## Payment of Meters And Water Urged by Water Department

City Engineer Dunton reports that people are lax in making their payment for water meters. He points out that when meters are installed that they are to be paid for within a period of ten days. Neighboring cities, according to the water department, insist on payment before the meter is installed.

The water department feels however, that people who owe bills for meter installation and water invoices have momentarily neglected their obligation to the Village water department.

The City Engineer states that for the information of the consumer that payment in full or in part for installation of the meter is due within 10 days after installation and water bills for water consumed is due within the same period after receipt of invoice.

When this time limit has expired, the water department has the legal right to shut off the city water. The water department or Village Council do not wish to work a hardship on any consumer, but meters and water bills must be paid for promptly. Payment of these bills is necessary if the Village is to operate without a loss and to meet their financing obligations.

The water department head states that other cities follow the same procedure as outlined above for the collection of meter installations and payment of water invoices. At the present time there are 42 meters that have not been paid for and 65 water bills remain unpaid and classified as delinquent accounts.

Big Increase Over Last Year

### WATER RATES

The question has been raised by some users of water as to what the set-up is regarding the cost to the consumer. In order that these people may be informed we repeat once again that water to the consumer will be charged for at a minimum rate of \$2.50 per month per consumer. This allows the consumer up to 5,000 gallons. Any consumption beyond this point will be charged for at the rate of 50c per thousand gallons. This notation appears on the bottom of all water bills.

### Installation Cost Explained by Water Department

The water department has received some complaints as to cost in regard to installation of pipe that goes under the street and in some cases where pipe does not go under the street.

City Engineer Dunton states that in the July 10th issue of The Bulletin he made the following statement and which he wishes to repeat at this time

"It is not known at this time, but there is extreme likelihood of the meter installation cost going up when you have to depend on hand labor to place pipe under the paved street after all mechanical equipment is moved off the job."

In the same article of July 10 the City Engineer stated: "It is suggested by the water department that those property owners who do not have meters installed now, but plan on having water installed in the near future, should be informed again of this fact; that the meter, which remains the property of the Village, is installed under their contract with the Intercounty Construction Corp., at the charge of \$50 per installation. This can be done at this price only because the Intercounty Construction Corp. has air pressure drilling equipment which speeds up installation."

### Dean Elected to Kiwanis Presidency

Councilman James C. Dean was elected as president of the Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club for 1953 at the recent Kiwanis election. Duke Hartman was elected as 1st Vice-President and Lou Menefee as 2nd Vice-President.

The president for 1952 is Arthur Wolfe. With the election of Mr. Dean it will be the third president of the Kiwanis since its inception, the first president being Frank O. Miller. The new officers will be installed at a later date.

The Kiwanis Club of the Village has been in existence approximately only three years, but have already done outstanding civic work in the community. They sponsored the ball field at the school as well as holding many parties for the kiddies of the community on various occasions.

The Kiwanis Little Leaguers, sponsored by the local Club, made an outstanding record in league competition this past season, winning the championship.

The school bell rang at Wilton Manors school on Monday for approximately 285 pupils from the Village and vicinity.

According to Principal W. Bryan Davis, when the school started last September there were 183 enrolled, however this figure has been increased over 100. A good deal of the increased enrollment is due to the tremendous development in the Village and surrounding areas which the school serves. Mr. Davis also cited that the peak enrollment was 256 for last year and that the present figure of 285 may be increased.

Principal Davis stated that the increased enrollment has made it necessary to have two first grade classes, two second grade classes and two sixth grade classes. The first grade teachers will be Miss Susie R. Meredith and Miss Clare Welker. The second grade teacher will be Miss Jean E. Parker. The third grade teacher assigned is Miss Lillias A. Miller. The fourth grade teacher will be Miss Jacquelyn Robertson. In all probability Miss Virginia Skeene will be assigned to each a combination 3rd and 4th grade. Mrs. Billie K. Mattmuller and Mrs. Edith Hammond will teach the two fifth grades. The two sixth grade teachers will be Mr. George Robinson III and Mrs. Ina M. Tresca. Mrs. Ruth S. Van der Walt will be the music teacher.

Principal Davis also pointed out that the eating room of last year will be used as an "all purpose" room. The time schedule has been set up with the first bell at 8:20 and the tardy bell at 8:30. The noon period for all children will be between 12 and 1 P. M. For those who are unable to go home, Mr. Davis suggests that they bring pack lunches. Children may be able to purchase milk or ice cream products. All children who eat their lunch at school will utilize their respective class rooms under the supervision of their teachers.

O. K. Phillips, superintendent of public instruction, has announced that an advance enrollment of 14,587, during the Wednesday and Thursday registration period. It is expected that another 2,000 will be enrolled on the opening of school this week. It is expected by school officials that at the peak of the season there will be an enrollment close to the 20,000 mark for the County. The total enrollment for last year was 18,000, however only 14,000 enrolled in advance.

### Fire Company Fund Drive to Continue

The Volunteer Fire Department is continuing its drive for funds. Many residents have been away and all call backs have not been made. It was decided at the meeting Monday night to continue for a short period. Authorization was given for the purchase of 4 complete outfits for the trucks. This includes raincoats, pants, boots and hats. It was reported that Vern Shelby was elected as a trustee at the County Association meeting held recently. Chief Elmer Novack reported that he attended the recent county dance. So far, \$510.00 has been collected from residents and business for the equipment fund. The meeting was in charge of President Saxer and Sec. Harry Wells.

**"High" Water Bills  
Explained by Dept.**

The City Engineer announces that some residents of Sunset Manors section have complained of the "high" water bills which they have received. In explanation of this, the water department states that when the water system in this section was taken over from Mr. Broliar, it was found on inspection that there were 38 "stuck" water meters not registering. At this time these people were paying a minimum of \$2.25 due to the "stuck" meters, however they were consuming a good deal more than for which they were paying. According to the water department spokesman, these 38 "stuck" meters were removed and replaced by new meters, the result being that the water was then accurately metered and recorded.

The Village Council has gone on record opposing the reduction of any water bill unless a recommendation is made by the City Engineer showing that the meter is defective or a reading has been incorrectly made.

All residents are urged to pay their bills promptly at the water department office located in Frank O. Mil-

The section north of Sixth Ave. and geographically plotted and identified as section 3, for meter reading purposes, will on their first billing receive somewhat larger bills than can be normally expected. The reasons for this, as outlined by the water department, is that meter reading sections must be staggered during the month so that the meter reader can read one or more sections during a day's time. To get this plan started, section 3 has been using water for about six weeks and as a result their first consumer bill will be higher than the regular four week water bill, which will be rendered monthly hereafter.

## Tax Rate Unchanged; Council Passes Budget

Oakland Park tax rate will remain the same as last year. A 14-mill tax levy for operating expenses was adopted by the Council at their meeting last Wednesday night. A budget of \$71,483 was adopted by the Council.

Anticipated cost of operating the city during the 1952-53 fiscal year is \$23,653 above the \$41,619 required last year. Operating revenue is expected to reach \$71,483, a \$28,105 increase over the \$43,378 collected this year.

City Clerk Elizabeth Tucker stated that a \$340,150 increase in taxable property during the past year brings the total assessed valuation to more than \$2,212,000.

The increase is expected to boost the total tax revenue for the coming year to more than \$14,000, an increase of nearly \$3,000 over last year.

The proportionate increase in the town's tax roll and operating expenses is responsible for the operating millage remaining the same as last year, commissioners explained.

Anticipated revenue includes taxes, \$14,343; fines, \$1,000; business licenses, \$3,000; water services, \$24,000; garbage collection, \$6,500; meter department, \$3,000; dog licenses, \$40; permits, \$1,200; installations, \$500; miscellaneous, \$300; cigarette tax, \$11,000 and power franchise, \$3,000.

Estimated expenditures are water production, \$10,000; water meter refunds, \$500; garbage collections, \$5,000; police department, \$3,200; fire department, \$2,500; and salaries, \$4,500.

Office expenses, \$600; insurance, \$1,800; legal fees, \$7,000; audit, \$250; inspections, \$350; city court, \$280; elections, \$100; city park, \$1,500 and miscellaneous, \$1,500.

**Council Meeting Highlights**

TUESDAY, SEPT. 9

At the Council meeting Tuesday night, the developers of property east of the F.E.C. R.R. at 26th Street, agreed to place the 8" water main under the railroad at their expense to be repaid by the Village at a later date out of water revenue collected from consumers in that particular area.

An ordinance which regulates traffic on the streets was adopted.

Final maps of the Village were presented by James W. McLaughlin, surveyors.

An ordinance establishing a water department with rules and regulations was adopted.

It was decided to contact Black and Associates Engineers for the water system to make a survey as to condition of independent water lines claimed to be owned by individuals in the Village. Councilman Dean, who presided in absence of Earle Middleton, was of the opinion that the asking price for these systems was too high. He felt that it would be wiser to have the system thoroughly checked, before paying individuals for the same. Mr. Dean was of the opinion that new installations would be less costly. Those submitting claims for their system included Nils Yde, Russell Frye, Victor Rothrock and J. Marvin Brown. The motion previously passed for the purchase of J. Marvin Brown's system was rescinded until further investigation by Black and Associates.

A check of \$2,037.34 of cigarette tax monies for the month of July was received.

A letter from Southern Bell suggesting installation of 3 telephone booths in the Village was received. Councilman Frank Starling will investigate placement.

A letter requesting that a flasher warning signal light be placed on 26th Street R.R. crossing will be forwarded to F.E.C. R.R.

**Manor Market Makes Progress on Building**

Good progress is being made on the addition to Manor Market. Following Labor Day, construction was under way. Already walls have been erected in the rear of the market for the addition. The bulldozer has been at work in preparing ground for the off-street parking for the benefit of the patrons of the market. The owners, Messrs. Braddy and Starling, have already received notice from the manufacturers that their refrigerators, freezers and display cases are on the way from San Antonio, Texas. There will be approximately 155 feet of display refrigerated meat cases installed in the renovated market. The store when completed will be one of the most modern of its type in the area.

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
