milk sold in half-gallon bottles on a cash-and-carry basis.

Harmony Farms operate a retail store on Wilton Drive, managed by Mrs. Lillian Wilson. Harmony Farms operated 10 retail outlet stores in Broward and Dade Counties.

McCormack hopes to have a good representation of consumers at the Tuesday public hearing in the Court House on the price-fixing question.

The Florida Milk Commission will hear a petition asking that it prohibit the sale of milk in one-half gallon bottles in dairy-owned and operated stores at five cents less than the cost of two quarts delivered at the home or sold through retail outlets.

In the 10 stores in Broward and Dade Counties operated by Harmony Farms, handbills are being distributed today over the counters calling attention to the Tuesday hearing.

"Let the milk commission and the big milk interests know that you do not want to be deprived of the savings now passed on to you," the handbills say.

The authorization for this price differential was granted by the milk commission about two years ago.

Dan McCarty Favors U.S. 1 Improvements First

Dan McCarty, Democratic nominee for governor, in a recent announcement stated that he believes that improvements should be made in U. S. 1 before getting involved in a turnpike.
