CROWDS FLOCK TO MANOR MARKET STORE OPENING CELEBRATION OPEN SUNDAY, 8 A.M. TO 6 P.M.

Manor Market, one of Wilton Manors oldest business establishments which opened its doors six years ago broke all sales records for this popular, friendly, independent food store. The record breaking business was occasioned by the opening of the renovated and expanded store building, which cost approximately \$75,000.

In conjunction with the opening of the new store, owners Lamar Braddy and Frank Starling, put on a three-day celebration sale for the benefit of their patrons. Grocery and meat officials, who were on hand to congratulate the owners, were unanimous in stating that the crowds far outnumbered any store opening that they had ever witnessed. It was estimated that in the three days, approximately 20,000 people shopped at the market. Although the sales force handled their customers efficiently they were just "swamped" by the tremendous number of people taking advantage of the splendid buys offered by Manor Market.

Although a two-acre parking lot has been provided for the convenience of the shoppers, every available parking space was in use along the Drive and as fast as one shopper moved away, another took his parking space.

As an appreciation to their thousands of patrons, more than 300 people were presented with bags of groceries by having the lucky numbered shopping basket called over the loud speaker system at the store.

It will be six years this April when Lamar Braddy and Frank Starling opened the market. At that time they predicted that Wilton Manors would progress and develop. This prediction has come true and thousands of people in the area have learned about Wilton Manors through coming to Manor Market. Many of these patrons of the store, impressed with the community, have made their homes here in the Village. When the store was first opened, there were only five people employed consisting of Braddy, Starling, Mary Braddy and two butchers. Today, this number has grown to approximately 60.

TO OPEN SUNDAYS

Due to the demand of many people who are employed and unable to take advantage of the low prices at Manor Market, it has been decided by the owners that the store will remain open on Sundays from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M. This went into effect last Sunday.

In speaking with the owners, they stated that a few "kinks," in the operation of store has to be ironed out, so that customers can be handled in a more expeditious manner. In addition, painted lines will be placed at the parking lot for car spaces.

Various Village officials, friends, patrons and fellow business men offered congratulations to the owners. The Bulletin expresses best wishes, and continued success to the owners of Manor Market.
