Profits Buy Movie Outfit For School

Great Success Reported In Yule Display Planning

Wilton Manors will have a Christmas display "beyond our fondest hopes, and second to none in the county."

That was the keynote in a report this week of G. H. Harper, chairman of a Civic Association committee planning and erecting the display in the triangle on Wilton Drive at Fifth Avenue. Formal unveiling will be held on the night of December 13, which is a Saturday.

Harper said the huge, lighted display will undoubtedly attract viewers from all over Broward county.

And he paid high tribute to Mayor Perry Mickel, grocer Lamar Braddy, association president Frank Hailey and a number of others who have responded willingly to assist in creating the scenes.

Harper said collection of funds has been excellent and "the money is still coming in."

The two Christmas scenes, one of them 30 feet long, are being built in sections to be dismantled after the holidays, placed in storage and used every year with improvements.

The association urged all home owners to decorate their residences as beautifully as possible to help Wilton Manors build a reputation as Broward's outstanding Christmas community.

Colley White Leads Ticket, Marthens Is Disqualified, Delegal 'May Be In'

Possibility—perhaps even likelihood—that a new city council election will be demanded in Oakland Park was seen this week as a result of the discovery that at least one candidate in Monday's election was not qualified to be a candidate. And at press time, a cloud was hanging over the candidacy of another of the five contenders.

Here are the facts:

1. Councilman Colley White easily strolled into another term on the board by attracting 140 votes from among the 221 persons who went to the polls, or nearly two-thirds.

2. Richard Marthens was elected to the second seat with 73 votes, but was disqualified when it was discovered about noon on election day that Marthens through oversight had not registered as a City voter and thus failed to meet requirements for a candidate.

3. Gene Delegal, right behind Marthens with 72 votes, was possibly the winner of the second place open on the council. But a question promptly arose as to whether Delegal was qualified.

The cloud on Delegal's title to the office was based partly on whether or not he is legally a freeholder, or property owner. It was unofficially reported that Delegal was the holder of an "old deed" which may or may not have been recorded.

So the question was: if the

deed is not recorded, is he qualified as a freeholder and therefore eligible to run for office?

The next highest number of votes after those of White, Marthens and Delegal, was received by Henry Williams, who got 68, only four less than Delegal.

Therefore, there was speculation that no matter what decision is made on Delegal's standing, Williams might contest the election because he might have overcome Delegal's four-vote lead in a reshuffle of Marthens' 73 ballots.

William Hasenour, who ran fifth in the five-man race for two council seats, received 46 votes.

Another fact was that Williams has been ill and, some said, might not wish to contest, leaving the whole situation still more baffling.

City Clerk Elizabeth Tucker was busily attempting to unravel the tangled election situation.

Mrs. Tucker said Marthens in declaring himself a registered voter at the time he qualified as a candidate, did not realize that he was indeed registered in the county but not in the City of Oakland Park.

"We'll ask that the voting machine be left here for a few days in case we have to do it all over," she said.

The terms of Councilmen C. M. Hunter, T. C. Moore and Bill Stevens, Mayor Dewey Hawkins and Clerk Tucker have another year to run. Councilman Frank Hawkins did not seek reelection this year.

Trouble On the Menu For Speeders in Oakland Park

Barnhill said traffic is rapidly increasing with the advent of the winter tourist season, and he pointed out that Dixie highway is virtually swarming with school children several times daily.

The police chief added that traffic lanes on the busy highway will be painted right away, to aid in controlling vehicular movement.

Santa Claus Is Reported Swamped With Mail As Annual Journey Nears

NORTH POLE, Dec. 4—Headquarters of Santa Claus, most popular man on earth once annually, was reported today buried under an avalanche of mail, most of it complimentary. Letters were arriving from boys and girls in all parts of the world, containing urgent requests. Nearly all beseeched Mr. Claus to fail not in his scheduled mission December 24.

J. Edgar Penguin, chief clerk in the mail room at North Pole Castle, declared, however, that this year's requests were not running to quite so many items as in some past years.

Percival Polarbear, coordinator of joy mobilization, added that production is being stepped up in the North Pole workshops and additional elves have been recruited to add to the labor force.

Transportation Director Ralph Reindeer said his fleet already has made several trial runs around the top of the world, to get the fleet "limbered up", so to speak, for

the Christmas Eve run.

Although she avoids publicity, there was word of Mrs. Claus this week, too. A spokesman who asked not to be identified said Mrs. Claus has been putting in 12 to 18 hours daily in the Castle Kitchen preparing peppermint sticks and other candy treats.

It was next to impossible to gain an audience with Mr. Claus himself. But his press secretary handed reporters a statement signed in Santa's unmistakable handwriting. It said:

"I want all the children of the world to know that everything possible will be done to fill every request. There won't be much of a surplus, but there won't be a deficit, either."

The Florida East Coast railroad is one railroad that runs its choo-choos right on time to the split second. At least, that applies to its switch engines. We have ridden its passenger streamliners a time or two when they were a minute or two late.

But one can set one's watch by the switch engines. Each morning, promptly at 28 minutes and 12 seconds past 8, a switch engine bearing a string of cars comes whining around the bend to block the intersection where the FEC crosses Andrews avenue and meets NE 4th Ave.

This is at a time when several hundred Wilton Manors and Oakland Park people who work in Ft. Lauderdale have precisely one minute, 48 seconds, to get to the office.

The result is, of course, that these folks are late. Now, we don't want to be old fuddy-duddies, stalling progress. But we wonder if the FEC would be much put out if this switching could be done before 7 a. m., or after 9 a. m., or, dadburn it, almost anytime except 28 minutes and 12 seconds past 8.

Reach Agreement On Water Dispute

Wilton Manors Village Council agreed Tuesday night to pay Highlands Estates Civic Club \$4,000 still due on purchase of the Highlands Estates water system as soon as funds become available.

And the civic group agreed to post a \$5,000 bond to guarantee the Village protection against any claims that may arise in the future from any conflict as to ownership of the water lines involved.

The solution to the long-standing issue was decided upon at a special meeting between the Council and the board of directors of the civic club, led by president Elmer Novak.

It came after a 90-minute discussion among councilmen, the club directors, Village Attorney William Miller and John E. Morris, Jr., attorney for the club.

The money will be paid as soon as the Village receives proceeds of its \$110,000 water revenue bond issue. A suit to validate the bonds was filed in circuit court this week.
