GALLION URGES BETTER ROADS BY SUBDIVISION DEVELOPERS IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS

Cold Decreases Vegetable Volume Higher Prices Possible

From present indications, as a result of the cold snap, housewives will in all probability be paying higher prices for vegetables due to the shortage.

Little relief is expected in the vegetable shortage as crops are stunted by the cold and will be slow in recovering. Largest decrease, according to officials at Pompano Farmers Market, occurred in beans which fell from 8,000 hampers on Tuesday of last week to 3,000 on Wednesday. Farming experts have stated that growers picked all available vegetables, which left plants bare and with little likelihood of growing until warmer weather prevails. Various farmers have predicted that volume at the market will be light until after the holidays.

The April session of the Legislature is expected to have brought to its attention the matter of forcing subdivision developers to build roads to Broward County specifications in all unincorporated areas. County Commissioner Dick Gallion is sponsoring the movement and is urging his fellow commissioners to seek passage of such a bill at the next Legislative session.

Gallion has stated that deplorable conditions exist in many sections of the county where builders of roads use a little rock and sand and then put a light surface on the roads in order to sell lots. Commissioner Gallion has also pointed out that within a short period of time, the roads have become torn up and the public living in these areas expect the county to make repairs.

County Engineer H. C. Davis in commenting on the road situation, has stated that some of the roads put in by many builders were not worthy of the name. The county engineer pointed out that contractors building county roads are required to put in a rock base of six to eight inches. The county engineer also added that subdivision road conditions are growing worse all the time and attributes the extensive development of property in unincorporated areas as responsible.

At various times delegations have appeared before the Commission requesting repairs on roads, only to be told that the roads in question were not designated county roads and were put in by developers and the Commission could give no relief.

In the Village, some time ago, Councilman Dean sponsored an ordinance calling on developers to meet county specifications when roads are constructed in subdivisions.

Mrs. Lydia Mann, treasurer of the Oakland Park Womans Club, has qualified for the "new" city council election to be held Jan. 12, as previously announced in The Bulletin.

The election of Jan. 12 was called by Mayor Dewey Hawkins to settle the "tangle" resulting from the "regular" recent Council election when Richard Marthens, who was a winner, was disqualified as a result of the fact that he was not a registered voter. Mayor Hawkins, it is said, had the privilege of appointing a member to Council under the charter set-up of the municipality but felt that the people should have the voice in the election of a Council member.

It is expected that all of the candidates who ran before and possibly new candidates will qualify for the Jan. 12 election.

Registration books have been open from Dec. 14 and will remain open until Jan. 7, when the books will be closed, 10 days before the required regulation on elections.

The candidates in the "voided" election consisted of Richard Marthens, Gene Delegal, Henry Williams and William Hasenhour. Colley White easily won his reelection seat by polling 140 votes.

Following the Christmas holiday, candidates are expected to begin their campaigning in earnest and the political fur is bound to fly in the municipality.

N.E. 26th Boulevard Bridge Dedicated, Sunday Former Mayor Turner Gives Deed to Gallion

Congressman Dwight Rogers Delivers Address, New Artery Benefit to Village

Attended by a crowd which was estimated by police to be close to 2,000 people, the N. E. 26th Boulevard Bridge joining Wilton Manors and Fort Lauderdale was dedicated last Sunday.

The dedication program was opened by Mayor Perry Mickel of Wilton Manors, who introduced Congressman Dwight Rogers who performed the duties of master of ceremonies and also delivered the dedicatory address.

Congressman Rogers paid tribute to the developers of the property in the immediate area of the new traffic artery. The congressional Representative stated that in the age of progress, bridges and roads lead to progress of a community and it was one of the first times in his career as a public official that for such an improvement, as the construction of the new bridge, that the taxpayers of the area were not called on for any outlay of money.

Representative Rogers paid high tribute to former Mayor Dave Turner of Wilton Manors as one of the developers who had the bridge constructed and given to the county and use of the public. The Congressman pointed out in his talk that Mr. Turner is the developer of Middle River Estates and associated with him are Bob Roberts and Jim Dean, Councilman from Wilton Manors. Other developers in this section who made the bridge possible, without cost to the county, were Joe Schmitt and Charles Dalton of Coral Garden development and James Hunt of Coral Point subdivision. Former Mayor Turner presented County Commissioner Richard Gallion with the deed to the new bridge.

In accepting the deed to the bridge for the County Commission, Mr. Gallion pointed out that with the dedication of the new bridge, it completes a program of the commission which started about three years ago when Guy Smith and other residents of the Colahatche area appeared before the commission requesting that the area connecting with U. S. 1 be opened and he was more than pleased to see the accomplishment.

Mayor Lewis Moore of Fort Lauderdale was introduced by Congressman Rogers for remarks and stated that he was happy to participate in the event and assured the people that Fort Lauderdale was most happy to co-operate with the Village of Wilton Manors at all times. Mayor Moore and Mr. Turner held the ribbon, which was cut by Miss Marilyn Schmitt, daughter of one of the developers of Coral Gardens.

Before the program got under way, the invocation was offered by the Rev. Russell D. Toms, pastor of the Covenant Presbyterian Church.

Among the distinguished guests introduced by the master of ceremonies were the following: Members of Wilton Manors Council, including President Earl Middleton, James Dean, Frank Starling, Earl Gurney and J. Marvin Brown. Other members of the Village official family who were introduced included Marshall William Hickson and Clerk Mrs. Marcia Stafford.

Others called on for introduction included Mayor Dewey Hawkins of Oakland Park, State Representatives John Burwell and Ted David, Senator George Laird and members of the Fort Lauderdale City Commission and City Manager Link. John Monahan, president of the Fort Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce, was also introduced to the gathering.

Following the ceremonies, a drawing for prizes was held and Bud Comley of N. E. 25th Street won a Schwinn bicycle. Ronald Wingatz of 1612 S. E. 13th St. was the winner of an outboard motor, and Tom Force of 716 S. W. 18th Ct. won a television set.

Wilton Manors Police Department, under Chief Richard Beaney, handled the traffic. Approximately 4,000 cars passed over the bridge from the time of the opening ceremonies until Sunday at midnight.

With the opening of the artery, Wilton Manors merchants are bound to benefit from the number of people who will use the new bridge and do their shopping in the Village where easy free parking is no problem.
