Columbus Day October 12th

The first celebration of the discovery of America by Columbus on October 12, 1492 was held in New York City on October 12, 1792. The celebration was arranged by the society of St. Tammany or Columbian Order, founded by William Mooney on May 12, 1789. In celebration of the 400th anniversary of the discovery a monument was erected at the southwestern entrance to Central Park in New York City and the place was named Columbus Circle in honor of the discoverer.

In 1934 President Franklin D. Roosevelt issued a proclamation inviting the people of all states in the Union to observe October 12th each year as Columbus Day. In addition to observances throughout the nation, 21 countries in Central and South America celebrate Columbus Day.

Record 49,000 Voters For Broward

An approximate 49,000 are registered to vote in the general election of November 4th, according to the records in the office of Supervisor of Registration, Mrs. Easter L. Gates. Close to 700 persons were on hand to register on Saturday as the deadline for registering approached the zero hour. In 1948, 25,000 were registered to vote in the general election. In 1950 there were 32,061 eligible voters.

Mrs. Gates said that no election in her 20 years in office has aroused so much interest among the voters.

She disclosed that 37,109 Democrats are eligible to vote in the special primary Oct. 14 to select a nominee for the Supreme Court.

Registration for this special election closed Sept. 13. At that time the total registration was 44,541.

Since Sept. 13 through Friday, 3,620 persons qualified as voters, bringing the total up to the closing day, 48,161. Saturday's total was expected to put the final total over 49,000.

There were 42,601 registered for the spring primaries this year, showing that over 6,000 persons have registered since that time, a gain of over 15 per cent.

NEW WATER ORDINANCE BRINGS OBJECTION AMENDMENTS TO BE PROPOSED TO COUNCIL

Since publication in The Bulletin of last week of a story in regard to payment of water bills comment on the same has been received objecting to phases of the "water ordinance."

The following has been received from a resident and property owner in the Village who expressed his views that the ordinance in the present form should be amended:

"MANY JOKERS IN NEW WATER ORDINANCE"

"This ordinance was suggested and recommended by Orley Dunton, Wilton Manors Water Commissioner and passed on September 9, 1952. It is well to bear in mind Fort Lauderdale sells water to everyone at the same price, business or residential, without restrictions on giving it away or selling it.

"Section 16 provides up to \$500 fine or up to 60 days in jail for being one day late in paying your water bill.

"Section 12 provides that the water company can enter your house at any time they consider reasonable.

"Section 6 provides a charge of \$1.50 for turning the water on, and \$1.50 for turning the water off. This

would cost \$3.00 every time you took a vacation.

"Section 5 says 'It is hereby expressly prohibited for any person purchasing water from the town of Wilton Manors to re-sell said water or in any way whatsoever to supply ANY OTHER PERSON.' This would seem to mean that it would be illegal to have roomers without going to the expense of tearing out your present plumbing system, installing a duplicate water system and adding another meter, all guest houses would take separate meters, all multiple store units would require separate meters, duplexes would have to change their water systems and add an extra meter, anyone renting apartments would be required to pay a minimum bill for each unit, trailer parks would need a meter for each building and each trailer.

"If you feel, as many others do, that this ordinance should be amended, come to the next regular Council meeting, Tuesday, October 14th at the Village Hall at 8 P. M."

Payment of Water Bills; Meter Installations

The following notice is called to the attention of the residents of the Village:

"Again we must bring to the attention of all water consumers, the fact that all water invoices must be paid promptly.

"Section No. 4 of the Water Ordinance states: All accounts shall be due and payable on the date statements are submitted to the consumer and in the event of failure of any consumer of water supplied by the Town of Wilton Manors to pay the account within ten (10) days, after the same shall become due and payable, the City Engineer or Supt. of the Water Works is hereby authorized and directed to disconnect said consumers' water supply and the same shall not be turned on until all past due accounts shall have been paid.

"Section No. 6 states: 'Only authorized persons connected with the Water Department are permitted to turn on or shut off a water meter. There shall be a charge of \$1.50 for each call to turn water on or off.'

"Section No. 16 outlines a penalty of a fine of 'not to exceed \$500 or imprisonment not to exceed 60 days, or other such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Municipal Court of the Town of Wilton Manors for a violation of Section No. 4 and other sections of the Water Ordinance."

As Police Commissioner of Wilton Manors I resent the statement made by Douglas McQuarrie of the Fort Lauderdale Daily News of Oct. 2nd. I am constantly in touch with our police and know just what goes on. I have stressed all along three things that would not be tolerated, One—drunk driving, Two—gambling and Three, sale of intoxicants to minors.

Earle Middleton Heads YMCA Fund Drive

Earle Middleton, president of the Village Council is general chairman for the Fort Lauderdale YMCA fund raising campaign. A campaign to raise \$400,000 for the first unit in a \$750,000 expansion program will get under way with a house-to-house drive on Nov. 17 and ending Dec. 10.

The \$400,000 will be used to erect a one-story building, occupied mostly by a gymnasium, on S. E. Second St. adjacent to the present YMCA.

A later campaign will be conducted to raise \$350,000 to add a second and third floor on the new building, Middleton said.

The gym will be designed to embrace two full-sized basketball courts and two practice courts, lockers and showers, and space for wrestling, boxing and gymnastics, Middleton said.

The later addition will include a third-floor dormitory, swimming pool, craft shop, clubrooms and a dining room.

Fred L. Mathers has been appointed chairman of a special gifts committee, with Albert Van Nus as associate chairman.

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Nearly every family in Broward County, now getting old-age and survivors insurance payments, will receive more money beginning with the September payments due about Oct. 3. If the increase does not show on a check when it arrives early in October, and an increase is due, a later check will make up the difference. It is not necessary for people already receiving benefits to apply for the increased payments.

Paul Byrley, manager of the Fort Lauderdale social security office, stated recently that the recent amendments to the law will mean monthly payment increases ranging from \$5 to \$8.60 for practically all of the 2,700 retired insured workers in Broward County. The average increase for retired workers will be about \$6. In general, benefit payments to wives, widows, children, or parents will be increased proportionately; Byrley pointed out, however, that the increases for dependents and survivors would be less than those for retired workers. In most cases, these increases will be about \$2 to \$5. In a few families the increase will go only to the retired insured worker.

"The reason for this," Byrley pointed out, "is that the law has always provided limits to the total of benefits which may be paid to any one family in a month. In some cases, the increased benefit of the retired worker alone will absorb all of the permissible increase. Under these circumstances the full increase will be given in the check to the retired worker and the benefits to the remaining members of his family will remain unchanged."

The 1952 amendments to the law also provide for larger payments to

future beneficiaries, Byrley declared. Until now, the law has provided for payments to most such newly retired persons, equal to 50 per cent of the first \$100 of his average monthly wage after 1950, plus 15 per cent of the next \$200. The new law just passed provides for a benefit of 55 per cent of the first \$100 of average monthly earnings, plus 15 per cent of the next \$200. The effect is an increase of up to \$5 a month. Proportionate increases for dependents' and survivors' benefits will be based on that of the worker. This revised formula will apply generally to most persons who will become eligible for benefit payments in the future, Byrley said.
