Guy Matthews
U.S. SENATOR

WASHINGTON: (Dictated from somewhere in Florida) — I am writing my newsletter this week from various places in West Florida where I am having the pleasure of visiting extensively for the first time in nearly two years. The reception I have been given in this wonderful part of our great State has been magnificent. I have been encouraged and inspired by talking with the people of Florida as at no other time since I started thinking about running for public office. Everyone has given me a most cordial welcome, and I have been showered with the sort of hospitality for which the South is noted.

Everywhere I have gone people have expressed a general approval of the position I have taken on major issues before the Congress. Here in this area, people have spoken to me, too approvingly of large appropriations for projects to develop our natural resources, such as the giant Jim Woodruff dam. People also talk about the record peacetime military appropriations which Senator Holland and I and the Florida House members have been able to bring to the State. It is gratifying to find that so many people do understand the work that we in the Congressional delegation have been trying to do for the advancement of the State.

NOTES FROM HERE AND THERE - Many of our friends who have expressed a personal interest in the marriage plans of my secretary, Juanita Thomas, will be interested to learn she is going to stay right on the job. Cupid put a note on the office bulletin board the other day; he was defeated and the wedding bells won't ring out. . . . Scotty Peek, of my Senate staff, and I started this recent Florida tour at Jacksonville where I was a guest of Lt. Col. Charles Cunz and helped cut the cake on the cake on the Marine Corps birthday . . . At Tallahassee, where I spoke on Armistice Day, I had the pleasure of visiting that great Capitol city newspaper, THE DEMOCRAT, and talking with Jack Tapers, Steve Yates, John Kilgore, and other members of the Staff. . . . 3-Way Stop Signal At Perilous Corner Appears Certain

Village Councilman James Dean informed the Wilton Manors Council Tuesday night that it is unofficially understood the Broward County Commission will purchase a three-way traffic light to be erected at Wilton Drive and Old Dixie highway at their intersection with NE 26 St.

Under the informal agreement, the County would buy the signal light and the Village of Wilton Manors would be responsible for installing it.

The 26th Street intersection has been a matter of concern for some time, and soon-due opening of the street through to Federal highway will create a still greater traffic problem there.

Cost of the light will amount to several hundred dollars.

James Carrie Appointed As Manors Police Officer

Wilton Manors now has a three-member police force.

The Village Council Tuesday night formally acknowledged and approved Mayor Perry Mickel's appointment of James Carrie as a police patrolman in line with Chief Richard Beaney's request for an additional officer.

The Council had authorized Clerk Marcia Stafford to advertise for applications at the last board meeting.

Carrie will work an irregular shift, to give the police department additional strength at those times when it is most needed.

Council Changes Order On Minimum Water Bill Rules

Wilton Manors Village Councilmen Tuesday night reversed a previously-approved order requiring payment of minimum water bills where meters are installed regardless of whether water is connected.

The original order was rescinded, and in the future, residents will not be required to pay the minimum charge for water unless (1) a meter is installed and (2) the water service is turned on.

Village Engineer O. M. Dunton said many complaints about the earlier requirement had been received, and he hinted that some water department personnel had been on the receiving end of some pretty strong language about the matter.

In other actions, the Council:

Set a special meeting with Highlands Estates Civic Club next Tuesday night to try to settle disputes over ownership of water lines.

Agreed to install a water meter at Village expense to furnish water to Wilton Manors elementary school.

Ordered corrective action against persons erecting buildings without proper authorization from the Village.

Heard Village Attorney William Miller tell Intercounty Construction Co. that money from sale of a \$110,000 water revenue bond issue probably will be available in 45 days.

Approved on second reading a bicycle ordinance requiring licenses and safety inspections.

Five Candidates Enter Race For 2 Seats On Oakland Park City Board

A total of five candidates will be listed on the ballot next Monday when several hundred Oakland Park voters troop to the polls in their election to name two members to the City Council. Mrs. Elizabeth Tucker, Oakland Park City Clerk, announced that the polls will be open at City Hall from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Monday. Councilman Frank J. Hawkins, whose term on the board is expiring, will not seek another term on the Council.

However, Councilman Colley White will try for reelection.

The candidates who will be listed on the ballot are, in alphabetical order:

Gene Delegal, Bill Hasenour, R. A. Marthens, White and H. A. Williams.

Holdovers, whose terms continue for another year, are C. M. Hunter, T. C. Moore and Bill Stevens.

At the following municipal election, Oakland Park voters will be called on to name three council members, a mayor and city clerk.

The terms of Mayor Dewey Hawkins and Clerk Tucker, like those of Hunter, Moore and Stevens, do not expire this year.

Manors PTA Group Will Sponsor Play

The Wilton Manors Parent-Teachers Association will present a Christmas play, "Hark, The Caroler", when the PTA's next monthly meeting is held at 8 p. m. next Wednesday.

The play will combine the talents of the entire sixth grades of both Mrs. Tresca and Mr. Robinson, and will be under the direction of Mrs. Hammond.

It was announced this week that venetian blinds for classrooms on the west side of the Wilton Manors school building have been installed and that construction has begun on a cement walk to the baseball diamond.

PTA officials reported that the school system's maintenance superintendent, Dudley Rawls, is studying the need for a sign over the front of the building and for at least a partial sprinkling system.

Meeting of the PTA executive board, scheduled for this week, has been postponed and will be held Monday night at 7:30.

BUY AT HOME AND PROSPER

Nationally Known Leader Earl Shreve To Speak Before Manors Civic Group

Earl O. Shreve, former president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, will address the Civic Association of Wilton Manors next Monday night at 8 o'clock, it was announced this week by Association President Frank W. Hainey. Shreve, one of the nation's top business leaders, was vice president of the General Electric Company at Schenectady, N. Y., prior to his retirement after serving as head of the giant U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

On his retirement, he moved to Broward County and now has his residence in Coral Ridge in northeast Ft. Lauderdale.

James Bell was appointed to the Wilton Manors Zoning Board Tuesday when the Village Council approved the board's recommendation that Bell be named to fill a vacancy.

One vacancy still remains on the board, created by the recent resignation of Ed W. Smith.

Construction of a beautiful Christmas scene in the triangle at Wilton Drive and NE Fifth Ave. will begin very soon, and Mayor Perry Mickel has volunteered to handle construction work, according to an announcement by H. G. Harper, chairman of the Civic Association committee named to carry out the project.

Harper said anyone wishing to volunteer to assist the mayor should contact him.

Work will be finished sometime next week and the unveiling ceremonies are scheduled for Saturday night, December 6.

Harper said Mrs. C. W. Brown has offered to help with the art work and Tom Hinds agreed to assist; while lighting will be handled by Civic Association President Frank Hainey, A. E. Muzzell and Reg Rowe.

"Anyone who has materials we can use or who is willing to help, please give us a ring," the committee chairman urged.

\$100 Cleanup Promised For Weedy Wilton Drive

Village Councilman Earl Gurney Tuesday night asked for and got a \$100 appropriation to clean up and beautify Wilton Drive immediately.

"The drive is in bad shape," Gurney said, adding it ought to be cleaned up for local residents and holiday visitors as soon as possible.

The council promptly agreed and ordered the \$100 made available.

Councilmen also authorized a contribution of \$50 toward the Christmas display to be erected in the triangle at Wilton Drive and NE Fifth Ave. H. G. Harper, chairman of a civic association committee, showed councilmen photographs illustrating the proposed display and told them materials bought will be usable in future years.

Purchase of a 1950 model motorcycle for the police department was confirmed. The machine cost \$450.

Orlando anticipates a crowd of 100,000 when she stages her Christmas Parade the afternoon of Wednesday Nov. 26, according to the Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce.

Theatre Building Starts Immediately

Confirming reports published in The Sun some two months ago, Wometco Theaters announced this week that construction will be begun immediately on a 1,000-car drive-in motion picture theater to serve Wilton Manors and Oakland Park at N Andrews Ave. Extension and Prospect Rd.

K. Hendee, manager of the Wometco-owned Gateway theater in Ft. Lauderdale, advised The Sun that the company expects to have the theater completed before the end of the tourist season just getting underway.

Hendee said the structure will be a "twin" drive-in theater, with facilities for walk-in patrons as well as motorists.

The building, he said, will be landscaped and will include the latest in RCA sound equipment.

Meanwhile, still another similar theater is reported to be in the final planning stage and an announcement on it is expected soon.
