Our Own Homogenized

Hot Air

You, sir, and ma'am, may think the Congressional Record is dull, dry reading matter. But there are times when one may get a whale of a bang out of that staid publication. Because sometimes it ain't so staid.



It's more like stewed. Ye ed came across an exchange among members of the House of Representatives which might be called "Rump Session", "The Case of the Congressman's Bottom", or "Look For the Seat of the Trouble". It should be remembered that it costs several thousand dollars an hour to run Congress. Here it is, right from the stewed, staid old Record:

Mr. Bender. . . . Mr. Chairman, I do not know how much money was required to modernize the House Chamber and the Chamber of the other body. It seemed to me that the chairs we had before the renovation were very comfortable; in any event it was determined to change the whole works. No question was raised regarding that and I am sure the cost ran into millions.

This country wants Congressmen with backbone. My medical friends both inside and outside the AMA tell me that the best way to acquire a backbone if you do not have one or to retain it if you do is to stand up straight whenever you are sitting down. There is no sense in using the fine, comfortable 1953 model chairs we have in the House Chamber a few hours daily if we must go back to offices equipped with 1853 horsehair torture chairs.

I think the country will receive a net gain in service with these good chairs instead of those a few dollars cheaper. Far more expensive legislation will be passed by back-weary Congressmen who cannot stand up to pressure groups because they can scarcely stand up at all than by the fine specimen of up-standing Congressmen whose backs are models of orthopedic virtue.

ACTION SPEEDED ON INSPECTION LAW

Wilton Manors Village Attorney William G. Miller Jr. said this week he is working to hasten the probable enactment of an ordinance giving local authorities power to inspect rest homes or other premises for fire or any other hazard.

The great tragedy last week on the Florida west coast at Largo, when 33 persons died in the burning of a nursing home, brought renewed interest in the inspection question locally.

Several weeks ago, the Village Council authorized Miller to begin drafting an ordinance permitting local authorities to make inspections for possible hazards.

Heavy work involved in drafting a legislative charter bill for the Village has delayed the inspection ordinance somewhat. The attorney said, however, that the inspection law would be completed as quickly as possible.

EYE-OPENING DATA ON WILTON-OAKLAND GROWTH EXPECTED FROM UTILITY HEAD

Jolting surprises on expected future growth and property values in the Wilton Manors-Oakland Park area were promised this week to those who attend next Monday night's meeting of the Wilton Manors Civic Association. Frank Hainey, group president, announced that everyone interested is invited to attend the meeting at the Village Hall Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

The startling facts will come from W. T. Patrick Jr., head of the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Co. in Broward County.

As everyone knows, the telephone company spends hundreds of thousands of dollars a year making surveys to determine where and how much expansion of phone facilities to plan for. The survey results in this area in recent years have brought about the investment of millions; and all signs point to even more fabulous growth.

Only recently, the telephone company bought a large tract of land at Oakland Park road (Ocean Blvd.) and Federal Highway for a huge new communication center.

On December 1, State Rep. Ted David, addressing the civic association, quoted economic experts to the effect that the Wilton-Oakland section will eventually be the very heart of a 10,000,000-population metropolitan area.

Patrick's discussion before the association next Monday is expected to reveal precisely what the A T & T experts think.

In addition to the telephone official's remarks, a motion picture furnished by the company will be shown. Titled "For Progress, Call Dixie!", the film discloses amazing development throughout the South in recent years.

TENTATIVE PLANS INDICATE NEW HOT LUNCH FACILITIES

Wilton Manors school children may at last be due for hot lunch facilities under state education department plans for an 11-room addition to the practically new elementary school building.

Only last week, the Broward County School Board gave a top priority to the local expansion project. It will be one of the first few of a total of 64 construction jobs to be undertaken in a \$10,000,000 countywide program.

This week, new information made it appear that badly needed lunchroom facilities may be included in the Wilton Manors project.

The state department of education's planners say 10 new classrooms are needed here, plus other facilities including a cafeterium (combination lunchroom-auditorium), library and additional toilets.

Estimated cost is listed at \$204,360.

No exact specifications have yet been announced. But the above facts make it appear that the "cafeterium" would be included in the 11-room addition and that one of the 10 classrooms would be used as a library for some time, until all 10 are required for classroom use.

Present plans call for construction to begin this year. The new rooms would be ready for occupancy by the opening of school in September, 1954.

As reported in The Sun last week, Broward County will be one of the first counties to receive money from a new state school bond issue made possible by the voters' approval last November of Constitutional Amendment Number One.

And Wilton Manors thus will be one of the first communities in Florida to benefit.

At present, children in school here must either go home for lunch, if they live nearby, or forego the hot food they need and take cold package lunches to school.

OLEO COOKIES

1 lb. oleomargarine
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup ground nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 cups flour
Mix in order given. Chill until cold.

Take small pieces of dough, roll in the palm of the hand and shape like crescents. Bake on greased tin at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. While warm, roll in powdered sugar.

PECAN BALLS

3 tablespoons brown sugar
1/4 lb. butter
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup flour
vanilla
Cream butter and brown sugar. Add flour and pecans. Drop off spoon. Bake at 350 degrees on a buttered sheet, about 15 minutes.

1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white sugar
1 cup shortening
1 cup peanut butter

Sift the flour with soda and salt and add to mixture. This makes a stiff dough. Shape into small balls. Press tops with prongs of a fork to flatten to the size of a half dollar.

Bake 10 minutes in 375 degree oven.

But by far the greatest contributions came in dollars, halves, quarters, dimes, nickels and pennies from Wilton Manors and Oakland Park citizens who dropped money into collection boxes placed throughout the two communities.

The fund was organized with the assistance of many people, with special efforts contributed by Henry A. Williams and the Rev. Warren Yates of Oakland Park and by the Rev. Russell D. Toms of Wilton Manors.
