## FEDERAL HIGHWAY CONNECTION NEARLY COMPLETE

### Engineer's Ideas On Water System Laws Are Expected Soon

William Crowe, Wilton Manors' consulting engineer on its water system construction, is due here within "a week or 10 days" with his recommendations for a permanent ordinance to guide the water department, Village Engineer O. M. Dunton said Tuesday.

Dunton said he has received a letter from Crowe, member of the firm of Black and Associates, Gainesville, in which Crowe said he would be here very shortly with a report for the Village Council.

Actually, the Council had expected to have a permanent ordinance ready for consideration and publication some weeks ago, but delays have been met.

On his last visit, Crowe indicated he thought it possible the present ordinance might be altered in some respects, and promised the Council he would make a study of laws existing in comparable communities then report back to the Councilmen.

The present ordinance has been vigorously attacked in several instances and was the subject of a hot debate during a Council meeting several weeks ago.

It was during this meeting that the Council agreed to study the present law with a view to making revisions where revisions are called for.

Meanwhile, Dunton said the actual construction of the water system is expected to be finished by Saturday of this week.

"All the lines should be in by this weekend," the engineer said.

### Water Bill Requirement To Be Enforced Starting Next Month, Dunton Says

An order of the Wilton Manors Village Council requiring payment of minimum monthly water bills wherever meters are installed will go into effect with December billings of the water department, according to a statement by Village Engineer O. M. Dunton.

Dunton pointed out that the Council had instructed him that a minimum monthly charge must be made wherever meters are installed regardless of whether service is connected or disconnected.

He said the order was issued too late for effect on November billings, but will be enforced with next month's billings.

**Hooray For Our Side**

Our neighbor to the south. Fort Lauderdale, is back in its apparently natural state again: fighting, backbiting, bitterness and everlasting confusion.

Watching the politicians and the "factions" squabble and swear, we in Wilton Manors and Oakland Park might well consider the consequences and be wary that we never get into the same shape.

Good public officials need, and desire, public vigilance over their official activities. Vigilance, however, need not include automatic distrust of a man or a group of men who offer themselves for public service. The election of a man to office does not automatically convert him into a four-star crook.

If he is crooked, chances are he was crooked before he was elected. And if he is honest, chances are he will stay that way even though his opinions may sometimes differ from yours and mine.

They haven't been able to conduct an intelligent public business meeting in Ft. Lauderdale for years. Why?

Because there are about 627 different factions, each of which insists on having everything done as it demands, no two groups being in complete agreement at any time, and none willing to see anyone else's point. No compromise.

Cries of "thief", "crook", "steal", "crazy", "recall", "stink", "rat", "fool", dominate city commission sessions.

Fort Lauderdale has no community spirit and can't seem to stir up any, because it is in a constant state of turmoil; its people pay dearly for the political bitterness. There is no source of community pride except the sunshine and the beach, and no would-be political power can claim any credit for those assets.

Up here, we have our growing pains, too. But we also have spirit and pride in what we're doing and we don't try to run our communities like little Siberias.

Maybe if Wilton Manors could get the Legislature to annex Fort Lauderdale to us, we could show those poor folks how to live.



**WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER**

WASHINGTON.—Here we go again in our fight for that VA hospital at Gainesville. Most Floridians by this time are aware that for the past several years, the congressional delegation pushed vigorously to bring to reality the long-envisioned thousand-bed hospital for neuropsychiatric patients. Victory had been achieved, with even appropriations available for construction, until the President by Executive Order directed a reduction in such facilities.

Last week, the VA took steps to sell the land acquired for this hospital. Senator Holland, Congressman Bennett and I have urged General Carl Gray, Veterans Affairs Administrator, to withdraw this site from the surplus list. It should be retained, we believe, because we are now convinced the new administration as well as Congress will recognize the need for this institution.

VA medical men have told me that this location, near the state university which is soon to have a medical school, is most desirable and that, politics aside, it should be built.

This matter has statewide interest for two principal reasons. Most of our citizens believe that our veterans, particularly those suffering what used to be called "shellshock", are deserving of the best available treatment. Many of them, in all parts of the state, have

been put in jail to restrain them for lack of hospital facilities.

**NOTES FROM HERE AND THERE:**

Fish and Wildlife Service, quickly on the job of studying the new outbreak of "red tide" in the Gulf of Mexico off Florida shores, believe they may be near a solution to the problem of slaughter of millions of Gulf fish. We stayed so close behind this problem several years ago that the experts of the wildlife service needed no prompting when the recent outbreak came.

Thousands in the Jacksonville and Miami trading areas will be benefited by the inauguration last week of the Post Office Department's new fast bus service between Jacksonville and Miami. Even in residential areas it will mean 24 hour quicker delivery of mail. With Senator Holland, Congressman Lantaff and Bennett, my office had been working for some time on complaints of molasses-like mail service between the two cities. For a Californian,

Vice President-elect Dick Nixon shows remarkable taste; he, too, chose South Florida for a vacation spot to recover from campaign fatigue. We helped make his arrangements and were careful to keep mum, but Dick Nixon found out quickly what we could have told him: our Florida newspapers don't let many things get by them.

Editor Ernest Lyons of the Stuart News wrote me asking that Public Health Service be asked to study the possible dangers which might result if a hurricane struck and freed some of the subtropical snakes on exhibit in tourist-attracting snake farms. I asked for this study but I assured the press that in my opinion "not all tourist attractions in Florida are as beneficial as the health-giving sunshine but none of them are dangerous". I hear that Congressman Walter Judd, of Minnesota, may be General Eisenhower's choice for Secretary of State. I served on the House Foreign Affairs Committee with Dr. Judd and have a great respect for him.
