### Marthens, Delegal File For Election

List of candidates for Oakland Park's special city council election may have been completed this week with the qualification of Richard A. Marthens and Gene Delegal to make the race. Their entry means at least five will be in the running for the single council vacant, but there could be more.

Marthens and Delegal both were in the race December 1, when Colley White won reelection but Marthens, who ran second, was disqualified because of a mixup over his qualifications. Delegal was only one vote behind Marthens.

Henry Williams was only four votes behind Delegal in December, and he, too, is seeking the office again.

The other two contenders to file so far were not candidates in the December voting. They are Lee J. Duncan and Mrs. Lydia Mann.

The special election is set for January 12; candidates must qualify not later than Friday, January 2; and voters must register by January 7.

### Merchants Say Business Great; Displays Praised

Well, the Christmas displays that have beautified Wilton Manors and Oakland Park these past weeks have just about all been dismantled and put away until next year; but everyone agreed this was the finest year for displays the area ever has had.

### Judge Delays Water System Bond Suit

A hearing in circuit court to validate Wilton Manors' \$110,000 water system bond issue has been postponed until mid-January by Circuit Judge Lamar Warren. And the postponement will mean perhaps an extra month's delay before the Village will be able to pay the contractors who built the system on credit, Intercounty Construction Co.

Village Attorney William G. Miller originally had obtained a hearing date of December 22, but the court put it off, apparently due to a crowded docket.

These bonds will be sold, after validation, to pay the contractors and certain other obligations incurred by the water department in the first phases of its construction and operation.

In another matter concerning the department, Village Clerk Marcia Stafford called attention again to the fact that the department's office has been moved and is now located in Manor Hardware and Hobbycraft, 2188 Wilton Drive, instead of the former location, Miller Hardware.

Bills may be paid at the new office which is now in full operation.

- 1/3 cup pimiento cut in strips

- 2 1/2 cups chicken bouillon
- 1/4 tsp chili powder
- 1 tbs paprika
- salt and pepper to taste

Cut chicken in serving pieces, roll in seasoned flour and brown in hot fat. Remove from skillet. Cook onion, garlic and green pepper in four tablespoons hot fat till golden brown. Add well-washed and drained uncooked rice and pimiento and stir for two or three minutes.

Postmen who were burdened down a week ago with cards and packages now find themselves all cluttered up with mailing tubes with calendars of every size and description.

We have received about 20 in our office so far and I imagine will receive many more before the new year rolls around. We can actually use only three or four, and while we appreciate the thoughtfulness of the firms and individuals who send them to us, we must give the rest away or consign them to the wastebasket.

No one knows how many million dollars are spent for calendars each year or how many of those sent are actually used. Some are beautiful and decorative and others suitable only for the "men's room."
