Wilton Manors P.T.A. Sponsors Carnival

Work on 26th Street Extension Progressing Rapidly

Construction work on the extension of 26th Street, across the FEC RR is progressing rapidly. As reported, weeks ago in The Bulletin, the widening of the roadway right of way has been underway. Trucks have been busy during the week rocking the roadbed. It is expected that construction of the bridge, across Middle River, will be completed in about two months time. This connects with Federal Highway.

Another project to start shortly in the same area is the installation of water mains under the railroad tracks for water service to developers of property east of the tracks. It was recently pointed out by Councilman Dean that FHA approval for erection of homes would not be granted until "city" water was installed in the area. Already plans for such installation have been filed by Engineer Bill Crowe of Black and Associates both with the FEC RR officials and with the State Board of Health.

Payment of Water Bills; Meter Installations

The following notice is called to the attention of the residents of the Village:

"Again we must bring to the attention of all water consumers, the fact that all water invoices must be paid promptly.

"Section No. 4 of the Water Ordinance states: All accounts shall be due and payable on the date statements are submitted to the consumer and in the event of failure of any consumer of water supplied by the Town of Wilton Manors to pay the account within ten (10) days, after the same shall become due and payable, the City Engineer or Supt. of the Water Works is hereby authorized and directed to disconnect said consumers' water supply and the same shall not be turned on until all past due accounts shall have been paid.

"Section No. 6 states: 'Only authorized persons connected with the Water Department are permitted to turn on or shut off a water meter. There shall be a charge of \$1.50 for each call to turn water on or off.'

"Section No. 16 outlines a penalty of a fine of 'not to exceed \$500 or imprisonment not to exceed 60 days, or other such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Municipal Court of the Town of Wilton Manors' for a violation of Section No. 4 and other sections of the Water Ordinance."

Village Buys Pipe Line From Oakland Park

Mayor Dewey Hawkins of Oakland Park appeared before the Council at the recent meeting pressing that municipality's plea for the purchase by Wilton Manors of approximately 2300 feet of water mains located on the Old Dixie Highway. After much debate, the Village Council decided to purchase the pipe, after proper measurement, at \$1.50 per foot.

The question of payment for the water mains has been hanging fire for many months. An appraisal committee consisting of a representative from the Village, one from Oakland Park and a neutral appraiser have had various meetings to try to settle the question.

Mayor Hawkins cited the contract between the two municipalities which was entered into on February 21, 1952. According to Hawkins, the contract called for the purchase by the Village for all 6" pipe line on the Old Dixie, within and without the southern boundaries of the Village.

City Engineer Dunton stated that he felt that \$1.00 per foot was a good price to pay for the water lines. The Oakland Park executive, in pressing his claim stated, that from present engineers' estimates, the line would cost \$2.50 a foot. In addition, Mayor Hawkins stated that already it had cost his municipality \$10,000 for laying mains for water service to Wilton Manors. The Oakland Park Mayor also advanced the argument that for some time, due to a defective valve, Wilton Manors had been receiving approximately 40,000 gallons daily of unmetered water. This in itself, was a loss to Oakland Park.

The Village Council, as a whole, felt that the Village through action by the previous Council had agreed to purchase the line and from the fairness of the request that purchase be authorized at the compromise figure of \$1.50 per foot.

Civic Association Resumes Meetings

After suspension of meetings during the summer months, the Civic Association will resume its monthly schedule with the first meeting of the fall season on Monday, Oct. 6 at Village Hall.

President Frank Hainey has requested all members to be present as important business will be presented. In addition entertainment and refreshments will be provided for members and guests.

Asked by Richardson

Mr. George Richardson appeared before the Council requesting that the Village "welcome sign" near the south boundary on Wilton Drive be re-located.

Mr. Richardson pointed out that the sign does not add to the appearance of the golf course property. The sign, as presently located, is on the right of way. President Earle Middleton suggested that the sign be moved south, closer to the bridge. Mr. Richardson will report to the Council at a later date as to whether or not this suggestion meets with the objector's views.

Dogs at Large

Objected to by Riebling

Henry W. Riebling of 2400 N. E. Eighth Ave. writes to the effect that he is being troubled with dogs running at large. Mr. Riebling states that he has two small children who love to play on their lawn, but due to the unsanitary conditions created by dogs, that it is practically impossible to allow the children to play on their own property.

Mr. Riebling suggests that people who have dogs, and when necessary to take them for a walk, to see that they are on leash. He further suggests that owners of dogs be held responsible for any damage or defacing of property done by their pets.

C. Wilson Brown Questions Signs

C. Wilson Brown appeared before the Village Council at their recent meeting calling attention that private advertising signs were attached to the poles which bore Wilton Manors directional signs.

Mr. Brown stated that permission had been received from Fort Lauderdale authorities some time ago for placement of directional markers with the stipulation that no private advertising signs were to be attached to the poles. Mr. Brown stated that he had noticed an advertising marker on the corner of Fourth and 16th Sts. Police Chief Richard Beaney was instructed to investigate.

A. B. Wolfe Resigns From Zone Board

Arthur B. Wolfe, a member of the Zoning and Planning Board and president of that body, submitted his resignation to the Council. The request was accepted. The members of the board at present include Robert L. Newton, James Smith, Guy Smith, Paul McElhattan, Charles A. Saxer and Carl Beimly, an alternate member. Mrs. Mabyn Thomas is secretary to the board. The Zoning Board meets on the third Monday of the month at Village Hall, unless otherwise called into session through special requests.

Bookkeeper Engaged By Village

City Engineer Dunton at the recent meeting of the Village Council recommended that a general bookkeeper be engaged in order to get the water department accounting system up to date.

Councilman J. Marvin Brown suggested to the Council that the matter be given further study. Mr. Dunton felt that the person engaged could also issue occupational licenses and building permits, which were approved by the Building Inspector.

Council approved the hiring of the bookkeeper and general office worker on a temporary two-week basis, to see how the plan worked.

Inventory of Water

System nears Completion

Engineer Bill Crowe of Black and Associates, who are engineers of the Village water system, together with City Engineer Dunton and Louis Vandinetti of Intercounty Construction Corp. made an inventory recently of all meters and equipment left over after the installation.

This equipment was purchased by Intercounty and the purpose of the inventory was to credit Intercounty account so that final accounting can be made between the Village and Intercounty.

Validation proceedings have already been completed and the account should be settled within a short time.

Saxer Requests Fire Truck Storage

Charles A. Saxer, president of the Volunteer Fire Department, appeared before the Council recently and stated that the V.F.D. would like to have some place to store the fire truck.

Councilman Frank Starling stated that tentative plans are being formulated for a building on the Village Hall property for storage purposes and also for location of various municipal offices.

At the present time, the water department is located in Frank O. Miller Hardware store and the building, plumbing, electrical inspector office and issuer of occupational licenses is located at his home at 199 N. E. 24th St.

Councilman Starling will have a more detailed report for members of the Council to study at their next meeting.

Council Sends Letter To Highland Estates Water Consumers

The Village Council at their recent meeting recommended that a form letter be sent to residents of former Highland Estates asking them to voice their opinion as to whether they wish to have monies which were contracted for the purchase of the water system in that area to be placed in escrow for the improvement of the water system.

The question of ownership of the system has been before the Council for some months. Various private individuals from the area have appeared before the Council on different occasions questioning the ownership of the system which supplies water to the area.

Many months ago, the former Council entered into an agreement with Highland Estates Civic Club, Inc. for the purchase of the physical assets of the system in use. At that time the agreement called for a purchase price of \$5,000 of which an initial \$1,000 has been paid to the Civic Club.

Some weeks ago the question of the payment of the remaining \$4,000 came before the Council. At this time the ownership of the system was questioned by members of Council and other citizens, with the result that the matter was turned over to Village Attorney William Miller, Jr. for investigation.

It has been expressed by various Council members that rather than go through with the purchase of the system, providing ownership is established, it would be better to use the money which has been set aside for the purchase, and to improve the presently installed lines.

Broward County Volunteer Firemen's Association

This letter is directed to all the fire chiefs of Broward County, and to all fire minded firemen and friends, that we might convey to the general public our aim.

This association was founded by the Oakland Park Fire Department of Oakland Park, Florida, and we are happy to say that all volunteer fire departments are members of this association of Broward County.

The primary purpose of this association is to study the existing means of fire fighting equipment within the county, and to recommend improvements in order to better safeguard lives and property in the county in

time of disaster, whether from war time attack, or normal emergencies of all kinds occurring in peace time.

This action was prompted by the possibility of war and the need to bring the county's fire defenses into line with other measures being taken by our State and Civil Defense Authorities.

All of you know that during the last number of years there have been numerous occasions where the lack of cooperation of our departments has jeopardized assistance, thereby seriously hindering facilities to guard lives and property in this county. While disaster in the form of hurricanes and tornadoes have struck all around our county in the past, our next emergency may be in the form of a tremendous fire. We have thus far escaped such tragedies, but our time may be running out, too, so we should be prepared in every way for such eventualities.

At the present time there is no definite need for county-wide radio communications, but in the very near future this will become one of our biggest assets. All fire stations, fire fighting equipment, and fire chiefs' cars to be radio equipped, so that we can respond immediately to the aid of our brothers in distress. Speed here will save lives and property. This is something for each and every one of you here tonight to take home with you, think about and study very carefully, so that we will be ready when this time comes.

It is imperative that each fire chief of all departments turn in a list at the earliest convenience, a complete list of his equipment, his and all subordinates home address and telephone number, also the telephone number of his fire department.

Advise your county and city commissioners of our desire to be helpful, that we also need their cooperation to further our aims.
