Tropical Gardens Plat Discussed by Zone Board

The matter of final approval of the plat of Tropical Gardens came before the Zoning Board, Monday night. This question has been hanging fire for many weeks since Mr. Al Hagen submitted plans for approval. Previously the Zoning Board had written a letter granting approval. At Monday's meeting a motion was passed to write a letter of explanation to the Village Council. The letter to be forwarded is as follows:

"By our letter dated August 30, we gave tentative approval to the Tropical Gardens subdivision. The wishes of this board to respectfully request of the developer and Village Council that the proposed Cypress Drive be made a minimum of 50 foot right of way instead of 25 feet as proposed in the original tentative plat.

School Enrollment 302 Announced by Davis

Principal W. Bryan Davis of Wilton Manors School announces that the enrollment as of Monday totaled 302 pupils. The tremendous increase over last year has made it necessary for a redistribution of pupils among the teaching personnel.

Mr. Davis stated that Miss Susie Meredith of the first grade, Miss Jean Parker of the second, Miss Lilius of grade three and Miss Jacquelyn Robertson of the fourth grade will have a pupil load of 32 to 36 pupils.

Miss Claire Welker will have a combination first and second grade and Miss Virginia Skeene will teach a combination third and fourth grade. This is necessary on account of the overcrowding in certain classes.

The enrollment according to classes is as follows: first, 56; second, 42; third, 43; fourth, 48; fifth, 63; sixth, 50.

Regulations on Plats Set by Zone Board

The following motion was unanimously adopted at the Zoning Board meeting last Monday night:

Any tentative plat furnished this board may receive tentative approval pending the submission of the finished plat to this Board for final approval and recommendations to the Council. One copy of the tentative plat will be furnished and remain in custody of the Zoning Board.

The two new additional members of the Zoning Board, Paul McElhattan and Charles A. Saxer, participated in the meeting.

Wilton Manors To Benefit Proposed Traffic Improvement

Business Group Invites Supt. O. K. Phillips

Broward County school authorities are greatly concerned by the increased enrollment and the need for providing adequate housing facilities to take care of the yearly increase. Durable being built but there is a noticeable lack of cafeterias, auditoriums, libraries, etc. In our Wilton Manors school there is much need for a cafeteria.

At the recent meeting of the Business Group improvements to the school were discussed. With this thought in mind Superintendent O. K. Phillips has been invited to attend a meeting to address the businessmen as to what could be hoped for in the matter of improvements to the school and grounds.

School officials contend that the pay as you go plan which provides money for the class rooms won't go far enough to provide other necessary improvements.

The school board has a plan which will go before the voters at the November general election. It is a proposed constitutional amendment.

In 1950, two bond issues put before the voters failed to win approval because of a lack of freeholder votes.

The amendment, if it is approved, would make it possible for the Broward board to get almost immediately \$3,200,000 to put into a building program to provide adequate facilities for both White and Negro students.

Generally the amendment provides that some of the revenue derived from the licensing of motor vehicles be used for capital outlay and debt service purposes to construct new buildings.

This money is already being used largely for schools. The amendment would make it possible for the school board to borrow against the anticipated revenue of the next 30 years.

In other words, instead of getting the money at a rate of \$400 per teaching unit each year, the board would get 75 per cent of the estimated revenue for 30 years at one time.

The state board of education would handle arrangements for the loan-issuing revenue certificates on request of the school board.

Each year the board of education would use the current funds accruing to the county to retire the revenue certificates.

The Broward board has already put in its request for the necessary survey of school facilities which would precede the bond issue. Local officials hope to be the first to benefit under the amendment, if it is approved.

Members of the board are supporting the proposed amendment and have so indicated by passing a resolution.

They point out that the amendment would make it possible for Broward County to catch up in its school program.

"Mac" and "Laffy" Werner Now Parents

Wilton Manors' population was increased during the past week when it was announced that Mr. and Mrs. Miles Werner of Fifth Avenue are the proud parents of a son, who answers to the name of Thomas.

The Wilton Manors Business Group has gone on record for the widening of Fourth Avenue and lending their support to an organization from Fort Lauderdale for such an improvement. The local businessmen endorsed the idea at last week's meeting and named Paul McElhattan as their representative.

Behind the proposed plan is a new organization known as the Third and Fourth Avenue Improvement Association of Fort Lauderdale, and which is headed by Mr. P. G. Wilson of W. Ocean Blvd. At a meeting of the Association last Friday night, residents of the north side who are pushing for a new 80-foot north-south traffic artery from Wilton Manors to the southern section of Lauderdale, were enthused over the idea.

The traffic route would follow Wilton Drive through Wilton Manors, connect with Fourth Avenue at Fort Lauderdale at the city line and join with Third Avenue at the FEC RR tracks. The artery would also connect with Federal Highway north of Lauderdale by way of the new proposed extension of 26th Street in Wilton Manors. Already a new bridge for extension of 26th Street over the river is being contemplated and work on this construction is expected to start shortly.

It was pointed out at the meeting percent of the right of way along N. E. Fourth Avenue from the FEC RR tracks to the Lauderdale city line is assured.

Mr. McElhattan is expected to attend the city commission meeting in Fort Lauderdale when the Improvement Association members will ask for the widening of N. E. Fourth Avenue from 60 to 80 feet from the railroad to the Village limits.

Local businessmen in the Village are enthused over such an improvement, feeling that it will tend to facilitate the movement of traffic in and out of the Village.

Zoning Board Has No "New" Map

Members of the Zoning Board at their meeting on Monday night were very much "put out" for not having been supplied the new map of the Village. A representative of the surveyors firm, which made the Village map, reported that six copies had been supplied to the Village Council. It was the consensus of the Board members that certainly, if anybody should have a map, the Zoning Board should have top priority. It was expressed that no more meetings be held until a map is supplied. A request is to be made to the Village Council for the new map.

McJunkin Plat Temporarily Delayed

A plat was submitted by a representative of J. Morgan McJunkin at the Zoning Board meeting Monday night. Plans called for a re-subdivision of Block 21 on Wilton Drive between Nakomis Drive and N. E. Seventh Ave. The property in question is zoned for business. The Board tabled the matter for the time being until satisfactory easements for utilities is shown. The owners will be asked to re-submit the revised plat.

Traffic Ordinance in Effect, Parking Is Common Offense

With the new traffic code recently passed by the Council and now in effect, the Police Department reports that the measure coincides with the State Traffic regulations. Parking regulations will be strictly adhered to in the Village. All parking violators are subject to \$1.00 for each offense and such fine may be paid at the Police Headquarters or by mail, on a plea of guilty.

Election of safety patrol officers will be held sometime this week and the members will be given instructions as to their duties.



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
