WILTON MANORS COUNCIL GIVES GREEN LIGHT TO CITY CHARTER PROPOSALS

ATTORNEY TOLD TO PROCEED WITH LEGISLATIVE DETAILS

The go-sign for presentation of a city charter act to the state legislature next month was flashed Tuesday night by the Wilton Manors Village Council when Council told its attorney William G. Miller Jr. to proceed with completion of the arrangements already tentatively started. The Council's action was unanimous and followed recommendations of the planning advisory board.

It might be fought, not only by farmers, but by the legislators whose aid will be needed to get a charter bill introduced and passed in Tallahassee.

A likely compromise is the waterway about halfway between North Andrews Ave. and the Seaboard tracks. The Village Attorney said letters and statements of approval will be sought from the persons whose property would be taken into the Village under present plans.

The planning board one week earlier had acted similarly, recommending that Wilton Manors adopt a form of government as nearly like the present on as feasible. The latter recommendation apparently ruled out nebulous proposals for a city manager operation, since that idea was not discussed further Tuesday and evidently has been dropped.

Miller, who also has favored action to obtain a formal charter, said he had been working on the first draft of one, tailored to Village needs, and suggested a motion be passed authorizing him to continue with the work. He quickly got such a motion.

Loose ends are yet to be tied together on the question of boundary lines for Wilton Manors. It is certain the Village will propose to annex some lands, such as "no man's" territory in strips between Wilton Manors and Oakland Park limits, south of Middle River's north fork.

Also to be annexed is property to the west of the present Village limits. The question still undecided is what the western boundary should be.

The Seaboard railway had been suggested, but that would take in a lot of acreage now being farmed.

Police Chief Richard Beaney announced this week that a survey will begin next Monday to learn how many Village pooches have not yet been inoculated against rabies. Police officers will canvass the Village checking up.

Owners of dogs not vaccinated will be given 15 days to comply with the ordinance requiring inoculation.

Cost of the shots is \$3. It is expected that a veterinarian will be available to give shots at the Village Mall at a date to be announced.

NELS OLANDER, 44, DIES IN SHOOTING; HERBERT WIMBERLY HELD DURING PROBE

Nels E. Olander, 44-year-old electrician, was fatally shot shortly before 2 a. m. Thursday at his residence, 115 SW First St., Oakland Park. Not long afterward, Olander's brother-in-law, Herbert W. Wimberly, 48, surrendered to sheriff's department authorities and was booked for investigation of murder. Deputy Sheriff Claude Tindall quoted Wimberly as saying he killed Olander in the darkness after being suddenly awakened when water apparently was thrown into his face.

It was difficult to piece together the exact details of the shooting. Tindall said Wimberly would be held in the county jail while the investigation proceeds to determine what charge might be filed.

This is the story, Tindall said, as related by Wimberly:

Wimberly, who lived at the Olander house, came home Wednesday night. Mr. and Mrs. Olander were seated on the porch. Wimberly entered the house and proceeded to go to bed. There was little or no conversation as Wimberly arrived and went into the house.

The next thing Wimberly knew, he told Tindall, he was startled into wakefulness by water thrown into his face. He grabbed a .25 caliber automatic pistol from beneath his pillow and started shooting at a figure in the dark.

Olander was hit several times. Mrs. Olander was not home. Tindall said, having gone to a neighbor's home nearby.

Tindall quoted Wimberly as saying he had borrowed the pistol and was planning to take it along on a scheduled fishing trip.

After the shots were fired, Wimberly walked to the home of his brother, Julian Wimberly, on SW Second St., and told him, according to Tindall:

"Take me to get the law."

After describing the shooting to his brother, Herbert and Julian Wimberly went to the home of Police Chief John Barnhill. A radio call brought Deputy Sheriffs Jimmy Knight, Bill Bates and Tindall and Assistant State Attorney Frank S. Cannova.

Tindall told The Sun that the investigation up to press time had discovered no apparent argument preceding the shooting. It was un-

CIVIC GROUP OKAYS 'HANDS OFF' EDICT

A resolution opposing any move by any community toward annexing the Village of Wilton Manors was passed unanimously at a special meeting last Friday night by the Wilton Manors Civic Association, presided over by President Frank W. Hainey.

The resolution, aimed at reports Ft. Lauderdale might covet Manors territory, put the group on record as "unalterably opposed" to any attempt by anybody to take over the Village.

Actually, the Association was informed, there is little likelihood such an effort would succeed. But a resolution was approved, nevertheless, after Village Attorney William G. Miller Jr. cited the broad powers of the Legislature to abolish cities at will.

Association Vice President Carter Holmes reported on conversations with Broward County's three legislators on their attitude in the event Ft. Lauderdale should express desire to expand in this direction. These were their reactions:

Sen. George W. Leaird would be "reluctant" to approve such expansion. "First I've heard about it," he added, expressing doubt that it would come to a head any time soon.

Rep. John S. Burwell would be against it "as a matter of policy. . . wouldn't want to tamper with local self government and always have felt that way."

Rep. Ted David "would oppose any interference with the integrity of Wilton Manors," agreed with Burwell's remark about self government.

Also approved by the Association was a resolution recommending that the Village adopt a formal charter.

David and Burwell, as well as the village attorney, expressed belief Wilton Manors should have a charter suited to its needs.

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ON THE Range

I can't think of anything more tantalizing than the aroma of orange being baked into biscuits, bread and cakes. And where is there a better place to use this delicious fruit than right here in Florida, where it grows so abundantly?

We have for you today two recipes—one a biscuit, the other a bread—and I do hope you try them.

Glazed Orange Tea Biscuits

2 cups sifted flour
½ tsp salt
¾ cup milk
2 tsp baking powder
¼ cup butter
orange sugar made by combining ½ cup sugar and 2 tbsps grated orange rind.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in the butter, add milk all at once and mix only until all flour is incorporated and moisten-

ed.
DO NOT BEAT.
Flour your hands and shape into balls. Roll in melted butter and dip in the orange sugar. Place in greased muffin tins and bake in hot oven 425 degrees, for 15 minutes. Serve warm.

Honey Orange Nut Bread

2 ½ cups sifted flour
½ tsp baking soda
¾ cup chopped nuts
1 cup honey
grated rind of orange
2 tsp baking powder
¼ tsp salt
¼ cup shortening
1 egg, beaten
¾ cup orange juice

Sift together dry ingredients and stir in nuts. Cream shortening, blend the honey in gradually, add egg and orange rind. Beat until creamy. Add flour mixture alternately with orange juice. Bake in a greased loaf pan 350 degrees about one hour. Allow bread to become one day old before slicing.

TRIP TO WASHINGTON D. C. SLATED FOR MANORS SCHOOLBOY PATROL MEMBERS

McJunkin Property Rezoning Approved

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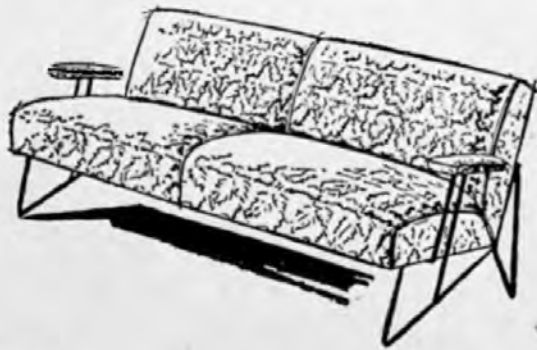
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
