Real Estate Broker Paul Mack has been authorized to proceed with closing details for the purchase of property at the North West corner of 24th St. and N. E. 5th Ave. in order that construction can begin on a new church.

Village Attorney Files Water Bond Suit

Village Attorney William G. Miller Jr. entered a suit in Circuit Court for valuation of \$110,000 worth of revenue bonds with the proceeds to pay for the water system. According to Miller it will take about 45 days before actual cash is in the Village treasury.

Amicable Agreement Between Parties Finishes Perplexing Question

The solution of the water system purchase agreement between the Village and Highland Estates Civic Club, Inc., came to an end at a special meeting Tuesday night between the two interested parties to the contract. The following motion was introduced by Councilman J. Marvin Brown and unanimously passed by the Council: "All claims on water pipe be paid as soon as money is available after the validation of bonds."

The Civic Club in order to receive the balance of \$4,000 according to the original agreement entered into by the previous council, agrees: "To post a \$5,000 bond guaranteeing that there will be no claims against the Village through the purchase of the system (or in other words) the Civic Club are actually bonding themselves to give a clear title to the purchased water system."

Village Attorney Miller and Attorney John Morris, Jr., representing the Civic Club, are to confer as to the length of time that the bond remain posted.

Originally the purchase of the water system contract in the Highland Estates area was entered into by the previous Council at a figure of \$5,000. The sum of \$1,000 was paid by the Village as "binder" when the purchase agreement was entered into between the two parties. The balance of \$4,000 was to have been paid the Civic Club when the water was supplied the area by the Village.

When the present Council went in office the question was raised as to whether the civic club owned the system and whether they had the right to sell the system. This same question was put forth by other citizens, the result being the balance of \$4,000 was "held up" until the Council could be assured that the title was "clear."

President Novack of Highland Estates Civic Club Inc. and the Board of Directors represented the Civic Club in the settlement of the dispute.

Village Attorney Miller stated that the object of the conference was for the Village to pay for the system—but the Council needed some evidence that the Civic Club owned the system and has a clear title to the same. Continuing, Miller stated that so far no evidence of this has been forthcoming and the Council wants to be sure we pay the "right" person.

Former Council President A. Hagen who was present, stated that the former Council was assured that the Civic Club owned the system. "We took their word." They contended that it was adequate and additional pressure was the only thing needed. Following Hagen's remarks and suggestions, the matter of posting of a bond by the Civic Club, guaranteeing that there will be no claims against the Village, concluded the meeting.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE TED DAVID SPEAKS TO CIVIC ASSOCIATION

State Representative Ted David gave a very interesting talk on the history and development of Florida, to the members of the Civic Association at the meeting Monday.

He pointed out that Florida could be considered a real pioneer state. He mentioned that in early days members of the legislature, due to lack of roads, had to take a boat from Key West to New York and train to Tallahassee.

The representative stated that real rapid development started in 1925. Broward County in population shows at present 150,000 people. In 1960, estimates show at least 1/4 million. The speaker also pointed out that 10 years from now a "World's Fair" will take place as actual contracts have already been consummated. This will attract thousands, as well as industry to this section of the state and Broward County will benefit from such an attraction.

The legislator, who is interested in the chairmanship of the Education Committee, stated that he intends to amend the Minimum Foundation Program. Broward County, for every dollar spent on schools, the people pay 60c and the State 40c.

Mr. David added that he is going to try and change the formula and reduce the percentage of what the people of the County contribute and raise the percentage of the State. The legislator stated that the State should help Broward County more, the same as other counties in the State, who are receiving greater "State aid" in the operation of the schools.

The representative in touching on the general educational program pointed out that Florida has taken rapid forward strides. Ten years ago, nationally, the State ranked 47 and today is 15th in national rating. He added that California ranking first, is considered by educators, to have the ideal system.

Mr. David said that in the next four years that he felt that the State would have a good sound administrative program.

In talking on the roads of the State, the legislator pointed out that we have outgrown our present system and in the next session a "road program" will be one of the main accomplishments. He added that there is talk of a toll road—a proposed 4-lane "super duper" from Jacksonville down the East Coast with connecting arteries.

In closing, the legislator stated that many of the bills introduced come from suggestions of individuals and organizations and urged the members to take an active interest in their government.

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Some self-employed people still do not fully understand their rights and obligations under social security, Paul Byrley, manager of the Ft. Lauderdale social security office declared today.

Because of misunderstanding, Byrley said, many returns are being filed by persons in the excluded group of self-employed people. The net earnings from self-employment in certain specified professions such as doctors, lawyers, dentists, architects, and certified public accountants are not covered by old-age and survivors insurance.

"On the other hand," Byrley added, "returns are not being filed by some who are required to do so."

Byrley says that NET earnings (gross income less allowable business deduction) from a covered trade or business should be reported as self-employment income. However, the NET earnings must be at least \$400 during the taxable year. No more than \$3600 for the year can be credited to a social security account. In case of a partnership, each partner will include in his NET earnings his distributive share of the ordinary net income from the partnership enterprise. If husband and wife operate a business as a genuine partnership enterprise, each will report his or her respective share of the business profits as net earnings, and each will receive social security credit. But, if only the husband or only the wife is the sole owner of the business, even though the other helps in the business then the owner alone will earn social security credits.

Another frequent and somewhat mistake pointed out by Byrley is the failure to take into consideration that certain business expenses must be deducted before arriving at proper net earnings for social security purposes.

Byrley urges all self-employed persons who have any questions at all about their standing to get in touch with his office or the local office of the Bureau of Internal. He particularly emphasized that persons should be sure to call on either agency when there is any question as to what or business being covered or what constitutes "net earnings" from a trade or business. The Ft. Lauderdale Social Security Office is located at 125 S. E. First St.
