Deadline for filing of candidates arrived last Friday with only the five contenders entered in the race. Three of them were candidates in the regular December election; but a vacancy still

Here are the five candidates who will seek the voters' favor Monday:

Gene Delegal, longtime Oakland Park resident who ran third in the December election.

Lee J. Duncan, operator of O-P Concrete Products, a newcomer to politics.

Mrs. Lydia Mann, another newcomer, an officer in the Oakland Park Woman's Club.

Richard A. Marthens, salesman, who ran second in December but was disqualified at that time and later qualified for this new election.

Henry A. (Red) Williams, operator of Williams Paint and Body Shop, a candidate in December who ran fourth in the field then but still was only five votes behind Marthens.

That, then, will be the picture when Oakland Park voters return to the polls for the second time in six weeks.

Since last election, the registration books have been open and many new voters have registered. The books closed only Wednesday.

Polls will be open at the City Hall from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Anything could happen, and few are venturing to predict the outcome.

Council Faces Big Agenda Tuesday

Wilton Manors Village Councilmen will have a heavy schedule to deal with next Tuesday night when they hold their first official meeting in 35 days.

During the long holiday, plenty of business has been piling up for their attention.

One of the most important matters to be noted is the delay in circuit court of the validation suit for the Village's \$110,000 water system bond issue.

The case, originally set to be heard before Christmas, was put off until mid-January by Judge Lamar Warren.

That means the contractors, Intercounty Construction, will have to wait longer than expected for their money. They built the system on credit pending completion of the lawsuit and sale of the bonds.

Another rumored item is an expected request of the police department for a new patrol car. The present vehicle has had heavy use and will not be suitable much longer for the demands of police work.

Bus Route Changed For Manors Riders

Many Wilton Manors bus riders got a break this week when a slight alteration in bus routes put public transportation a little nearer their doors.

A spokesman for Ft. Lauderdale Transit Lines said the Oakland Park-Wilton Manors bus henceforth will make a detour on its trip to Ft. Lauderdale.

From Oakland Park, the bus will travel south on Dixie highway to 26th Street, turn west on 26th to Fifth Avenue, then turn south on Fifth Avenue to Wilton Drive. The northward trip to Oakland Park, however, will remain unchanged.

At present, there's only one bus every hour, but the company spokesman said it is hoped that the schedule will be doubled in the very near future.

No Fear For '53, Shreve Declares

If present agreements between the Federal Reserve System and the Treasury department on monetary policy are maintained, neither the nation in general nor any of us in South Florida need have any fear of greatly expanded inflation.

That was one of the most interesting points of view expressed Monday night by Earl O. Shreve, director and former president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, in a talk to the Wilton Manors Civic Association.

In making the statement, Shreve was quoting private economic sources available to the U. S. Chamber that the Federal Reserve-Treasury agreement of March 4, 1951, ending a long series of feuds, played a great part in stopping the inflation spiral.

Shreve, whose talk was extremely well received, made a number of other points during his address, which was delivered from

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

From
Guy Matthews
U.S. SENATOR

WASHINGTON—The 83rd Congress is off to a traditional flying start and there will be a flurry of excitement until the Committee assignments are made and the Senate organized. The new Republican leadership, in taking over committees, will have to organize the professional staffs, get committee and hearing rooms arranged, and make other necessary preparations for the real work of Congress. It is expected to be at least a month before any real work will be done on legislation.

During the recent holidays I prepared my own legislation program which will place emphasis on three main objectives:

1. Reform of the nominating and election system of the Federal Government by Constitutional Amendment.
2. Modernizing the taxation system with greater relief as prime objective.
3. Stabilizing of political thinking in a "common sense" approach to national and international problems.

By the time you read this I will have seven measures in the Congress and hold high expectations of seeing some of these proposals enacted into law. Of course these

matters mentioned will not be the limit of my activities. There are many diversified questions always arising in which I will be interested and will offer amendments, debate and vote on.

Most of you by this time are familiar with my proposals to:

1. Abolish the electoral college system of electing the President and Vice President, and to establish a system under which the electoral votes would be divided among the candidates upon a basis of the percentage of popular votes received by each.

2. Provide for selection of the candidates of the major political parties for President and Vice President in general primaries.

3. Provide for the holding of special elections to fill vacancies in the office of President where such vacancies occur at least 90 days to off-year congressional elections.

- 2 cups nutmeats
- ½ cup pitted dates
- ½ cup seedless raisins
- 1 pt. whipping cream
- 2 tbs. powdered sugar
- ½ tsp. vanilla

Now, it takes four vanilla wafers to make one snowball. Grind nutmeats, dates and raisins. Whip the cream, add sugar and vanilla. Add enough whipped cream to nut mixture to make a moist paste. Spread about one heaping teaspoon on wafer, then teaspoon of whipped cream. Place another wafer on this and repeat process until four wafers are used.

Coat the entire stack with whipped cream. Top with freshly grated coconut and place in refrigerator for 24 hours or more.

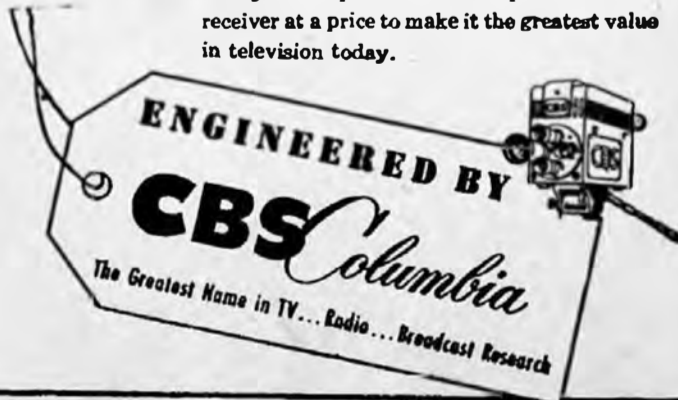

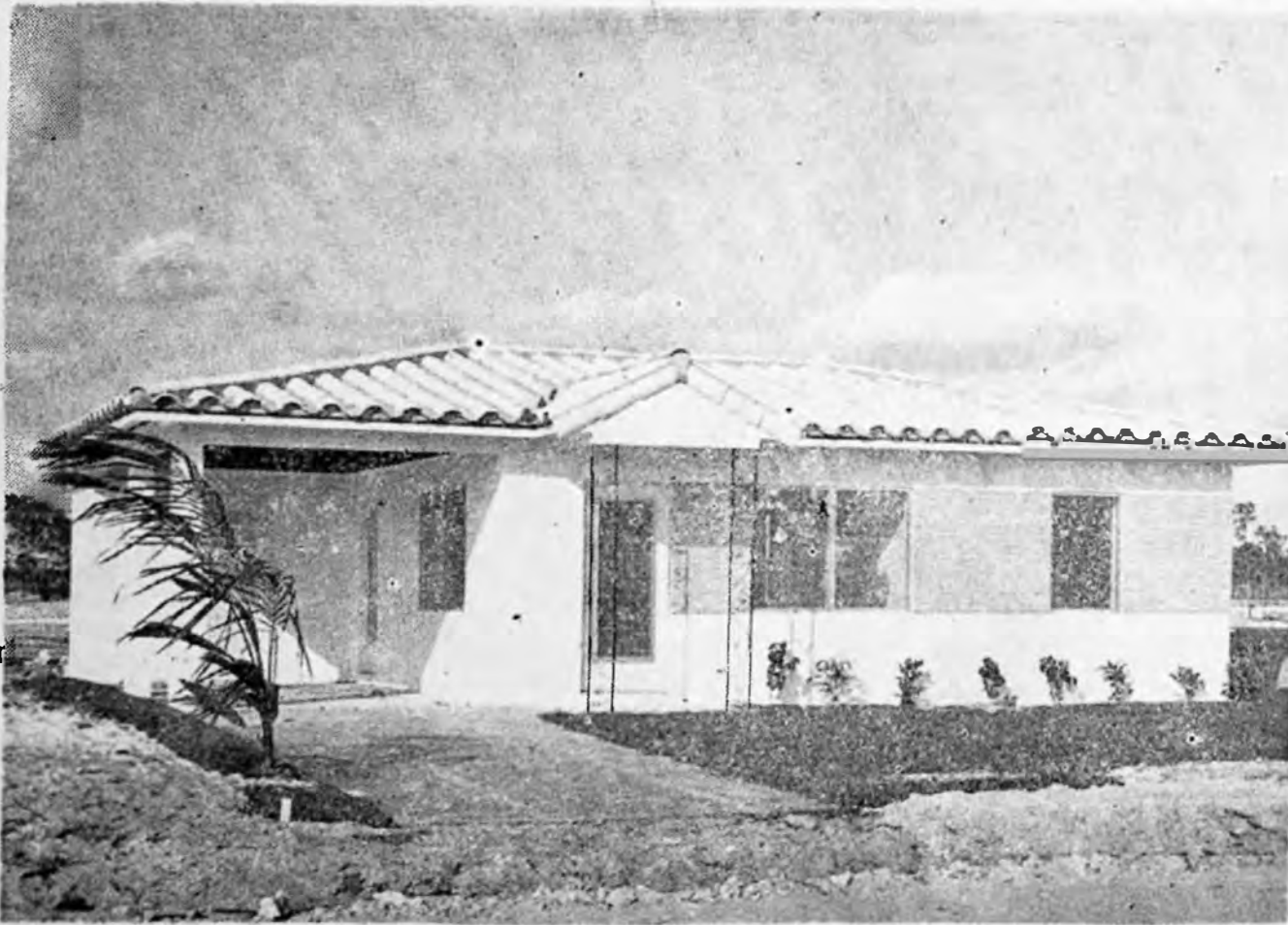
