GURNEY AND BROWN ELECTED TO COUNCIL

EISENHOWER WINS IN LANDSLIDE REPUBLICANS TAKE THREE COUNTY SEATS

Earle Gurney, a newcomer in political circles, topped all candidates in the local Council election Tuesday with a vote of 178. J. Marvin Brown, who ran for re-election, was the other winning candidate, polling 121 votes.

Probably the greatest surprise of the local Council race, in which 368 ballots were cast, was the splendid showing made by Ed Umber with 109 votes, Guy Smith with 108 and Charles A. Saxer with a vote of 103. William Pabor, also a "first" in running for office, polled 69 votes.

The newly elected Councilmen take office immediately and were to be sworn in at the next regular meeting of the Council.

Unopposed for office, Mrs. Marcia Stafford was re-elected to Village Clerk with 336 votes. William Hickson, also unopposed for Village Marshal, polled 328 votes.

Norman Malcolm, one of Wilton Manors' most civic minded residents, was accorded one "write in" vote for Council.

Dwight Eisenhower, presidential candidate, carried the Village easily over his Democratic opponent, receiving 779 votes to 258 for Stevenson out of 1048 votes cast in Precinct 5A. Eisenhower will be the 33rd president in our Nations' history.

Another surprising development in the election, from a county-wide development and one to be reckoned with in the future, was the splendid showing of the Republican candidates.

J. G. Schaffer, Republican, defeated Paul M. Ryle for District No. 1 Port Authority member and his colleague, John W. Bell, Republican, also defeated his Democratic opponent, F. Laird Rickard for Port authority District No. 3. In the Village, Schaffer polled 395 to 284 for Ryle. Bell, the winner over Rickard, received 449 while his Democratic opponent received 335 votes.

The other county Republican winner was J. Herbert Burke, who defeated Foster H. Ingalls for member Board of County Commissioners, district No. 5.

Without question, the landslide by Eisenhower took with him the Republican candidates.

Congressman Dwight Rogers had a tough battle to win his Congressional seat over Janet H. Fitzgerald.

Constitutional Amendment, relating to school finances, received a splendid vote of 553 "for," and 226 "against." The same majority appeared to be true throughout the county.

Other opposed county Democratic winners were Easter Gates, John S. Burwell, Amos Hall, W. H. Meeks.

For Governor, Dan McCarty polled a splendid vote in the county. His Village poll was 594 to 480 for the Republican candidate, Swan. Local Councilman James Dean has handled McCarty's campaign in the Village. McCarty won the state by a 3 to 1 vote.

All in all, from a nationwide view it appeared that the people wanted a "general" election this year.

Quiet Hallowe'en Reports Police

Chief of Police Beaney reports that no serious damage was done by pranksters during the Hallowe'en holidays. Various store and auto windows were soaped by the youngsters. With the PTA carnival being held most of the youngsters of the Village were in attendance having supervised fun.

Lauderdale on the other hand, suffered damage to store windows. Some 36 plate glass windows in stores and offices, mostly on Andrews Avenue, were marked with a glass cutter or sharp instrument.

Animals Arrive For "Africa, U. S. A." Pederson's Development

Several grown-ups as well as youngsters from the Village were in attendance at Port Everglades last Saturday to witness the arrival of the ship, African Planet, carrying a shipment of animals for Africa, U.S.A., of Boca Raton.

One of the proudest youngsters present was Johnny Schneider, three and a half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Schneider. Young Johnny was on hand to greet his uncle, Jack Pederson, who returned with the strange cargo of animals for the Boca establishment. On hand also to greet Pederson was Mr. and Mrs. John Pederson, former residents of Wilton Manors. Mr. Pederson, Sr., is the developer of Africa, U.S.A., which is scheduled to open about Dec. 1.

Included in the strange shipment of animals were 38 zebras, 17 ostriches, six donkeys, two cheetahs and an unusual "Ze-horse." This Ze-horse is a cross between an African greyve Zebra and an Arabian stallion and is claimed to be the only such animal alive in the world and is only two years old.

The freighter, African Planet, unloaded the strange shipment after a 60-day voyage from Mombasa, East Africa. The animals were trucked to Boca Raton after a slight delay while Department of Agriculture inspectors sprayed them for pests.

Another shipment of animals is expected in about six weeks to augment the first arrivals. In addition to Jack Pederson, Richard Cade accompanied the animals. Cade is the son of a trapper of Kenya, East Africa. Young Cade will stay at Boca Raton for a few months to assist in taking care of the animals.

GALLION SEES NEED FOR MORE POWER FOR COUNTY COMMISSION

Chief Richard Beaney Urges Bike Caution

Spurred by the numerous recent accidents to children riding bicycles at night without lights parents of children in Ft. Lauderdale have been warned by Police Chief Roland Kelly that they are responsible for seeing that the vehicles are properly equipped. Police Chief Richard Beaney, through the Wilton Manors School, has given on occasions talks on safety, stressing bicycle safety regulations. Fortunately the Village has been free from any serious bicycle accidents.

Some months ago, Chief Beaney, admitted to the Council a suggestive ordinance for bicycle regulations in the Village. To date, the ordinance has not been passed.

The Ft. Lauderdale ordinance provides that bicycles may be impounded, registration tags may be revoked and the owners may be prohibited for riding for 30 days or fines up to \$10 assessed for violations. The law makes parents and guardians responsible.

A bicycle must carry a front light which can be seen for 500 feet and a rear reflector which can be seen 50 feet.

Until the passage of the ordinance, Police Chief Beaney urges all riders to be cautious and to see that their bikes are in safe condition to be properly operated either day or night.

Scouts Expect To Visit U. S. Navy Ships

Wilton Manors Boy, Girl and Cub Scouts are expected to take advantage of visiting the three Navy ships which arrived at Port Everglades Tuesday morning for a three day stay.

Commander F. Laird Rickard, local representative of the Sixth Naval District Commandant, announced that the welcoming delegation included the civic officials of Broward County. Lt. Comdr. W. P. Hartman of Wilton Manors was among the official delegation to welcome the guests.

The personnel of the three ships entertained 300 underprivileged children with a shipboard party on Wednesday. The Navy delegation took part in the launching of minesweeper 109 at the Broward Marine shipyards. Dances for the enlisted men have been arranged by Hollywood and Ft. Lauderdale Legion posts.

Some 2,000 officers and men will spend the three day liberty leave in the area. The ships which arrived were the USS Rolette, the USS Sarasota and the USS Raby.

Capt. Ellis K. Wakefield, commanding officer of the Rolette and senior officer in the group, proposed the entertainment for the underprivileged children.

PATRONIZE YOUR LOCAL
MERCHANTS AND HELP YOUR
COMMUNITY PROSPER.

R. T. Gallion, County Commissioner, is pushing for the introduction of a new county zoning bill for introduction into the 1953 legislature. Mr. Gallion stated that if the state commissioners do not ask for a statewide bill, he will recommend a special Broward County bill. He pointed out that a referendum should be part of the general law, if passed, or the county measure if it must be substituted.

According to Gallion, the bill's emphasis will not be as much on construction as it will be on roads and indiscriminate dumping of garbage.

The County Commissioner added that subdivision developers are not now obligated to put in any particular quality of roads when they develop any area outside the city limits.

EDITORS NOTE: Wilton Manors Council, through the suggestion of Councilman James Dean, have set down a code of regulations for construction of roads in subdivisions.

Gallion points out developers sell lots to home builders pointing out that the road is dedicated to the county. What they don't say, stated the County Commissioner, is that the county is not required to keep the roads in repair.

As a result, when a poorly built road begins pitting out after rain, the residents expect the county to repair it, he said. In most cases the county does not have the money to do this work.

The proposed bill will make it possible for the county board to insist that developers put a quality road in their subdivisions, Gallion declared.

Likewise the zoning bill would give the county authority to prevent persons from dumping garbage anywhere and creating health and sanitary problems, the commissioner said.

In this connection, Broward county already has a special law on the books which gives it the power to set up a garbage collection system.

The bill would probably give the county authority to zone all its areas. The present zoning law enables the commission to zone only areas where the residents ask for it.

A law which specifically set up this type of zoning was defeated in a countywide referendum in 1949.

However, Gallion said he believes the county's zoning powers would be used simply to make sure "safe structures" are built. Regulations would not be as stringent as city construction codes.

26th St. Extension Making Fast Progress

Work on the extension of 26th Street is progressing rapidly and it will be only a matter of a short time before the bridge over the river is completed. Already, four piers have been erected and the roadbed construction to the bridge should be under way soon.

With the opening of the new highway, it will be a boon to the merchants in the Village as residents in the Coral Ridge area will be able to shop in Wilton Manors, where there are no parking problems, by only a few minutes driving time. Residents in the Village will be able to travel back and forth to the beach in a shorter period of time than the new road is opened up for travel.

The feeder line to the Village was damaged and as a result the Village was without water from 4:15 P. M. until 6:30 P. M. when Fritz Groenboem, water superintendent for Oakland Park, made the necessary repairs.

Fire headquarters at Oakland Park was severely undermined due to the water leak.

Social Security Information

Any person who has been in work covered by social security continuously since January 1, 1951, and is now 65 years old or over, is now insured and eligible for benefit payments, if he retires, Paul L. Byrley, manager of the Ft. Lauderdale office said today.

The 1950 changes in the social security law make it possible for many persons in the newly covered groups to qualify for retirement benefits for the first time, Byrley said. These groups include the self-employed, regular domestic workers, regular farm workers, and others.

To get payments based solely on work brought under the law as of January 1951, these wage earners and self-employed persons must be covered by social security for at least six calendar quarters—about a year and a half—after 1950. The size of their monthly benefit payment will depend on the average monthly wage from employment or income from self-employment after 1950.

Benefit payments to a retired worker will range from \$25 to \$85 monthly. Monthly benefits to a retired worker and his wife would range from \$37.50 to \$127.50 monthly.

Byrley suggested that persons over 65 talk their situation over with the Ft. Lauderdale social security office. Their retirement date might be very important in deciding the amount of their future benefits. He also stated that information booklets describing the new amendments are available in his office without charge. "It's important," he said, "that everyone who is covered by social security be familiar with their rights and privileges."
