## Registration Office Candidates Exchange Verbal Blows

With the November general election not too far off, one of the hottest political fights developing is between the two rival candidates for the office of Broward County's Supervisor of Registration. The present incumbent and Democratic nominee, Mrs. Easter L. Gates and her Republican opponent, Mrs. Gwendolyn Shoquist for the past two weeks have been exchanging verbal blows.

The GOP candidate has charged that the present incumbent has stated that the present inaccurate condition of the voting list is due to lack of money and manpower.

Mrs. Shoquist on occasions has said: "It appears to me that \$45,000 is definitely not a lack of money. Could it be a lack of efficient manpower?"

Mrs. Gates, after learning of Mrs. Shoquist's remarks has countered with the statement that she has no control over her office finances. The present incumbent however has admitted that she has hired eight additional employees who all work on an hourly basis. This was caused by a rush of registrants during the last month before the books close for general election.

Mrs. Shoquist says that it is time to have a little good competition in government because it makes for a much healthier condition.

## Low Water Pressure Explained by Dunton

According to City Engineer Dunton, water pressure or the complete lack of it around the Dixie Highway section occurred on Tuesday the 17th. The cause was due to Oakland Park Water Department workmen taking out a portion of a by-pass line which services between Oakland Park and Wilton Manors. This allowed only that small amount of water to flow which could pass through a slightly open defective 4" check valve to reach the consumers.

According to Dunton, good pressure in this section can be expected as connection has been made between the 6" and 8" lines at the junction of Wilton Manor Drive and Old Dixie Highway. Work on the repairs was held up for some time, due to the heavy rains.

The City Engineer reports that lack of engineering details of mains between the two communities was another factor which retarded correction of the trouble.

## Village License Deadline September 20

Robert L. Newton, who issues occupational licenses in the Village, reminds those renewing the same that the deadline is Sept. 30. Mr. Newton, who is also Building Inspector, has notified by mail those already holding licenses. Renewal notices have gone out to 172 holders of occupational licenses. At the present time 177 hold occupational licenses from the Village. Mr. Newton feels that the license holders this year will be close to the 200 mark.

## Manor Kiwanis Co-Sponsor of "Kids Day" Saturday

Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club, which has done outstanding work for the kids of the community are continuing their good work when they join up with the Kiwanians of Fort Lauderdale in playing host to an expected 900 children on Saturday, September 27th. The occasion will be the observance of "National Kids Day," which will be simultaneously sponsored by Kiwanis throughout the country.

Wilton Manors Kiwanis is working in conjunction with the Downtown and Beach Kiwanis Clubs, under the capable chairmanship of Dr. Robert W. Gates.

A four-hour program of games, picnicking and movies at the Bay Scout Hut in Holiday Park is on tap for hundreds of kids who plan to be present.

All boys and girls between 6 and 12 years of age will be welcome. Transportation will be arranged for those unable to furnish their own. A number of prizes will be awarded, the top one being a bicycle.

The program will begin at 4 P. M. with games and sports events. These will be in charge of Temple Jarrell, Lauderdale recreation director and Jack Elliott of Beach Kiwanis. The sports contests will be followed by a picnic supper and a western movie, with the festivities ending at about 8 P. M.

I ordered three maps for the water department and one for the Fire Department. In reference to Black and Associates; they are the engineering firm who planned the Village water system.

Sgt. W. D. (Bill) Newton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Newton of N. E. 24th St., will always believe that the numeral 13 is really his lucky number. The Marine, who is 22 years of age, returned home to happy mother and father Friday night, after having served for a year in Korean front lines. Young Newton was wounded and received the Purple Heart, and in his previous letters home to his parents he refrained from telling of his battle wound—so not to worry them.

In an interview Sunday afternoon at the Newton home, Bill told the writer that 13 was sure his lucky number. He cited that he was number 13 in the 13th draft, he left on the 13th day and his ship going over was number 13. In addition he stated that it took 13 days to go over. Still joking with his lucky 13, Bill said that he was evacuated on the 13th of March from the lines, and coming home he was the 13th man to board ship. "The only time 13 was not my number" was the fact that I was so anxious to get home from San Francisco that by driving with friends it only took 11 days. On arriving home, Bill asked his mother: "How many cats do we have?" and was told 13.

Asked as to how he and his comrades felt as to the armistice talks which have been going on for many months, the young Sergeant stated that they were justified and that the enemy was just biding time. He further pointed out that we are taking it and bearing it but they don't like the situation at all.

The young Marine also felt that the people in the States were not thinking too much of the war in Korea. "The only ones who think about it are those who are directly interested and who have their own boys over there."

Asked about the weather conditions, the young Marine said that it was terrifically cold in winter and there were many casualties from frostbite—not as the dickens in summer and rainy in between. In other words he liked Florida much better. He cited that when on the front lines that the fellows live in bunkers, similar to caves. One of his combat positions was on hill S12 close to Muan.

When questioned as to the goods he stated that he had no conversation with them, but they were at all times dropping propaganda leaflets leaving them where they knew U. S. patrols would pick them up. Some of the propaganda messages the Marine sergeant showed the writer. These included such remarks as "Demand Peace," "Stop the War." Other messages, which according to the writer

## Purge Vote List Posted in Precincts

Supervisor of Registration Easter L. Gates reported that a list of persons who have been purged from the registration roll will be posted in all precinct polling places.

The registrar also reported that names of deceased persons and others who have moved from the county and persons who have otherwise disqualified themselves are included on the purge list.

In addition, the registrar advises, any person who finds his name on the list and feels he is still eligible to vote should apply to Mrs. Gates for reinstatement for eligibility.

There really should be two Fritz Greenboom's or more than 24 hours a day. Besides taking care of the water plant all Fritz does is: read about 500 meters, install service, make repairs, overhaul meters if not to involved and answer all complaints. That's all, other than being on call 24 hours.

gent really got the boys up in the air, read: "You're getting the rotation run around." And still others, directly addressed to the Marines, said: "Another winter is coming, 12,000 of your comrades have been killed and thousands are casualties from frostbite."

In speaking of the rotation plan in Korea itself, the local Marine said that you are in the lines for three months and then are relieved for one month to go back to the rear for training. Following the month training period you are reassigned for another three months in the lines, but never to the same location as your previous assignment.

Commenting on the South Koreans, young Newton said that they were pretty good fighters and they thought we were the greatest on earth. He said that good number of the South Koreans took care of bringing up food, supplies and ammunition for the front line troops.

Sgt. Newton cited that on many occasions the enemy disregarded the neutral zone. He said that they fired on U. N. troops, but that we could not return the fire unless the enemy attacked in a body. On one occasion he cited that he saw a U. N. platoon cut down.

Sgt. Newton left Wilton Manors on June 30, 1951 and will be home for a thirty day leave following which he will report to Camp LeJune for reassignment. He is a member of the 5th Marines, Dog Company and during his Korean service was stationed on the Eastern front. While at home, Newton says he is just going to rest and rest and catch up on his sleep.

In closing the interview, the Marine stated that in his opinion and his buddies, that this was the worst war that has been fought, which is evidenced by the number killed and the long list of casualties.
