### Dogs, Dogs, Dogs, Moans Police Chief

Wilton Manors Police Chief Richard Beaney, a brave fellow and an enthusiastic lover of animals, was seen to cringe at the sight of a chihuahua the other day. Beaney says he dreams of dogs nightly; and the footsteps he hears in the night are the pat-pat-pat of puppy dawgs' paws.

All this has been brought about by the great public clamor of late against the aimless wandering of Wilton Manors canines onto lawns where their presence is not desired.

So Beaney made a statement this week to explain the police department position in the matter:

"From all directions we hear 'why isn't something done about dogs'. The answer from the Police is, 'we cannot take action unless a citizen is willing to take action'."

"It's strange, but in many complaints, the party complaining also has a dog roaming, but of course, he doesn't bother anyone.

"True, dogs are allowed to roam in Wilton Manors, but not if they are found by the municipal court to be a barking or howling dog or a nuisance or so mischievous as to be a disturbance.

"If you have a complaint, make it through the police department, sign it, and BE WILLING to tell it to the Judge. You are the complainant. You must do it. Action will be taken if you do it in this proper way.

"All dogs are required to be inoculated against rabies once each year, and wear a tag with number which is to be registered with the police department. Report any dog known not to be inoculated to Police and they will take action on violations. This is for your protection."

### City Officials Of Oakland Park Get Protest On Theater

Oakland Park City Councilmen heard a protest last week against the proposed construction of a drive-in theater on the south side of Ocean drive between Dixie highway and Federal highway.

A group of residents and property owners in the area around the proposed theater site handed the Council their objections.

Other Council actions:

Referred to the zoning board a petition to change zoning on SE Third Ave. from R-2 to R-1 in order to prevent construction of duplex buildings.

Received from representatives of Prosperity Development Corp. a request for city water service to a new subdivision. The new development, reported in The Sun several weeks ago, will be at the north end of N. Andrews Ave. Extension and east of the Seaboard railway.

### Registration Jumps; Gurney, Saxer and Smith Seek Two Seats On Council

At least three candidates, and probably four or more, will battle for two vacant seats on the Wilton Manors Village Council; and time runs out this weekend for would-be candidates to make up their minds whether or not they will seek office. They must qualify with Village Clerk Marcia Stafford 10 days prior to the election which will be held along with the general elections November 4.

That means Saturday is the last day candidates may sign up to try for the voters' favor.

Voters, however, have five additional calendar days in which to register, and Mrs. Stafford said registration for the municipal balloting is strongly on the upswing.

Some 454 Wilton Manors citizens already are registered, but hundreds more are not.

As for the candidates, here was the situation at press time:

Earl Gurney, Charles A. Saxer and Guy Smith had qualified as candidates for the two seats now held by J. Marvin Brown and James A. Boyd. Brown was expected to seek reelection; Boyd will not.

Gurney, here several years, is a retired radio and television man, a native of Massachusetts.

### 26th-Federal Link Almost Complete

Broward County road crews may begin working on the final link between Wilton Manors and Federal highway on NE 26th Street before this week is ended. That was the indication as The Sun went to press Wednesday night.

And meanwhile, "fine" progress was reported on the first two links in the project: the extension of 26th Street eastward to Middle River and construction of a bridge across the river.

Dave Turner, one of the several developers who are shelling out some \$20,000 for the bridge, said the crossing is on schedule or "maybe somewhat ahead" and ought to be completed in a matter of days.

The road has been rocked all the way to the bridge already by Snyder Paving Co. under contract with the County.

The final link will be the short stretch of road to be built east of the new bridge to Federal highway by the county crews.

Saxer is a member of the planning and zoning board, and president of the Volunteer Fire Department.

Smith is also a member of the planning and zoning board. Additional candidates for the two Council offices may file at the last minute this weekend.

Village Marshal Bill Hickson and Clerk Marcia Stafford both are candidates for reelection, and neither has opposition thus far.

Candidates may qualify and voters may register at Mrs. Stafford's residence, 500 NE 25th St., at any reasonable hour.

### BULLETIN!

Oakland Park lost its ocean frontage Wednesday when Circuit Judge Lamar Warren issued a summary judgment nullifying a 1951 legislative act. The Legislature had annexed to Oakland Park the Arthur T. Galt property and Coral Ridge Development Co. property between Ocean Drive and Lauderdale-by-the-Sea. Judge Warren's order removes the property in question, including a mile of beach, from within the Oakland Park city limits.

### Council May Meet In Special Session Before Week's End

A special Village Council meeting which had been set for Tuesday night was called off at the last minute when William Crowe, consulting engineer on the water system, failed to arrive from Gainesville as scheduled.

However, Council President Earle Middleton said after talking with Crowe that a special session might be called before next Tuesday if Crowe can get here.

Meanwhile, it appeared that presentation of a new water ordinance for public discussion probably would be postponed about two weeks.

Councilmen had wanted to discuss with Crowe some phases of the proposed changes to be made in the present ordinance which has been widely criticized.

Whether or not a special session is held in the meantime, it is assumed the Council will hold its regularly scheduled meeting next Tuesday night.

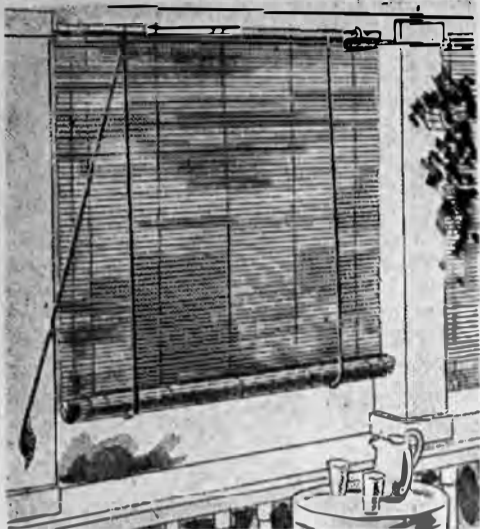

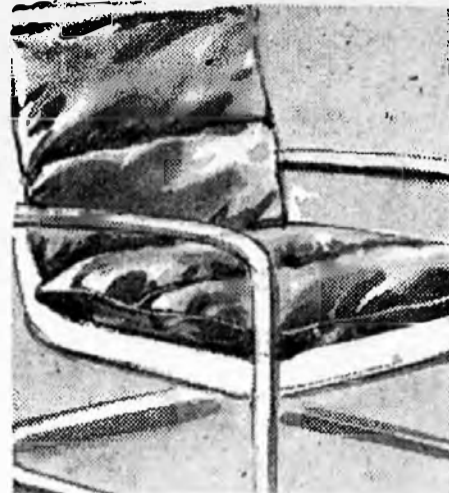

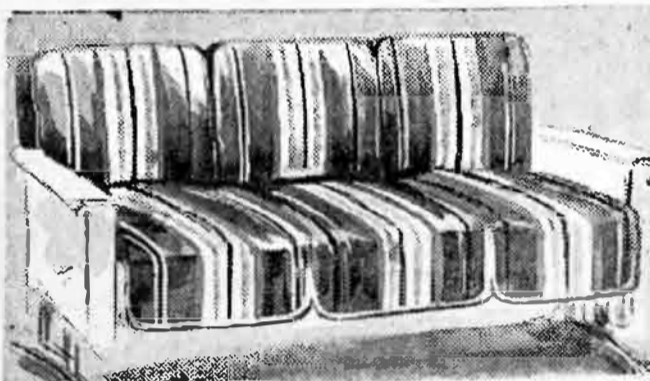

## Children's Corner

(Editor's Note—We are all interested in news of the schools our children are attending, so from time to time we will ask our elementary school principals, Mrs. Lucile Waters and W. Bryan Davis, for a guest column like the one below.)

The children of Oakland Park elementary school have no play period but a rest and relaxation period after lunch. It is during this time, and before and after school, that many beautiful and interesting things are being made.

One of the most interesting projects of last Spring was the work with cypress knees. One of the fathers in the community, Mr. E. Adkins permitted the principal to borrow a big five-ton truck, and she and the boys cut and brought in the knees from Mr. S. B. Sullivan's property on Rock Island rd

Since he is clearing the property for homes, the children did not feel they were destroying any of Nature's handiwork.

The cypress knees are boiled in a big pot, made by the children for four hours; they are peeled while hot and then dried for several weeks after which they are polished and made into finished products.

We feel that the children are much happier to have such interests as these. The work has done much toward developing good mental attitudes and interest in the school. Practically all discipline problems have been solved and it is a great pleasure seeing the children engaged in such worthwhile activities.

Working with tools helps the children to adjust themselves socially and means much for personal enrichment.

### No. 1 — LAW ENFORCEMENT

The primary task of honest and conscientious enforcement of law is the basis for good government in Broward County and throughout the nation.

All of us, young and old alike, must place confidence and respect in our law enforcement officials. This is possible only when competent, experienced and honest men discharge their duties faithfully.

Many changes are needed today in the enforcement groups, including the Broward County Sheriff's Office.

It will be my responsibility to bring about, without delay, efficient enforcement directed at greater community security, safety and protection for all citizens of Broward County.

### No. 2 — CRIME PREVENTION

It is important, of course, to apprehend the criminal when a crime has been committed. It goes without saying that devotion to duty, fairly, honestly and impartially is a basic requirement of your sheriff.

However, it is equally important to prevent crime BEFORE it happens, through constant patrol and vigilance.

Men, boys and girls who need guidance or rehabilitation will respond only when they have respect for the men representing the law enforcement agency.

My experience gives me ample background and understanding to help transform these young people into useful citizens who will have confidence in the sheriff and his staff.
