## GUY SMITH & SAXER QUALIFY For Council Vacancies

### Brown Still Undecided — Hartman and Barwick Decline. Gurney Possible Candidate in Election

As of this writing two candidates have qualified for the two expiring council seats. Guy Smith of Mahannah Road, who in last week's Bulletin stated he would run, qualified with Village Clerk Stafford, Saturday night. The other candidate to qualify was Charles A. Saxer of 2607 N. E. Tenth Ave. W. P. (Duke) Hartman, whose name had been prominently mentioned as a candidate, declined to seek office. Mr. Hartman, in talking with The Bulletin, stated that already he is very much occupied with civic affairs. At present he is identified with the Red Cross organization, Community Chest, Cub Scouts, Naval Reserve and Kiwanis Club. In all of these organizations he has been a most active member. Mr. Hartman, in declining to run, stated that with all his civic work he sincerely feels that he would not be able to devote the time to the office of Councilman and to do a good job.

Mrs. Mabel C. Barwick of Manor Insurance Agency, who has been considered as a likely candidate also has declined to run for office. Mrs. Barwick feels that she does not have the time as she presently is Regional Governor of the Southern Region of the Soroptimist Clubs. Her club work takes her throughout the southern states and Cuba.

Police Commissioner J. Marvin Brown, whose term expires, is undecided at this time. James Boyd, whose term also expires, has declined to seek re-election.

Another candidate, who has been prominently mentioned for Councilman and who is strictly independent is Earle Gurney, a long-time resident of the Village. Mr. Gurney is a retired businessman from Massachusetts and has been identified with every civic movement for the betterment of the Village.

Peculiarly, both Saxer and Guy Smith are members of the Zoning and Planning Board, but are seeking office independently of each other. Smith has been a long-time resident of the Village and is in the plastering business.

Charles Saxer with his wife Arlene came to the Village about two years ago, although for years they have been visitors in this section. They formerly lived in East Orange, N. J., and decided to buy a home and settle in Wilton Manors. Mr. Saxer is retired, formerly having been assistant comptroller for U. S. Steel Corporation. He was associated with the corporation for over 30 years. In addition to his membership on the Zoning and Planning Board, Mr. Saxer is president of the Volunteer Fire Department of the Village. He is also a 32nd degree member of the Masonic order and Shrine organizations. Mr. Saxer feels that he has ample time to devote to Village affairs and to fulfill his obligations to the people if he is voted into office.

Candidates to qualify must file with the Village Clerk 10 days previous to election. People qualified to vote in the Village election must be a resident of the state for one year and the village for six months. The village registration books close on October 30th. Those who wish to register may do so by presenting themselves at the home of the Village Clerk, Mrs. Marcia Stafford, at any reasonable hour. Mrs. Stafford resides at 500 N. E. 25th St. The deadline for qualifying for office is midnight, Saturday.

## Fire Department News

A nominating committee was named to prepare a slate of officers for presentation to the membership at the November meeting. Election of officers for the coming year will be held at the November meeting. All members are urged to be in attendance at the November meeting which will be held on the 10th of the month.

Merlin A. Nausley was elected to membership and the application for membership of Thorlew T. Horstensen was accepted and to be voted on at the next meeting.

## STEVENSON VERSUS EISENHOWER PAPER WINS PRIZE FOR MRS. RANDALL

Mrs. Abbie T. Randall of 2117 N. E. Ninth Avenue has just been notified that she was a prize winner in an essay contest sponsored by The Manchester (New Hampshire) Leader-Union newspaper. This prominent paper in New England had hundreds of entrants in the contest, who wrote on the subject: "Who Is Better for America, Stevenson or Eisenhower?"

Mrs. Randall's winning article is as follows:

"In comparing two men for so high an office, many points have to be considered.

"First and foremost, that man must have both love and faith in his heart for his country.

"Secondly, we must have the right type of man to lead our Nation.

"Thirdly, we must know his Principles and Ideas, of what he really believes America needs at this time, in regard to Domestic and Foreign Policies.

"I will write first of Adlai Stevenson, a man the majority of voters are not acquainted with, as he has not been prominently brought before the people of the Nation. His love for his Country we do not doubt, he is an American. Our acquaintance with him seems to be, at the Democratic Convention, when he made his speech; proclaiming he believed in President Truman's policies and the New and Fair Deal. He also stated, that, he was not mentally, emotionally, or physically fit to hold this high office.

"If a man has not Faith in himself to do this Great Work, how can the Nation have Faith in Him? He preferred to be the Governor of a State, rather than, the leader of a Great Nation. A man forced into a position, he does not want, cannot have a real interest in that work. None of our Great Men in History have ever considered themselves, if they had a duty to perform.

In regard to his policies, we only know what he said in his speech, that he believed in the Policies of Truman and Roosevelt, therefore we must give our judgment of him, from the results of the last twenty years. During that time we have been led into two wars and are now really fighting a third war. We have had more corruption, more spending and our living and taxes have been higher than ever before. In order for a family to live, the mother has to work, as well as the father and there is no doubt this has contributed to Juvenile delinquency, of which we have so much.

"Taking all these things into consideration, I do not feel, he is the man to guide our Nation at this time.

"Now we will consider Dwight Eisenhower. A man who has been in the public eye for several years and is still held in high esteem by the American people. He feels, his Country needs Him as never before, both abroad and at home. He has shown great love for his Country, by willingness to give that life, if necessary.

"He knows the condition of our Country, at this time and wants to once again, offer his services, knowing the great responsibility, it would incur. He has faith in himself to carry this great burden. He has shown, a strong fighting spirit, great leadership of men, and is thoroughly vested in all Foreign Affairs. Knows the mistakes that have been made in our Domestic Policies and can thus avoid them. In his last assignment for his Government, showed his ability in uniting other Nations with us, for a Great Cause and with his winning personality, made many friends in those Nations.

"Now as never before, we need a Military man to guide this Nation, one that has that fighting Spirit, to lead us to Victory. He is a man of strong character and high ideals, but, not so set in his own views, that he cannot recognize them, if wrong. His training has been in War, to always clear the field for action. That is what we need today, to sweep clean the field of action, in our Government, putting out of office, men not mentally adapted or morally fit to hold their positions.

"I feel that Dwight Eisenhower has the qualifications needed to become President of our Great Nation."

**Village Has Dog Ordinance States Chief**

As a result of many articles received by The Bulletin from the public on the question of dogs in the Village, Chief Richard Beaney of the Police Department states that the Village has already ordinances regarding dog regulations.

According to Chief Beaney, Ordinance No. 18, Section 44 states: "Nuisance. That any dog which yells or howls at night time in the Village of Wilton Manors, so as to disturb the sleep and or peace and quietude of any inhabitants of said Village is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the Police Officers of said Village shall have the right and authority to abate any such nuisance."

Further on the subject, of the same ordinance, the Chief states that Section 4 5 says: "Mischievous or Vicious Dogs. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any mischievous or vicious dogs to permit such dog to run at large or without the inclosure of the owner or keeper thereof within the limits of the Village of Wilton Manors."

Chief Beaney further pointed out that on occasions he has received calls regarding alleged violations, but people refuse to sign a formal complaint.
