Speaking of Christmas, do your shopping early.

The County Commissioners have given their approval for the placing of a traffic light at Old Dixie, Wilton Drive and 26th street intersection. The Commissioners will supply the light but the Village will have to take care of installation.

The Council appropriated \$50 for use of the Civic Association for Christmas Decorations. H. G. Harper, chairman for the Association made the request for financial assistance.

The bicycle ordinance passed its second reading at the recent Council meeting. The Zoning ordinance also passed the Council.

James Bell on recommendation of the Zoning Board, had his appointment confirmed by the Council as a new member for the Board.

Michael Marinelli of Intercounty Construction Corp. appeared before the Council to find out if it was permissible to erect an office, warehouse and repair shop on Wilton Drive in the vicinity of 9th Ave. Mr. Marinelli was told that this was a question for the Zoning Board and the Council suggested that he present plans to that body for their study.

Attorney William Miller informed the Council that he would have the new occupational license regulations ready for the next meeting of the Council.

Robert Newton, Building Inspector, was told by the Council to make a survey of business that are operating in residences that may be violating the Zoning Code. The question was raised through a recent complaint that Davis Tile and Terrazzo Company were operating from their residence without the proper occupational license. The Building Inspector told the Council that they had a license for "tile" but not "terrazzo." Mr. Newton was also instructed to enforce the Zoning code.

A new bookkeeping system setup for the Village records will be presented to the Council at the next meeting. Attorney Miller and Mrs. Noonan, the bookkeeper, will work on the plan for presentation to the Council.

The FECRR requested that the proper Village officials confirm by signature an agreement between the Village and the railroad for the installation of the water pipe line under the 26th St., crossing.

City Engineer Dunton reported that water installation had been made on 26th Street and No. Andrews Avenue for Ridge Construction Corp. The City Engineer reported that the work had been done at no expense to the Village, and that the system would be the property of the Village.

The cement walk is under construction at the school and venetian blinds have been installed in various rooms on the west side of the building. The School Commissioners have promised that a partial sprinkling system will be installed by spring, however sodding will have to be taken care of by the P. T. A.

Through the efforts of the P. T. A., Commissioner Rawls visited the school and assured the members that the building, which has no identification, will have a sign "Wilton Manors Elementary School" erected on the school building.

Christmas Decoration Plans Progressing Rapidly

Plans for the Christmas decoration for the Village are progressing under the capable leadership of H. G. Harper, chairman of the committee of the Civic Association, which is sponsoring the event this year.

A program, including the lighting of the Christmas tree will take place at the "park" on Wilton Drive on December 6th. Councilman Earl Gurney has offered to the association the use of his sound equipment for the playing of Christmas carols during the holiday season. William Pabor, nurseryman, has offered to supply plants for the decoration of the park.

VILLAGE AND HIGHLAND ESTATES CLUB TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING TO DISCUSS WATER SYSTEM SETTLEMENT

The long drawn out settlement of the agreement between the Village and Highland Estates Civic Club Inc., over the water system in that area will be discussed at a special meeting on December 2nd.

President Novak of the Club appeared before the Council, together with the Board of Directors of the organization, requesting that the Village live up to the agreement for the purchase and payment for the system entered into by the former Council.

Councilman Earle Gurney Moves To Clean Up Drive

Councilman Earle Gurney got an appropriation from the Council of \$100 for cleaning up Wilton Drive. The new Councilman, in making his request stated that with the Civic Club sponsoring Christmas decorations, hundreds of visitors would be brought to the Village as well as increased traffic when the new bridge on 26th St. is opened. He pointed out that the Drive was an eyesore to the community.

The Bulletin has learned that it is Mr. Gurney's intention to have the Drive put in presentable shape by gathering the debris which has been allowed to clutter up the thoroughfare for years and in addition to have the grass cut. The Councilman also told his fellow members that the appropriation would be spent with wisdom and what monies are left over will be returned to the Village treasury.

Brown Raises Question On "Development" Plans

Councilman J. Marvin Brown raised the question at the Council meeting that the development east of plans for the water installation. Mr. the FECRR tracks, submitted no Brown felt that as the Village will eventually own the system and that Council should approve the plans. The plans were later presented to the Council for their approval. Already water lines are being installed in the development and the main feeder line under the railroad is expected to get underway shortly.

Attorney Miller told the delegation that he had had several conferences with the Club's attorney and the question of "title" stymied the settlement.

Originally, the former Council agreed to buy the system from Highland Estates for sum of \$5,000. Already the Village has paid \$1,000 as part purchase, leaving a balance of \$4,000. When the present Council took office, the question was raised as to whether or not the Club had proper title to the system. Various citizens from the area also raised the question of legality, with the result that the matter has been "hanging fire" for many months.

The Village Attorney as well as Council members hoped that the whole question could be straightened out amicably at the special meeting of all concerned.

struction Corp., asked the Council when the water bonds were to be validated and when his company could expect to receive payment. Attorney Miller stated that the actual cash should be available in 45 days. Mr. Marinelli also offered several suggestions of the Council for the profitable operation of the system. He felt that expenses in the water department could be cut approximately \$150 monthly. He suggested that a saving could be made by having, not an executive, but a good employee who actually made installations, repairs and read meters. The suggestions were accepted by the Council for further study.

The Council gave approval for the installation of a water meter in the Wilton Manors School without any cost to the school board. Water consumption will be paid for by school authorities.

Council amended a part of the recent water ordinance putting into effect that there would be no minimum charge for water until water is used through the meter.

Mrs. C. Wilson Brown will assist in the art work for the Christmas display at the park. Mayor Perry Mickel is in charge of the construction of the displays and Frank Hainey the lighting. Al Muzzell and Reg. Rowe have volunteered to assist in the work.
