Manor Insurance Report Tag Sales, Brisk

Mrs. Mabel C. Barwick of Manor Insurance Agency, where the branch office for taking applications for auto tags is located, reported that a goodly number of people applied during the past week.

As a convenience to Wilton Manors residents and others in the area, application can be made at the Manor Insurance office. When the application is made, the tags are paid for and the applicant is told that the tag can be picked up at the office in a few days.

Herman Meeks, new tax collector, pointed out that the various offices were set up in the county as a public service and to avoid waiting in line. Mr. Meeks also pointed out that there is no extra charge for tags if purchased through the various branch offices.

The procedure at branch offices is that the application and money is picked up by a representative of the tax collector's office and processed through the office at the Court House and the tags are delivered to the original office where the application was made so that the applicant picks up his tags usually the day following the making of the application.

Applications for tags are also taken at Oakland Park City Hall, where Mabel G. Kendrick is in charge.

Wolfe Named To High School Principalship

Arthur B. Wolfe of the Village has been named as new principal of Fort Lauderdale High School by the Broward school trustees. Wolfe succeeds Robert Childers, who resigned to enter private business. The new principal, only a few months ago, was appointed principal of the Hollywood Central School and previous to that was assistant principal and dean of boys at Fort Lauderdale High, under Childers, whom he is now succeeding.

The new principal was recommended by Supt. O. K. Phillips and the appointment went through with a 2-1 vote, with Raymond Maxwell voting against the appointment and Jake Bland and W R Turpin favoring it.

Wolfe is a past president of the Wilton Manors Kiwanis Club and also for a time served on the Zoning Board.

Governor Dan McCarty Starts Economy Acts Wiolds Sharp Axe

Florida's new Governor Dan McCarty, backing up his campaign pledges to the people, is going to have a good housecleaning in the State's government. Instead of using the hammer, Governor McCarty is replacing that implement with a sharp axe.

As one of the new Governor's first moves, 400 SRD employees were given notification that they would be no more "gray train riding."

McCarty in his first meeting with the members of the press, indicated that he would not be at all surprised if the early trend set by the Road Department was not indicative of action to be taken by other departments, which comes under the control of the Governor.

The new Governor also stated that his platform promise of "economy in government" would be the keynote of his administration.

One of the first official acts of the new Governor was the appointment of Attorney Stephen O'Connell of Ft. Lauderdale to head up the legal staff of the SRD. O'Connell is already investigating the numerous attorneys engaged under the former administration in the SRD.

Other departments that is expected to feel the axe is the Beverage Department and the Motor Vehicle Commission.

Bike Owners Lax Procuring Tags States "Chief"

Approximately 90 youngsters in the Village have made application and received their bike tags, according to Chief Richard Beaney.

The police are disappointed by the lack of cooperation by many of the young owners of bikes who for some reason or other have failed to apply for their tags. Beaney states that a goodly number of youngsters have been riding around without their tags and the police department has been lenient, but from now on the "bike ordinance" will be strictly enforced and penalties will be invoked for violations. The Chief further points out that the ordinance was instituted as a safety and protective measure for the bike owners. Before tags are issued, the bikes are inspected to be sure that they are in safe operating condition. Tags are sold on Saturdays from 2 to 3 p.m. at Village Hall at a cost of 75c. As a final word, Chief Beaney states, that there has been plenty of publicity and every youngster knows that they have to have a tag for their bike.

Maurer & Maurer Home Attracting Attention

Maurer and Maurer, building contractors' new home on 26th Street and 5th Avenue has been completed. The home is attracting plenty of people who are making inspections and has received much favorable comment. The organization has other property in the immediate area and this construction work is expected to start shortly. Carl Beimly of N. E. 21st Place is associated with Maurer and Maurer.

Council Highlights

A committee consisting of Councilman Frank Starling, Chief of Police Richard Beaney and Charles A. Saxer presented rough plans for a contemplated municipal building, which would house agencies of the Village. The building, it is understood, would be erected on 26th Street extension, East of Maule Industries, Inc. The committee were authorized to have Architect Sanford go ahead and to draw up the plans in detail for presentation to the Council.

Chief Richard Beaney, with a help, was authorized to mark the various street signs in the Village. In addition, parking lanes at a 45 degree angle was ordered painted on both sides of the paved area on Wilton Drive.

Two offers for purchase of the lot adjoining the Village Hall was made to the Council, one by the Civic Association and the other by members of Covenant Presbyterian Church. Councilmen Dean, Starling and Brown were named to make a study of the propositions.

Engineer Crowe of Black and Associates was present to give a report of the water system status, and suggest ideas on how the water department could be put on a more profitable basis. He suggested that all leaks in the system be taken care of immediately, old meters be checked for accuracy and a selling job be done on those residents who do not have "city" water installed in their homes.

The question of a new patrol car was brought up, for the use of the Police Department. The present car is in need of repairs. Councilmen Dean and Gurney suggested that the Police Chief see if he couldn't get a better trade-in offer and report back at the next meeting.

A letter is being written notifying the owners of the property of the new Dairy Queen on Wilton Drive that the fire hydrant in that location if moved is at the property owners' expense.

A beer and wine license for the sale of such beverages was authorized issued to Food Fair.

Tropical Construction Erecting Three Stores

Construction work on three new stores will be started by Clayton Leaver of Tropical Construction Company. The stores will adjoin those already erected by Tropical Construction. The new stores will occupy 2043 to 2047 Wilton Drive. Two of the stores, 2043, have already been leased to Mrs. Martha Tanner, owner of the Beachware Shop on 3005 E. Las Olas Boulevard. Mrs. Tanner also operates a similar shop at Lauderdale-By-The-Sea. The new store will carry a stock of beach ware, dresses and ladies wear as well as shoes for both men and women and men's wear, dress and work. The store at 2047 Wilton Drive has been leased to Dr. Cecil B. Ferguson, Jr., who is a practicing Osteopathic physician in Ft. Lauderdale. Ground breaking is expected to get underway this week.

All of the stores recently constructed by Mr. Leaver, adjoining the Wilton Manors Furniture Company are now occupied. The latest occupant being Audrey Cleaners who took up occupancy on Monday. In addition to the furniture company other occupants of this building block consists of Wilton Drive Barber Shop, Virginia's Beauty Shop, and the office of Tropical Construction Company.

Fire Departments in Broward County, including Wilton Manors Volunteer Fire Company have been invited to cooperate in a mutual aid program for fire defense, according to Fire Chief Jerry R. Carter of Ft. Lauderdale, one of the main organizers of the program. Other fire fighting units invited include Oakland Park, Deerfield Beach, Pompano, Hollywood, West Holly-

SOCIAL SECURITY PROTECTION

If you are one of the millions of self-employed people who will file their second annual social security tax report this year, you now have insurance protection under social security, Paul Byrley, manager of the Ft. Lauderdale social security office announced today.

These are people who made a social security report of their self-employment earnings for 1951, who are filing similar reports for their earnings for 1952, and who will have paid the social security tax for each year. Social Security reports on self-employment earnings are made on special forms and are sent to the Director of Internal Revenue at the time of filing Federal income tax returns.

Byrley says that self-employed persons who have been in work that counts toward social security since 1950 now have insurance protection at least until mid-1955 from that work alone. If they reach 65 and retire before then they will be entitled to monthly old-age benefit payments; in case of death before mid-1955 their families can get monthly survivors insurance payments.

Many persons now self-employed had previously worked for wages in employment covered by social security. This work is credited, of course, toward being insured, and the credits may be added to those earned

in self-employment, Byrley said.

Each additional year of work covered by the law will extend the protection for two more years, Byrley says. He points out that self-employed persons must make a report and pay the social security tax once every year to keep this insurance protection in force. After ten years of work under social security, a person is permanently insured. Byrley also reminds them of the importance of having a social security card, and of copying the number from that card on the social security report of self-employment earnings that they file with their income tax return. Everyone is required to file a social security report and pay the tax if his self-employment earnings are \$400 or more in a year.

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SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION
 Businessmen of Broward County were advised today by Paul L. Byrley, local Social Security office manager, that their second annual report of net earnings from self-employment is due between now and March 15, 1953. This report is filed with the Director of Internal Revenue for the district along with income tax returns.

A new form has been devised to replace the one-page "Schedule C" used last year. The new form consists of two pages with the same type of "tear out" slip for the part of the return which is forwarded by collectors to the Social Security records division. This form should be completed by self-employed persons, except those specifically exempted, provided the business operator had net earnings

during 1952 of \$400 or more. Tax is payable at the rate of 2 1/4%, the same as last year. \$3,600 is the maximum yearly earnings for which Social Security credit may be allowed.

Mr. Byrley cautioned self-employed persons that while they had made a fine record last year, with returns running 90% accurate, it is necessary to put individual Social Security numbers on each year's return. The omission of the Social Security number was the principal error on 1951 returns. Should this number have been lost or misplaced, an application for a duplicate filed now would guarantee that the business operator would have his correct Account Number when he is read yto file the return. Duplicate cards are supplied free by the Broward County Social Security office at 125 S. E. 1st St. in Fort Lauderdale.

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
