Another big year is in the making for Broward County according to predictions of financial leaders, utility executives, real estate developers and business officials.

Wilton Manors as well as Oakland Park have already evidence of the development. Immediately in the confines of the Village a great deal of activity is seen in the Middle River Estates, Coral Gardens and Coral Point developments all of which is east of the FECRR adjoining the recently opened 26th Street Boulevard. In addition various individual builders are erecting homes in the Village. Hillbrook, west of Andrews Avenue is another development that has several homes under construction as well as Mayor Perry Mickel's subdivision.

In the immediate confines of Oakland Park, building is in progress along Ocean Boulevard and also at the end of North Andrews Avenue Extension, where the North Andrews Gardens have a big project underway. Another large deal taking place in the area last week was the sale of 600 acres on W. Sunrise Blvd., a mile west of Old Dixie Hwy. and on Oakland Park Road., two miles west of the highway. This sale was made by Bruce Realty Co., to Melaleuca Estates, Inc.

Commercial building in the immediate area is progressing as evidenced in the Village with the erection of the new Food Fair on Wilton Drive and new buildings under construction by the McJunkens' on the Drive. Two movie drive-in theatres are under way, one nearly completed, is located just west of Old Dixie near River Park Trailer site and the other at the corner of N. Andrews Ave., Extension and Prospect Road.

A new all time record was hit in real estate closures in Broward County according to the recent bulletin from the Ft. Lauderdale Board of Realtors. Closures of more than \$115,000,000 took place in 1952 or more than 15 percent above the previous high year of 1951. In 1951 another record breaking year is predicted.

## OAKLAND PARK ELECTION JANUARY 12

### Mrs. Mann, Delegal, Duncan, Marthens and

### Williams Qualify For One Council Vacancy

Monday, January 12th, is another "big" day for Oakland Park, when the registered voters will again have the opportunity of selecting a member for the City Council.

At this writing the five candidates that have qualified include Richard Marthens, Gene Delegal, Lee J. (O. P.) Duncan, Henry Williams and Mrs. Lydia Mann. The last chance for registration of voters was on January 7.

The special election of the 12th was called for by the City Council as the result of a qualification mixup in the race of December 1, when Dick Marthens was "elected" but due to failure of registration, he was disqualified.

Delegal, Williams and Marthens were all candidates in the "regular" December election. The newcomers in the special election being Mrs. Mann and Duncan.

In the December election Marthens was only one vote ahead of Delegal and Delegal topped Henry Williams by only four votes. Political depositors, in Oakland Park feel that this race will be mighty close. It is understood that this is the first time a woman candidate has tried for a Council seat.

**Schools Reopen After Holidays**

Wilton Manors school re-opened on Monday after the two-week Yuletide holiday and everything was running smoothly according to Principal Bryan Davis. New bikes, properly licensed, were much in evidence.

All schools in the County began their sessions with the exception of Negro pupils in Oakland Park, Pompano Beach and Deerfield Beach. Negro parents in the Deerfield area at a recent mas smeting voted to fight to the bitter end, the Broward County's school board decision to keep the school closed for the bean harvest, until February 9th. O. K. Phillips, County Superintendent, said that the Deerfield Beach school will remain closed until February 9 as originally planned.

One new addition to Bennett Elementary School in northeast Ft. Lauderdale became available Monday for classes. This put an end to double sessions at this school.

At a special meeting Tuesday night (past our deadline) a new principal for Ft. Lauderdale High school was to be selected. The present principal, Robert Childers resigned to accept a position as manager of a hunting lodge in Lake Okeechobee section.
