WILTON MANORS SCHOOL GETS PRIORITY FOR IMMEDIATE ADDITION OF 11 ROOMS

Eleven rooms will be added to Wilton Manors Elementary School in the very first phase of a big county-wide expansion program. That was decided this week by the Broward County School Board which gave highest priority to the Wilton Manors school along with eight other urgently-needed projects. All nine are expected to be started this year.

Council Eases Fears Of Lazy Lake Residents

Wilton Manors Village Council wants nothing to do with municipal unrequited affection.

Council informed representatives of Lazy Lake section this week that if Lazy Lake doesn't want to become part of Wilton Manors, the Village has no intention of trying to take the area in.

Village Attorney W. G. Miller Jr. re-emphasized statements made previously that letters or statements of approval would be sought from all owners of property which the Village wishes to annex.

Wilton Manors plans to introduce an incorporation bill in the Legislature next month, and in setting the territorial limits, it is planned to annex some areas which are not now within the Village limits.

Council this week also:

Asked Engineer O. M. Dunton to get bids on a survey for storm sewers along Wilton Drive.

Received from Dunton a letter enclosing \$40 to be divided between the police and volunteer fire departments; the money, with another \$30 for water used to extinguish stump fires on the J. N. McJunkin property several days ago, was donated by McJunkin in appreciation.

Approved a \$200 expense item for installing 10 flush standpipes recommended by Water Supt. Wallace Wakely, who advised Council that quality of Village water would be improved by the installations.

Approved increases in water meter installation charges from \$60 to \$75 for one-inch meters and from \$120 to \$220 for two-inch meters.

BLOOD DRIVE LAGS

The response to the Wilton Manors P.T.A.'s drive to raise a minimum of 100 pints of blood for the armed forces and gamma globulin as a polio preventative has been slow and disappointing. Unless we really get behind it and push—the whole drive may have to be cancelled. Therefore we are asking every family represented in our school to pledge at least one pint of blood. The donation to be made at the Village Hall between 2 and 7 P.M. on April 2. If you cannot give yourself—surely you can find someone to take your place. Just remember, if Broward County does not meet its quota by July first—there will be no gamma globulin. If an epidemic of polio does strike, our children will be denied 6 weeks immunity from crippling polio.

Just when the local expansion project will be finished is not known. But all of the nine first-priority jobs should be ready for school's opening in the fall of 1954.

These will be the first two million dollars worth of construction in an overall county program which is to include 64 jobs and cost about \$10,000,000.

Broward County will be one of seven counties to get money from the first bond issue floated by the state department of education under terms of a new amendment to the Florida Constitution.

Parents will remember this as the Amendment Number One they voted into existence last November. It permits the education department to issue bonds on behalf of individual counties, pledging revenue from sale of automobile license tags.

The addition to Wilton Manors' elementary school plant will fill an urgent need. The building, practically new, was inadequate before it was opened.

Classrooms have been overcrowded in many instances. And furthermore, the school has no cafeteria, gymnasium, library, or auditorium.

Presumably, the addition of 11 rooms would include some of these facilities although the answer to that question was not known to The Sun at presstime.

WOMEN WILL HEAR CIVIL DEFENSE TALK

Civil Defense will be the subject for special attention on April 7, when the Wilton Manors Womans Club meets at the Village Hall. Charles H. Lindfors will speak at the meeting presided over by Mrs. Clayton R. Leaver, newly-installed president of the Womans Club.

F. C. Ghiotto, district Civil Defense head for Broward County, also has been invited to attend the important meeting.

ACCIDENT DELAYS SUN PUBLICATION

Photographer L. C. Steinman, 359 N Dixie Highway, Oakland Park, suffered severe burns over the right arm Wednesday night when a gas heater exploded.

Steinman, photographer for The Sun, was taken to Broward General Hospital for treatment of first and second degree burns which extended from the fingers of the right hand all the way up to the shoulder.

The accident indirectly caused a 24-hour delay in publication of The Sun this week.

Now I have witnessed dog races, horse races, donkey baseball, frog races and Mexican jumping bean races, but it looks as though our friend John Combs of Jamaica has gone hog-wild and just naturally let the bars down on this racing business.
