## Ft. L Group Pushes 4th Ave. Widening To Wilton Manors

Possibility that the widening of NE Fourth Avenue from the FEC tracks at Andrews Avenue to the Wilton Manors Village limits may come soon appeared this week when it was revealed the project will be laid before Ft. Lauderdale city commissioners next Monday.

Ft. Lauderdale officials will be presented with rights-of-way from all of the property owners affected by the proposed project, according to P. G. Wilson and N. S. McEwen, representing the Third and Fourth Avenues Improvement Association.

This group has been actively engaged for more than 6 months in the current effort to get the long-delayed job done.

The thoroughfare not only is narrow; it is dangerous since the pavement slopes to such a degree on each side as to make it difficult to control an automobile.

Some time ago, Ft. Lauderdale officials told the group that if all right-of-way could be obtained without cost to the city, the work would be done at city expense without assessing the property owners for the improvement.

The ultimate goal of the improvement people is much more ambitious than the comparatively small project now under consideration.

Eventually, it is their hope to have a crossing of the FEC at NE Third avenue and a bridge across New River at SE Third avenue, as well as to have that avenue widened to major thoroughfare proportions.

Wilton Manors' businessmen's group several months ago sent Paul McElhattan to meet with the improvement association and promise Manors merchants' cooperation in efforts to get the projects started.

A once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to witness the re-enactment of an old-fashioned Seminole Indian wedding ceremony is on the plan scheduled Saturday evening when the Civic Association of Wilton Manors holds its second barbecue of the 1953 winter carnival events. A full costume Seminole show in connection with the barbecue feast has been planned, it was announced by Frank Hainey, president of the association.

Interpreters will be on hand to translate the nuptial ceremonies from the Seminole language to English. It is a ceremony seldom seen by White men.

And there also will be an alligator show, with Seminoles wrestling alligators, Hainey said.

## "Hi-falutin'" Traffic Control Plans Are Dropped At Urging Of Merchants

Wilton Manors Village Council voted 4 to 0 Tuesday night to shelve strict enforcement of angle-parking requirements all along Wilton Drive after a large group of merchants expressed overwhelming opposition to the regulations as they had existed. Councilman J. Marvin Brown, who is police commissioner, did not vote on the motion. The action came at the close of a 1½ hour session between Council and merchants at Wilton Manors school.

Two hot issues were focal points at the meeting:

(1) A proposal to install buttons in the center of Wilton Drive to prevent shoppers from making left turns across the Drive.

(2) Enforcement of angle parking rules to require motorists to park at certain angles between designated lines.

Pending settlement of the issue, police have been issuing "courtesy warning slips" to violators.

But one merchant, Ralph Johnson of Nancy's Dress Shoppe, declared he had lost a \$50 sale because of one of the courtesy slips. The customer had chosen merchandise from his stock, Johnson said, when she saw a slip being placed on her car.

The customer went out to see what it was all about, and never came back to get the things she had bought, he explained.

To Police Chief Richard Beaney's declaration that "everybody was courteous and nobody was mad", Johnson agreed, but added:

"She still didn't go back into the store for her purchases."

Lamar Braddy of Manor Market, among others, decried the proposal to set buttons in the street. And Braddy went on to say that his firm spends several hundreds of dollars weekly to bring people to Wilton Manors to shop, and:

"If those people are going to get a ticket for parking an inch or two over a painted line, they're not coming back and we won't have either customers or traffic."

Braddy said he considered so-called congestion on the Drive "overrated", adding that he didn't believe the situation was as bad as it had been made to appear.

Bob Lewis, Broward 5 & 10, said many parking spaces in the 2100 block of Wilton Drive had

Monday night, the mayor showed up at the regular meeting of the Oakland Park Lions Club.

Hawkins had been suffering from a persistent virus infection for a number of weeks before entering the hospital.

The mayor said Tuesday that he is now on a strict diet ordered by his physician.

"I can only eat two steaks per meal," he explained.

### OUR JUVENILE RECORD GOOD

Wilton Manors Police Chief Richard Beaney, whose policy has been to make himself and his officers friends of the youngsters of the Village, saw his policies apparently vindicated recently.

Juvenile Judge Dorr Davis' 1952 activity report showed Wilton Manors originating fewer dependent or delinquent children's cases than any community in Broward County.

Oakland Park's record likewise was good.

Only 11 dependent or delinquent cases came out of Wilton Manors for the entire year. Other communities' case records follow:

Davie, 14; Deerfield Beach, 25; Oakland Park, 28; West Hollywood, 45; Hallandale, 63; Dania, 67; Pompano Beach, 106; Hollywood, 108; Ft. Lauderdale, 606.

**CHICKEN TETRAZZINI**

Cook a 5 lb. chicken with an onion in water to cover, until very tender.

Simmer for 2 or 3 hours the following:

- 2 cans tomatoes, strained
- 1 grated onion
- 2 tbsps paprika
- 1 tbsps worcestershire sauce
- 1 tbsps butter

Two hours before serving, add the chicken—which you have pulled away from the bones and shredded into small pieces—to the mixture and very slowly add ½ pint of cream.

About 20 minutes before serving, add 1 can mushrooms and ½ lb. grated York State cheese. When ready to serve, add 1 lb. cooked spaghetti or enough to take up the liquid. Sprinkle more cheese on top.

been lost because angle spaces had been made too wide.

"The prosperity of Wilton Manors depends to a large extent on the prosperity of the merchants, and their prosperity depends on customers having a place to park," Lewis asserted.

He also expressed the opinion that the Village was attempting to begin too early to enforce "fancy, hi-falutin' rules" saying:

"After Wilton Drive is improved and traffic is heavier two, three or four years from now, changes may be needed, but let's not do it before it is necessary."

Bill Hickson, Ole Bill's Bar & Packages, said he believed only a couple of spaces had been lost in the 2100 block, but Les Bagwell, Tropical Paint Supply, said the number was closer to 15.

With only two dissenting votes, the merchants approved a motion offered by Lewis asking that action on the control proposals be shelved for an indefinite length of time, and the Council agreed to go along.
